Madrid, June 26:

N our last we gave you an Account, that the Prince of Parma was made choice of to Command the Men of War this Crown defigns to put to Sea; but at prefent is is faid at Court, that he is named to fucceed the Duke de Villa Hermola, in the Government of the Spanish Netherlands. The Duke de Montalto is returning thither, to exercise his Command of General of the Horse.

Warfaw, fune 28. While the Miniflers here fpend their time in Conferences, and in Treating of a League, between this Crown and Moleovy, and that without any profpect of concluding it, the Turks, according to the advices we receive from 'all hands, are advancing towards our Frontiers, having affigned their Rendezvous near Caminiec. We are expecting an account from Prince Radzeville, our Ambaffador at Rome, of the progrets he has had in his Negotiation there, which will have a great influence upon the Refolutions of this Court

Genoua, Fune 29. Yefterday returned from the Riviera, the True-Love, laden with Oyls; while the was lading at Oneglia, five French Men of War, and two Firethips appeared, which the Mafter and his Company fuppoing to be Algerines, left their Ship, and went alhoar, but difcovering their militake, returned again: The faid French men of War put into Vada, Thirty miles to the Weftward, and two days fince they failed again from thence to the Eaftward, and are flill in fight; it's believed they expect the Twelve Gallies defigned for these Coafts. Two days fince parted from hence, a Dutch man of War, with Seven Merchant Ships under his Convoy, bound home. It's faid, the Erench Gallies are at Villa France.

Strasburg, July 2. Count Manfel, the Emperors Envoy to the French King, continues fill at Augsburg, from whence he fent fome days fince a Gentleman to the Baron de Monelar, Lieutenant-General for the French King in Alface, to know of him, whether he might proceed on his journey, after having been fo long delayed in it. The French Troops continue very much to vex the Inhabitants of the Palatinate, and have poffelfed themfelves of another fmall place.

another finall place. Francfort, July 4. The Complaints which have been fo often repeated to the Dyet at Raticbonne, by the Elector Palatine, concerning the proceedings of the French, have not hitherto had any effect, for indeed can it be otherwife expected in the prefent poffure of things, when the French have an Army in the Field; and that on the other fide, the feveral Princes of the Empire, even thole most concerned, are unarmed; at least, have not a body of Men together to oppose their Defigns. The discourse of the Emperors holding a meeting with the Electors, and other Princes of the Empire; in order to the taking such Resolutions, as the present Conjuncture may stand in need of, is revived again; though probably with as little ground for it, as it was first raifed upon.

Briffels, July 9. We expect our next Letters from Spain will bring us the Declaration of a new Governor of these Provinces, the Duke of *fuliers* having, its faid, declined the Overture that was made to him. Great preparations are making at *Cambray* and Valenciennes, for the reception of the French Court, which will part from St. Germains the 13th or 14 Inftant. Our Letters from Liege confirm what we told you in our last, of the French having laid two Bridges over the Meuse at Dinant; It's probable we may tell you in our next, that their Troops have passful that River; which, those parts, and effecially the Countrey of Juliers, are not a little disturbed at.

Hague, July 9. The Spanish Envoye has presented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein, he thanks them, in the name of the King his Master, for the part they take in his Interests, and prays them to continue their good Offices, to prevent the inconveniencies which may arife, in case the most Christian King continues to infish upon the Declaration made by his Commissioners at Courtray, concerning
