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Madrid, June 26.

IN our last we gave you an Account, that the Prince of *Parma* was made choice of to Command the Men of War this Crown designs to put to Sea; but at present is said at Court, that he is named to succeed the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, in the Government of the *Spanish Netherlands*. The Duke de *Montalto* is returning thither, to exercise his Command of General of the Horse.

Warsaw, June 28. While the Ministers here spend their time in Conferences, and in Treating of a League, between this Crown and *Moscovy*, and that without any prospect of concluding it, the Turks, according to the advices we receive from all hands, are advancing towards our Frontiers, having assigned their Rendezvous near *Caminiec*. We are expecting an account from Prince *Radzeville*, our Ambassador at *Rome*, of the progress he has had in his Negotiation there, which will have a great influence upon the Resolutions of this Court

Genoa, June 29. Yesterday returned from the *Riviera*, the *True-Love*, laden with Oyls; while she was lading at *Oneglia*, five French Men of War, and two Fireships appeared, which the Master and his Company supposing to be Algerines, left their Ship, and went ashore, but discovering their mistake, returned again: The said French men of War put into *Vada*, Thirty miles to the Westward, and two days since they sailed again from thence to the Eastward, and are still in sight; it's believed they expect the Twelve Gallies designed for these Coasts. Two days since parted from hence, a Dutch man of War, with Seven Merchant Ships under his Convoy, bound home. It's said, the French Gallies are at *Villa Franca*.

Strasburg, July 2. Count *Mansel*, the Emperors Envoy to the French King, continues still at *Augsburg*, from whence he sent some days since a Gentleman to the Baron de *Monclar*, Lieutenant-General for the French King in *Alsace*, to know of him, whether he might proceed on his journey, after having been so long delayed in it. The French Troops continue very much to vex the Inhabitants of the Palatinate, and have possessed themselves of another small place.

Francfort, July 4. The Complaints which have been so often repeated to the Dyet at *Ratisbonne*, by the Elector Palatine, concerning the proceedings of the French, have not hitherto had any effect, nor indeed can it be otherwise expected in the present posture of things, when the French have an Army in the Field; and that on the other side, the

several Princes of the Empire, even those most concerned, are unarmed; at least, have not a body of Men together to oppose their Designs. The discourse of the Emperors holding a meeting with the Electors, and other Princes of the Empire; in order to the taking such Resolutions, as the present Conjunction may stand in need of, is revived again; though probably with as little ground for it, as it was first raised upon.

The Captains are not constantly in a Ship, and therefore are omitted; as also the number of Men, which differs every voyage, more or less, as they can be got.

Brißels, July 9. We expect our next Letters from *Spain* will bring us the Declaration of a new Governor of these Provinces, the Duke of *Fuliers* having, its said, declined the Overture that was made to him. Great preparations are making at *Cambray* and *Valenciennes*, for the reception of the French Court, which will part from *St. Germain* the 13th or 14 Instant. Our Letters from *Liege* confirm what we told you in our last, of the French having laid two Bridges over the *Meuse* at *Dinant*; It's probable we may tell you in our next, that their Troops have passed that River; which, those parts, and especially the Countrey of *Fuliers*, are not a little disturbed at.

Hague, July 9. The Spanish Envoye has presented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein, he thanks them, in the name of the King his Master, for the part they take in his Interests, and prays them to continue their good Offices, to prevent the inconveniences which may arise, in case the most Christian King continues to insist upon the Declaration made by his Commissioners at *Courtray*, concerning
