The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant

June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirtieth Day of October next inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. *W. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Eleventh Day of December last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of



“ Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council.” But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on-board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither,*

the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to remove Doubts arising from the Construction of an Act made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for permitting certain Goods imported from the East Indies to be warehoused, and for repealing the Duties now payable thereon, and granting other Duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to allow for Nine Months after the passing of the Act the Use of Sugar in the brewing of Beer.

An Act to revive and continue until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and one, such Part of an Act made in the present Session of Parliament for reducing the Duties upon Spirits distilled from Melasses or Sugar or any Mixture therewith, and for other Purposes as relates to the Duties on Wort or Wash brewed or made from Melasses or Sugar.

An Act for further continuing and amending an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty.

An Act for permitting the free Importation of Linseed Cakes and Rape Cakes in Neutral Ships.

An Act to continue until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four several Acts relating to the Admission of certain Articles of Merchandise in Neutral Ships, and to the issuing of Orders in Council for that Purpose.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act passed in the Second Year of King James the First as prohibits the Use of Horse Hides in making Boots and Shoes, and for better preventing the damaging of Raw Hides and Skins in the slaying thereof.

An Act for repealing Part of the Duties and Drawbacks of Customs on Kid Skins imported, and the Exemption of imported Kid Skins from Excise Duty on being dressed in Great Britain.

An Act to lessen the Duties on Wine and Spirits the Produce of the British Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and to empower the Importers to land the same before Payment of the Duties of Excise, and to lodge the same in Warehouses, and to allow the same to be shipped, free of Duty, as Stores to be consumed on board Merchants' Ships on their Voyages.

An Act for extending the Royalty of the City of Glasgow over certain adjacent Lands; for paving, lighting, and cleansing the Streets; for regulating the Police, and appointing Officers and Watchmen; for dividing the City into Wards, and appointing Commissioners, and for raising Funds, and giving certain Powers to the Magistrates and Council, and Town, and Dean of Guild Courts, for the above and other Purposes.

An Act to empower the Governor and Company of the Bank of England to purchase certain Houses and Ground contiguous to the Bank of England, and to enable them to improve certain Avenues adjacent thereto.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual Two Acts made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of King George the Second, and in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for draining and preserving certain Fen Lands and Low Grounds in the Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge between the Cam, otherwise Grant, Ouse, and Mildenhall Rivers, and bounded on the South-East by the Hard Lands of Isleham, Fordham, Soham, and Wicken, and for empowering the Governor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of the Company of Conservators of the Great Level of the Fens called Bedford Level, to sell certain Lands within the said Limits commonly called Invested Lands, and for laying certain Rates on Vessels navigated upon the said Rivers towards supporting the Banks thereof.

An Act for better draining and preserving the Lands and Grounds in the Fourth District of the North Level Part of the Great Level of the Fens called Bedford Level, and for amending and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, so far as relates to the said Fourth District.

An Act for dividing, allotting, and inclosing certain Waste Lands in the Manor of Worthen, and the Manors or Townships of Aston Pigot and Aston Rogers, in the Parish of Worthen, in the County of Salop, and for draining and otherwise improving certain inclosed Lands adjoining or near a certain Rivulet or Brook called the Rea, commencing at or near a certain Piece of Water called Marton Pool, on the Confines of the Parish of Chisbury, and extending through the said Parish of Worthen to a Bridge across the said River Horse Bridge, on the Confines of the Parish of Westbury, in the said County, and sundry Streams or Brooks emptying themselves thereinto.

An Act for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act passed in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for more effectually amending, widening, and keeping in Repair several Roads leading from the Market-House in the Town of Kidderminster, in the County of Worcester, and several other Roads therein-mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of so much of an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign for repairing several Roads leading into the City of Glasgow, as relates to the Road from Parkhouse to or near the Three Mile House in the County of Lanark.

An Act for more effectually amending, widening, improving, and keeping in Repair several Roads leading from the Hundred-House in the County of Worcester, and also several other Roads therein-mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending and keeping in Repair the Road from a certain Bridge over a Brook or Stream called Sudbrook, near the City of Gloucester, to the Nine Mile Stone on the Bristol Road, at or near a Place called The Clay Pits, in the County of Gloucester.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for repairing and widening the Road from the City of Gloucester to the Town of Stroud, in the County of Gloucester.

An Act for vesting Part of the settled Estates devised by the Will of Sir Patrick Blake, Baronet, deceased, situate and being in the Counties of Middlesex and Suffolk, in Trustees to be sold for Payment of Incumbrances affecting the same Estates, under the Direction of the Court of Chancery, and for laying out the Surplus of the Purchase Money in other Estates upon the Trust, and for the Purposes therein-expressed.

An Act for vesting Part of the Estates devised by the Will of Sir Richard Hotham, Knight, deceased, in Trust to be sold for Payment of Incumbrances, and for laying out the Surplus Monies in other Estates to be settled in lieu thereof, and to the same Uses.

An Act for Sale of certain Estates in the Parishes of Claypole, Great Ponton, and Kirton, in the County of Lincoln, and devised by the Will of the Reverend William Rastall, Doctor in Divinity, and for laying out the Money arising by Sale thereof in the Purchase of other Estates to be settled to the same Uses, and for other Purposes in the said Act mentioned.

An Act for enabling the Tenants for Life under the Will of the late William Wright, Esquire, to convey in Fee, or grant Leases for long Terms of Years for the Purpose of Building of Part of the Estates devised by the said Will, in the Counties Palatine of Chester and Lancaster.

*Ville de Paris, off Ushant.*

I Desire you will communicate to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the inclosed Report from Rear-Admiral Sir John Borlase Warren, of a well-concerted Enterprize to destroy that Part of the Enemy's Convoy that had escaped from Saint Croix to Quimper, which only failed of its well

meditated Success by the Ships retiring up the River; and I cannot too much praise the Conduct of it.

MY LORD, *Renown, at Sea, June 24, 1800.*

I Take the Liberty of informing your Lordship, that having observed a small Squadron of the Enemy's Vessels at the Mouth of Quimper River, I anchored on the 22d, at Night, off the Glenans, and directed a Detachment of Marines, together with Three Boats manned and armed from the different Ships\* under my Orders, to rendezvous on board the Fisgard, to follow the Commands of Captain Martin, and to endeavour to take or destroy the above Vessels: and I beg Leave to refer you to the inclosed Letter from Captain Martin for the Transactions on this Service.

SIR, *Fisgard, at Sea, June 23, 1800.*

I Beg to inform you that the Boats of the Squadron and Marines employed under my Direction, in attacking the Vessels of War and Convoy of the Enemy in Quimper River, arrived off its Entrance at Daylight this Morning, and, in order to protect the Boats in the Execution of this Service, the Marines were landed in Two Divisions, the one on the Right Bank of the River under Lieutenant Burke, of the Renown, and the other on the Left under Lieutenant Gerard, of this Ship.

Lieutenant Yarker commanded the Boats, and was going with great Expedition and good Order to the Attack, but finding the Enemy had removed to an inaccessible Distance up the River, he immediately landed, stormed, and blew up a Battery with several Twenty-four-Pounders.

The other Detachment also took and blew up Two strong Works.

It gives me great Pleasure to say this Affair terminated without any Loss on our Part; and the Preparation made by the Enemy in Consequence of my reconnoitring their Position yesterday Morning gives the most satisfactory Testimony, in Favour of the Spirit and Conduct of the Officers and Men, who, in less than Half an Hour gained complete Possession of both Sides of the River to a considerable Extent, and if the Vessels specified in the Margin † had not moved upwards, they would certainly have fallen into our Hands.

MY LORD,

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that I this Day captured Le Vengeur, a French Brig Privateer carrying Six long Four-Pounders and Ten Eighteen-Pound Carronades, with a Hundred Men: Two Days from Bourdeaux, intending to cruise on the Coast of Brazil. She sailed in Company with Three Letters of Marque, a Ship, a Brig, and a Schooner bound to Guadaloupe, and captured Yesterday the Snake Lugger Privateer of Jerfey.
