#### PRESENT,

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council. WHEREAS by an Act paffed in the Twentyfecond Year of His late Majefty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Additional Act for the "rebuilding of the City of London, uniting the "Parifhes, and rebuilding of the Cathedral and Pa-"rochial Churches within the faid City," taking Notice that great Exactions had been, and were exercifed by Wharfingers and others employed about the Wharfage and Cranage of Goods landed or fhipped off at or from the faid City of London; for Remedy thereof it was enacted, that fuch Rates and no other flould from Time to Time be taken for Wharfage and Cranage, as well of Timber and other Materials for building, as of Coals and other Goods and Merchandizes, as by His faid Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, flould for that Purpofe be affeffed and allowed to be taken, a Table of which Rates fhould be hanged up at every of the faid Wharfs refpectively ; and if any Wharfinger or other fhould exact or demand, or directly or indirectly take or receive for Wharfage or Cranage, or by Colour thereof more than according to the Rates which fhould be fo affeffed, or fhould refue to fuffer any Goods or Merchandize to be landed or fhipped at, off, or from any Wharf or Wharfs within the faid City or the Liberties thereof at the Rates aforefaid, fuch Offender fhould forfeit for every fuch Offence the Sum of Ten Pounds to the Party or Parties thereby grieved, to be recovered with full Cofts of Suit, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majefty's Courts of Record at Weftminfter or within the faid City of London, as the Caufe fhould arife, wherein no Effoin, Protection, or Wager of Law fhould be allowed, nor any more than one Imparlance.

And whereas, no Table of Rates has been yet affeffed or allowed for many Wharfs within the intent and meaning of the faid Act, but certain Rates have for a confiderable Time been taken for Wharfage and Cranage at all the faid Wharfs refpectively, which have been fubmitted to as just and reafonable although not affeffed and allowed accord.

prefented to His Majefty by the humble Memorial of a great Number of respectable Merchants and Traders of the City of London and its Vicinity, that the Wharfingers have lately circulated a new Table of Rates increased in an extraordinary Degree, and in fome Inftances more than double the former Charges, which, if fubmitted to would be highly injurious to the general Trade in the Port of London: And whereas the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council having taken the Matter of fuch Memorial into their Confideration, and having been attended thereupon by Counfel on the Part of the Wharfingers, and by Charles Price, Efquire, Alderman of the City of London, and others, on the Part of the Merchants : and their Lordships having heard all the faid Parties had to offer touching the fame, came to a De-termination to advife His Majesty to establish, under the Authority of the before mentioned Act of Parliament fuch Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were actually paid on the First Day of January One thousand feven hundred and ninety-four; and their Lordships were pleafed to direct that the faid Merchants and Wharfingers should lay before their Lordships a correct State or Table of such Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were fo paid on the faid First Day of January One thousand feven hundred and ninety-four; and a State or Table of fuch Rates having been accordingly laid before their Lordships and admitted by the faid Merchants and Wharfingers respectively, to be a true Table of the Rates of Wharfage and Cranage paid on the faid First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four, which Rates are as follows : videlicet,

It is with peculiar Satisfaction I congratulate you on the Succefs of the Steps which you have taken for effecting an entire Union between My Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland.

This great Meafure, on which My Wifhes have been long earneftly bent, I fhall ever confider as the happieft Event of My Reign, being perfuaded that nothing could fo effectually contribute to extend to My Irifh Subjects the full Participation of the Bleffings derived from the British Constitution, and to eftablish on the most folid Foundation, the Strength, Prosperity, and Power of the whole Empire.

I have witneffed with great Concern the fevere Preffure on My People, from the continued Scarcity of the Seafon; but I truft that, under the Bleffing of Providence, there is now every Reafon to expect that the approaching Harveft will afford a fpeedy and effectual Relief.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons, I return you My particular Thanks for the Zeal and Liberality with which you have provided for the various Exigencies of the public Service. I regret deeply the Necessity of these repeated Sacrifices on the Part of My Subjects, but they have been requifite for the Prefervation of Our dearest Interest; and it is a great Confolation to obferve, that, notwithstanding the Continuance of unufual Burdens, the Revenue, Commerce, and Resources of the Country have flourished beyond all former Example, and are still in a State of progressive Augmentation.

#### My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Course of the Campaign upon the Continent has, by a fudden Reverfe, difappointed the fanguine Hopes which the Situation. of Affairs at its Commencement appeared fully to jultify, and has unhappily again exposed a confiderable Part of Europe to those Calamities and Dangers from which it had recently been refcued by the brilliant Success of My Allies.

Much as thefe Events are to be regretted, it will always be Matter of just Satisfaction to. Me to reflect, that, in the Courfe of this important Contefl, My Efforts, and those of My Parliament, have been

unremittingly employed for the Maintenance of Our | own Rights and Interests, and for animating and supporting the Exertions of other Powers in defending the Liberties of Europe. Notwithstanding the Vicifiitudes of War, your

Conflancy and Firmnels have been productive of the most important and lasting Advantages in the general Situation of Affairs, and the Determination manifested in your recent Declarations and Conduct, must afford Me the best Means of promoting, in Conjunction with My Allies, the general Interests, and of providing under every Circumstance for the Honor of My Crown, for the Happinels of My Subjects, and for the Security and Welfare of every Part of the British Empire.
