AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 23d of July 1800,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-second Year of His late Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Additional Act for the rebuilding of the City of London, uniting the Parishes, and rebuilding of the Cathedral and Parochial Churches within the said City," taking Notice that great Exactions had been, and were exercised by Wharfingers and others employed about the Wharfage and Cranage of Goods landed or shipped off at or from the said City of London; for Remedy thereof it was enacted, that such Rates and no other should from Time to Time be taken for Wharfage and Cranage, as well of Timber and other Materials for building, as of Coals and other Goods and Merchandizes, as by His said Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, should for that Purpose be assessed and allowed to be taken, a Table of which Rates should be hanged up at every of the said Wharfs respectively; and if any Wharfinger or other should exact or demand, or directly or indirectly take or receive for Wharfage or Cranage, or by Colour thereof more than according to the Rates which should be so assessed, or should refuse to suffer any Goods or Merchandize to be landed or shipped at, off, or from any Wharf or Wharfs within the said City or the Liberties thereof at the Rates aforesaid, such Offender should forfeit for every such Offence the Sum of Ten Pounds to the Party or Parties thereby grieved, to be recovered with full Costs of Suit, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster or within the said City of London, as the Cause should arise, wherein no Effoin, Protection, or Wager of Law should be allowed, nor any more than one Imparlance.

And whereas, no Table of Rates has been yet assessed or allowed for many Wharfs within the intent and meaning of the said Act, but certain Rates have for a considerable Time been taken for Wharfage and Cranage at all the said Wharfs respectively, which have been submitted to as just and reasonable although not assessed and allowed accord-

ing to the said Act: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the humble Memorial of a great Number of respectable Merchants and Traders of the City of London and its Vicinity, that the Wharfingers have lately circulated a new Table of Rates increased in an extraordinary Degree, and in some Instances more than double the former Charges, which, if submitted to would be highly injurious to the general Trade in the Port of London: And whereas the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council having taken the Matter of such Memorial into their Consideration, and having been attended thereupon by Counsel on the Part of the Wharfingers, and by Charles Price, Esquire, Alderman of the City of London, and others, on the Part of the Merchants; and their Lordships having heard all the said Parties had to offer touching the same, came to a Determination to advise His Majesty to establish, under the Authority of the before-mentioned Act of Parliament such Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were actually paid on the First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four; and their Lordships were pleased to direct that the said Merchants and Wharfingers should lay before their Lordships a correct State or Table of such Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were so paid on the said First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four; and a State or Table of such Rates having been accordingly laid before their Lordships and admitted by the said Merchants and Wharfingers respectively, to be a true Table of the Rates of Wharfage and Cranage paid on the said First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four, which Rates are as follows: videlicet,

An Addition of 25 per Cent. on the Amount of Wharfage is allowed by an Agreement made between the East India Company and the Wharfingers, in the Year 1760.

His Majesty this Day took the said Table of Rates for Wharfage and Cranage into His Royal Consideration, and hath assented and allowed, set out and appointed, and doth hereby with the Advice of His Privy Council, assents and allow, set out and appoint, the said several and respective Rates for Wharfage and Cranage contained in the said Table, and doth order and appoint that such Rates respectively, and no other shall and may be taken for the Wharfage and Cranage of all such Goods and Merchandizes respectively, as are in the said Table mentioned, which shall at any Time hereafter by any Person whatsoever be brought unto, shipped off, laden, or unloaden at or from any Wharf or Wharfs within the City of London or the Liberties thereof.

tively, any such Goods or Merchandizes respectively, the several Rates for Cranage and Wharfage which by the aforesaid Table are assessed and appointed to be paid for the same and no other; and, to the Intent all Persons concerned may know what they are to pay for the Cranage and Wharfage of their Goods as aforesaid, it is further ordered that this Order and Table of Rates be published in the Gazette, and that a Copy of the said Table of Rates, shall, according to the Direction of the aforesaid Act of Parliament be kept constantly hanging up in the most public Part and Place of each and every of the said Wharfs or Quays, and another at the Custom-House for all Persons concerned to resort unto and make use of as they shall have Occasion.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that all and every Order and Orders of Council which have at any Time heretofore been made contrary to the Intent and true Meaning of this Order shall be and the same respectively is and are hereby from the Date of this Order repealed and made void.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following Most Gracious Speech:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IN putting an End to this laborious Session of Parliament, I must express the just Sense I entertain of the Diligence and Perseverance with which you have applied yourselves to the various Objects of Public Concern which came under your Deliberation. It is with peculiar Satisfaction I congratulate you on the Success of the Steps which you have taken for effecting an entire Union between My Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland.

This great Measure, on which My Wishes have been long earnestly bent, I shall ever consider as the happiest Event of My Reign, being persuaded that nothing could so effectually contribute to extend to My Irish Subjects the full Participation of the Blessings derived from the British Constitution, and to establish on the most solid Foundation, the Strength, Prosperity, and Power of the whole Empire.

I have witnessed with great Concern the severe Pressure on My People, from the continued Scarcity of the Season; but I trust that, under the Blessing of Providence, there is now every Reason to expect that the approaching Harvest will afford a speedy and effectual Relief.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you My particular Thanks for the Zeal and Liberality with which you have provided for the various Exigencies of the public Service. I regret deeply the Necessity of these repeated Sacrifices on the Part of My Subjects, but they have been requisite for the Preservation of Our dearest Interests; and it is a great Consolation to observe, that, notwithstanding the Continuance of unusual Burdens, the Revenue, Commerce, and Resources of the Country have flourished beyond all former Example, and are still in a State of progressive Augmentation.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Course of the Campaign upon the Continent has, by a sudden Reverse, disappointed the sanguine Hopes which the Situation of Affairs at its Commencement appeared fully to justify, and has unhappily again exposed a considerable Part of Europe to those Calamities and Dangers from which it had recently been rescued by the brilliant Success of My Allies.

Much as these Events are to be regretted, it will always be Matter of just Satisfaction to Me to reflect, that, in the Course of this important Contest, My Efforts, and those of My Parliament, have been

unremittingly employed for the Maintenance of Our own Rights and Interests, and for animating and supporting the Exertions of other Powers in defending the Liberties of Europe.

Notwithstanding the Vicissitudes of War, your Constancy and Firmness have been productive of the most important and lasting Advantages in the general Situation of Affairs, and the Determination manifested in your recent Declarations and Conduct, must afford Me the best Means of promoting, in Conjunction with My Allies, the general Interests, and of providing under every Circumstance for the Honor of My Crown, for the Happiness of My Subjects, and for the Security and Welfare of every Part of the British Empire.
