AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 29th of July 1800,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twelfth of February last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next: and whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twelfth Day of August next, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store; or ship or lade any of the Articles abovementioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or his Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2.; and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 34, any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of June last to the contrary notwithstanding: and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord

Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

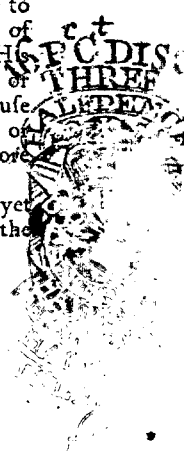

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twenty-second Year of His late Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Additional Act for the rebuilding of the City of London, uniting the Parishes, and rebuilding of the Cathedral and Parochial Churches within the said City," taking Notice that great Exactions had been, and were exercised by Wharfingers and others employed about the Wharfage and Cranage of Goods landed or shipped off at or from the said City of London; for Remedy thereof it was enacted, that such Rates and no other should from Time to Time be taken for Wharfage and Cranage, as well of Timber and other Materials for building, as of Coals and other Goods and Merchandizes, as by His said Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, should for that Purpose be assessed and allowed to be taken, a Table of which Rates should be hanged up at every of the said Wharfs respectively; and if any Wharfinger or other should exact or demand, or directly or indirectly take or receive for Wharfage or Cranage, or by Colour thereof more than according to the Rates which should be so assessed, or should refuse to suffer any Goods or Merchandize to be landed or shipped at, off, or from any Wharf or Wharfs within the said City or the Liberties thereof at the Rates aforesaid, such Offender should forfeit for every such Offence the Sum of Ten Pounds to the Party or Parties thereby grieved, to be recovered with full Costs of Suit, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster or within the said City of London, as the Cause should arise, wherein no Effoin, Protection, or Wager of Law should be allowed, nor any more than one Impar lance.

And whereas, no Table of Rates has been yet assessed or allowed for many Wharfs within the



Intent and Meaning of the said Act, but certain Rates have for a considerable Time been taken for Wharfage and Cranage at all the said Wharfs respectively, which have been submitted to as just and reasonable, although not assessed and allowed according to the said Act: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the humble Memorial of a great Number of respectable Merchants and Traders of the City of London and its Vicinity, that the Wharfingers have lately circulated a new Table of Rates increased in an extraordinary Degree, and in some Instances more than double the former Charges, which, if submitted to, would be highly injurious to the general Trade in the Port of London: And whereas the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council having taken the Matter of such Memorial into their Consideration, and having been attended thereupon by Counsel on the Part of the Wharfingers, and by Charles Price, Esquire, Alderman of the City of London, and others, on the Part of the Merchants; and their Lordships having heard all the said Parties had to offer touching the same, came to a Determination to advise His Majesty to establish, under the Authority of the before-mentioned Act of Parliament, such Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were actually paid on the First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four; and their Lordships were pleased to direct that the said Merchants and Wharfingers should lay before their Lordships a correct State or Table of such Rates of Wharfage and Cranage as were so paid on the said First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four; and a State or Table of such Rates having been accordingly laid before their Lordships, and admitted by the said Merchants and Wharfingers respectively to be a true Table of the Rates of Wharfage and Cranage paid on the said First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-four, which Rates are as follows: videlicet,

and every of the said Wharfs or Quays, and another at the Custom-House for all Persons concerned to resort unto and make use of as they shall have Occasion.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that being on my Passage from Saint Helena to England, at Five A. M. on Sunday the 13th Instant, in Latitude 45 Deg. N. and Longitude 29 Deg. West, I observed a strange Sail to Windward, which, by her Motions, appeared to be an Enemy's Cruiser; I therefore thought it right to make all possible Sail to reconnoitre her.

Night coming on before I could well discover what she was, I shortened Sail for the Convoy; and at Daylight, in the Morning of the 14th, (it having been calm during the greatest Part of the Night,) I saw the same Ship about Three Miles a-head, who, upon my making Sail in Chace, and firing several Shot, shewed National Colours.

Light Winds having prevailed during the Whole of the Day, she was enabled, by her Sweeps, to keep just without Gun-Shot; but towards Evening, a Breeze springing up in our Favor, I gained on her fast, and at One A. M. on Tuesday the 15th, took Possession of her.

She proves to be La Fortune Privateer, of Bourdeaux, a very fine Ship, mounting Sixteen Eight-Pounders, Four long Twelves, and Two Thirty-six Pound Carronades, all Brads; her Complement Two Hundred and Two Men; but had on board when taken only One Hundred and Eighty-eight, the Rest having been sent on board the Fame Brig from Sierra Leone bound to London, the only Capture she had made in a Cruise of One Month from Bourdeaux.

I beg Leave to add, that she appears to me to be a Ship well calculated for His Majesty's Service, being remarkably strong built, coppered and Copper fastened, and a very excellent Sailer: the present is only the Second Cruise since she was built.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese of Meath, at their Annual Visitation assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese of Meath, anxiously avail ourselves of this our first General Meeting since the late atrocious Attempt on your Majesty's sacred Person, to offer to your Majesty our heartfelt Congratulations on the Divine Interference, by which a Life so dear to Re-



ligion and to its Ministers has been preserved to them and to your People.

It hath pleased the Almighty to call your Majesty to the Throne of these Realms at one of those awful Periods when the Judgments of the Lord are manifestly brought down upon the Earth, and Nations, hardened in Sin and Guilt, suffer the Punishment of their Impenitence in great national Calamities. From the Records of the Divine Proceedings, we learn how much of our Deliverance from these Calamities we owe to the Protection that has ever been extended by the Supreme Ruler "to good" and godly Kings ruling in Justice and Equity, "and professing and cherishing the holy and eternal Truth." To the general Degeneracy, breaking in upon us from so many Quarters, your Majesty has uniformly opposed, as well in the Bosom of your Royal Family, as in every Part of your public Conduct and Deportment, the Example of your Life, in an habitual Veneration for our Holy Religion and all its Ordinances, and in those blameless and decorous Manners that add Lustre even to your Majesty's exalted Station; and when an impious Conspiracy had been formed in the Heart of Europe to extinguish the Religion of Christ, and revive among the Nations of the World the fatal Excesses from which that Religion had so generally rescued them, in your Majesty's unshaken Adherence to its Doctrines and Precepts, and in the Vigor and Energy which, relying on the Divine Promises, you have persevered in opposing to all the mad Efforts of its Enemies, not only your Majesty's Subjects, but the Kingdoms around you, have hitherto found their Defence and Safety.

With these Sentiments deeply impressed upon our Hearts, could we, the Ministers of Religion, be silent, while all the other Orders of the State, croud round your Majesty's Throne with their Thanksgivings and their Prayers on this renewed Instance of the Divine Protection?—Long may your Majesty experience the Continuance of that Protection in yourself and in your Royal House! As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesty King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending

or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brads, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again; he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

If any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Côt-

ton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils, used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

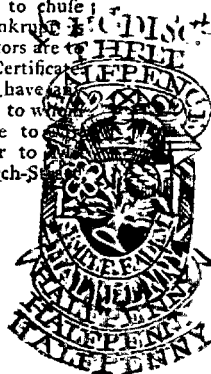
