The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twelfth of February last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next: and whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twelfth Day of August next, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store; or ship or lade any of the Articles abovementioned on-board any Ship or Vessel, in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or his Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2.; and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Chap. 34, any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of June last to the contrary notwithstanding: and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

*Copy of a Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K. B. Admiral of the White, &c. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship Royal George, at Sea, the 4th Instant.*

SIR,

I Did not think the Enterprize of Sir Edward Hamilton or of Captain Campbell could have been rivalled until I read the enclosed Letter from Sir Edward Pellew, relating the desperate Service performed by acting Lieutenant Coghlan, of the Viper Cutter, on the 29th July; which has filled me with Pride and Admiration; and although the Circumstance of his not having completed his Time in His Majesty's Navy operates at present against his receiving the Reward he is most ambitious of obtaining, I am persuaded the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will do all in their Power to console him under his severe Wounds, and grant him Promotion the Moment he is in a Capacity to receive it.

MY LORD,

I Have true Pleasure in stating to your Lordship the good Conduct of Lieutenant Jeremiah Coghlan, to whom, for former gallant Behaviour, you had given an acting Commission to command the Viper Cutter, from this Ship.

This gallant young Man, when watching Port Louis, thought he could succeed in boarding some of the Cutters or Gun-Vessels which have been moving about the Entrance of that Harbour, and for this Purpose he entreated a Ten-oared Cutter from me, with Twelve Volunteers; and on Tuesday Night the 29th Instant he took this Boat, with Mr. Silas H. Paddon, Midshipman, and Six of his Men, making, with himself, Twenty, and accompanied by his own Boat and One from the Amethyst, he determined upon boarding a Gun Brig mounting Three long Twenty-four-Pounders, and Four Six-Pounders, full of Men, moored with Springs on her Cables, in a Naval Port of difficult



Access, within Pistol-Shot of Three Batteries, surrounded by several Armed Craft, and not a Mile from a Seventy-four and Two Frigates bearing an Admiral's Flag. Undismayed by such formidable Appearances, the early Discovery of his Approach, (for they were at Quarters,) and the lost Aid of the Two other Boats, he bravely determined to attack alone, and boarded her on the Quarter; but unhappily, in the Dark, jumping into a Trawl-Net hung up to dry, he was pierced through the Thigh by a Pike, and several of his Men hurt, and all knocked back into the Boat.

Unchecked in Ardour, they hauled the Boat further a-head, and again boarded, and maintained against Eighty-seven Men, Sixteen of whom were Soldiers, an obstinate Conflict, killing Six and wounding Twenty, among whom was every Officer belonging to her. His own loss One killed and Eight wounded; himself in Two Places, Mr. Paddon in Six. I feel particularly happy in the expected Safety of all the Wounded. He speaks in the highest Terms of Mr. Paddon and the Whole of his Party, many of whom were knocked overboard, and Twice beat into the Boat, but returned to the Charge with unabated Courage. I trust I shall stand excused by your Lordship for so minute a Description, produced by my Admiration of that Courage which, Hand to Hand, gave Victory to a Handful of brave Fellows over Four Times their Number; and of that Skill which formed, conducted, and effected so daring an Enterprize.

Le Cerbère, commanded by a Lieutenant de Vaisseau, and towed out under a very heavy Fire, is given up as a Prize by the Squadron to mark their Admiration, and will not, I know, be the only Reward of such Bravery; they will receive that Protection your Lordship so liberally accords to all the young Men in the Service who happily distinguish themselves under your Command.

I enclose Lieutenant Coghlan's Letter, and have the Honor, &c.

DEAR SIR,

I Have succeeded in bringing out the Gun Brig Le Cerbère, of Three Guns Twenty-four Pounders and Four Six-Pounders, and Eighty-seven Men, commanded by a Lieutenant de Vaisseau. Pray forgive me when I say from under the Batteries of Port Louis, and after a most desperate Resistance being made, first by her, and afterwards by the Batteries at both Sides, and a Fire from some small Vessels which lay round her; but nothing that I could expect from a Vessel lying in that inactive Situation, was equal to the few brave Men belonging to your Ship, whom I so justly confided in, assisted by Six Men from the Cutter, and Mr. Paddon, Midshipman, who; I am sorry to say was wounded in several Places, though I hope not mortally. I am sorry to state the Loss of one Man belonging to the Cutter, who was shot through the Head, and Four of your brave Men, with myself, wounded in different Parts of the Body: the principal one I received was with a Pike which penetrated my Left

Thigh. Mr. Patteshall in the Cutter's small Boat, assisted with Two Midshipmen from the Amethyst in one of their Boats. The Loss of the Enemy is not yet ascertained owing to the Confusion.

THIS Day His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Bryan Connor, Yeoman Usher of the

Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend His Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Excellency gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a further Supply out of the Consolidated Fund to be applied to the Purposes therein-mentioned, and for raising by Loan the several Sums therein-mentioned.

An Act for granting to His Majesty Excise Duties on Foreign Wines in His Majesty's Stores, or in the Stores or Warehouses of Dealers in, or Retailers of Wine, at the Time therein-mentioned, and for granting further Duties on Spirits distilled, and on Sweets or Made Wines made in Ireland.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Five Hundred Thousand Pounds for promoting Inland Navigation in Ireland, and for the other Purposes therein-mentioned, and for authorising the raising of the said Sum by Loan.

An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland.

An Act for granting Allowances to Bodies Corporate and Individuals, in Respect to those Cities, Towns, and Boroughs, which shall cease to send any Member to Parliament after the Union, and to make Compensation to those Persons whose Offices may thereby be discontinued or diminished in Value.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant Annuities to the Lord High Chancellor, and to the Judges of the Court of King's-Bench, Master of the Rolls, Judges of the Courts of Common Pleas and Exchequer, Judge or Commissary of the Court of Prerogative, the Judge of the Court of Admiralty, the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions of the County of Dublin, and Assistant Barristers of the several other Counties, on the Resignation of their respective Offices, and to amend an Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of his present Majesty, intituled An Act for encreasing the Salaries of the Chief and other Judges of the Courts of King's-Bench and Common-Pleas, and of the Chief Baron and other Barons of the Court of Exchequer in this Kingdom.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant certain Annuities to the Right Honorable John Monck Mason, and to the Earls of Athlone and Roscommon, and to the Lord Baron Aylmer, in Manner therein-mentioned.

An Act for granting certain Annuities to the Officers and Attendants of both Houses of Parliament, whose Offices and Attendance shall cease after the Union, or whose Offices shall be diminished in Value thereby.

An Act to continue and amend an Act, intituled An Act to restrain the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Inland Bills of Exchange under a limited Sum, passed in the last Session of Parliament.

An Act for amending an Act passed in this Kingdom in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in Ireland.

An Act for amending an Act passed this Session of Parliament, intituled An Act to prohibit the making of Malt and distilling of Spirits in this Kingdom for a limited Time.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Thirty-fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for regulating the Election of Members to serve in Parliament, and for repealing the several Acts therein mentioned; and to explain and amend an Act passed in the Thirty-seventh Year of said Reign, intituled An Act for the further Regulation of the Election of Members to serve in Parliament.

An Act for the better Regulation of Trials by Jury in the Court of King's Bench, Common Pleas, and Exchequer during Term, and in the Sittings after Term.

An Act for amending and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the Thirty-seventh Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to prevent the vexatious impounding of Cattle for Trespas or Damage feasant, and for the effectual preserving of Mears and Fences.
