THE King has been pleased to grant unto Andrew Hawes Dyne, of Gore-Court, near Sittingbourne, in the County of Kent, Esq; his Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue may assume and take the Surname of Bradley, instead of that of Dyne, out of respect to the Memory of his Brother-in-Law James Bradley, Esq; deceased, late Assistant-Secretary to the Right Honourable the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India: and to order that His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in his College of Arms.

MEMORANDUM.

The Appointment of Captain Samuel Fairtlough, from the 63d Foot, to be Major, without Purchase, in the 64th Regiment of Foot, vice Boswell, promoted in the 63d Foot, as stated in the Gazette, 19th Instant, has not taken place.

Whitehall, August 26, 1800.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-

tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of



His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boar, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Escoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools,

prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

*W*hereas it has been humbly represented to His Majesty that in the Night of Thursday the 24th of July last, or early in the Morning of Friday the 25th, the Custom House at the Port of Milford, in the County of Pembroke, was feloniously broken open by some Person or Persons, who, by Means of a Ladder which they cut down from the Roof of an adjacent Building, got in at the Window of the Comptroller's Office, and forced open the Desks of the Collector and Comptroller with a Sawyer's Axe, and stole thereout Cash and a Number of Five Guinea Bills issued from the Banks of Carmarthen and Haverfordwest, amounting together to the Sum of Three Hundred and Sixty-four Pounds and upwards, and One Bill drawn by William Pownall of Bristol, at One Month after Date, on Messrs. Goobehere, Wigan, and Co. London, for the Sum of Thirty-six Pounds, in Favor of George Hough, the Collector of the Customs at the said Port of Milford; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of the said Offenders who shall first discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so that any One or more of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause and procure to be discovered and apprehended, any One or more of the said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver-General of the Customs upon Conviction.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on the Morning of Tuesday the 5th Instant, between Twelve and One o'Clock, a Fire was discovered in a Wood adjoining the House of Mr. John Needham, situate at Bickham, by which several Ricks of Wood, &c. were entirely consumed, and that there is every Reason to believe the same was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some evil-minded Person or Persons unknown :

And whereas it has also been represented to the King, that on Thursday the 7th Instant, an Inflammatory Paper threatening the Life of the said Mr. Needham, was picked up at the Gate leading to his said House ;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the Persons concerned in setting fire to the said Wood, and writing such Inflammatory Paper, is humbly pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Person who actually set fire to the beforementioned Wood or wrote the said Paper,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. **PORTLAND.**

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS is hereby offered to any of them who shall discover the Person who set fire to the said Wood, and the further Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person concerned in writing the said Paper, (except as is before excepted,) to be paid on the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders, by **John Needham.**

INDENTURES OF APPRENTICESHIP, MADE UPON IMPROPER STAMPS, RENDERED VALID.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, Aug. 16, 1800.

HIS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties do hereby give Notice, that, by a Clause in an Act of the last Session of Parliament, Cap. 84, it is enacted, for Remedy of the Inconvenience which has arisen and may arise to Masters and Mistresses of Apprentices, and also to Apprentices, in respect to Indentures of Apprenticeship made for the binding Poor Children and others, which have through Mistake or Inadvertency been executed upon Stamps of a different Denomination and Value than required by the several Acts relating to the Stamp Duties, and therefore are not valid or binding on any of the Parties thereto, that, upon Payment on or before the 1st Day of January 1801, of the FULL RATE OR DUTY payable on any such Indenture ; or on the Production at

this Office of any Indenture of Apprenticeship, where the same shall have been stamped with any Stamp of a higher Value, though of a different Denomination than is required by Law ; and rendering the same to be stamped to the proper Office at the said Office, every such Indenture shall be stamped without Payment of any Penalty whatever ; and being so stamped with the proper Stamp, (whether done during the Time mentioned therein, or after the Expiration thereof,) shall thereupon be good and valid, and the Persons who have incurred any Penalty by such Neglect or Omission, are indemnified against the same, except only in such Cases where any Prosecution shall be now depending.
