I take this opportunity to write these few lines as I think they may be of service to you but take me neither for friend nor foe but it is to inform you that if you do not quit this town or alter your perceeding you may depend upon it that there is a conspiracy against you to take away your Life and I am one who has been of the Gang but nothing will I do in it and you may depend upon it that nothing no nothing shall make me devulge the secret as I think it would not be a mis if you was dead but I dont hold with the murder of any Man but to tell you the Truth of my mind I Dont think it will end with your Death because there is two or three more in the town that will suffer the same fate but they are your companions therefore you may acquaint them of the Matter There is but one Gentleman in the Town and that is your Master and he you will spoil soon so no more at present from yours and unknown and will allway remain so.

This Letter was put into the Post-Office at Watford, addressed,
