That the same gracious Being who has so providentially preserved, may as mercifully protract your Majesty's Existence to the latest Period; and, when your earthly one is to be finally exchanged for a Crown of Glory, that the former may descend to remotest Ages through the long Line of your august Posterity; is the united, the incessant Prayer of your faithful Clergy and their respective Congregations, who are devoted to your Majesty, your illustrious Family, and your auspicious Government, by every Bond of Allegiance, Principle of Attachment, and Motive of Religion.

The humble Address of the President, Council, and Assembly, and of the Inhabitants at large of His Majesty's most ancient Colony of Barbadoes.

May that Providence, whose merciful Interposition thus graciously vouchsafed to us on this eventful Occasion, we acknowledge with the humblest and devoted Gratitude, continue to your Majesty his Divine Favor and Protection, and long preserve a Life so essential to the Prosperity of your Subjects, and so important to the sacred Interests of Virtue and Religion.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

Impressed with the most unbounded Gratitude to the Almighty for His Divine Interposition in averting the late diabolical and traitorous Attempt on the sacred Person of your Majesty, and warmly participating in the general Joy diffused throughout your Majesty's Dominions in its Defeat, we your Majesty's most faithful, loyal, and dutiful Subjects, the Merchants, Planters, and other Residents in the Island of Trinidad, beg Leave to lay the Homage of our most fervent Congratulations thereon at your Majesty's Feet.

Unalterably attached, by Principle and Duty, to your Majesty and your illustrious House, every Event hostile to the Peace and Happiness of any of your august Family, cannot fail of exciting our Concern, and affecting our most active Feelings. What then must be our Indignation and Horror, when the Dæmon of Treason rears its baneful Shaft at the Life of our Father, Protector, and Friend!

That the same merciful and omnipotent Providence may continue to watch over a Life so justly dear to us all; and that your Majesty may long reign over a brave, loyal, happy, and grateful People, is the ardent Prayer of, Sir, &c.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that several inflammatory and treasonable Hand-Bills were found posted up in different Parts of the Town of Wigan, in the County of Lancaster, on the Morning of Thursday the 18th Instant; and on the following Night a Letter, addressed "To the Justices of the Borough of Wigan as bold Ad as Jusinses but does not" was thrust under the Door of the Dwelling-House
