The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously plcased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers em-ployed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of Echanica. Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged

T the Court at St. James's, the 15th of October; and it being judged expedient for His October 1800. Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves

Y the Lord Nelson Cutter I have this Day received the enclosed Letter from Captain Knight, of His Majesty's Ship Montague, detailing a very meritorious Piece of Service performed by the Boats of that Ship and of the Magnificent; and Lieutenant Percy informs me that, on the ist Instant, in the Lord Nelson, he captured and burnt a Sloop from Camaret bound to Bourdeaux, laden with empty Calks; and on Monday last drove on Shore, under a Battery, Three Brigs and Three Sloops apparently empty, which had made their Escape from within the Penmarks during the late Gales of Wind.

MY LORD, Montague, at Sea, Ott. 13, 1800. O'N returning Westward Yesterday before L'Orient, I saw at Noon a small Convoy of Brigs, Sloops, &c. taking Resuge in Port Danenne, which I approached and prepared the Armed Boats of the Two Ships to attack, and while placing this Ship to cover them, dispatched the Montague's Boats under the Direction of Lieutenants Byfett and Knight, who were followed and ably supported by those of the Magnificent, in which were Lieutenants Dunlop and Griffiths, who, notwithstanding and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant | the Fire kept up from Two of the Vessels who were

armed, and a Battery firing Round and Grape, (under which the Vessels lay touching the Ground,) they boarded, took ! offession, and brought out Eleven Vessels, and burnt One; another had been sunk by the Enemy's Shot, leaving only One, whose Situation in the Creek would not admit of getting

This little Piece of Service, completely and expeditionly performed with the Loss only of One Seaman killed and Two wounded of the Montague, and One of the latter of the Magnificent, has won my Approbation, and I trust will merit your Lordship's. On this Duty Lieutenants Alexander, Montgomerie, Mitchell, and Jordan, of the Marines, were employed, as was Lieutenant Samarin, of the Russian Navy, who volunteered his Service, all entitled to Applaule, as were the Seamen and Marines for their regular and spirited Conduct.

Have to acquaint your Lordship, that on the 1st Instant, in His Majesty's Sloop under my Command, Thirty Leagues to the Westward of Corsica, after a Chace of Two Hours, I captured a French National Polacre called La Capriciense, commanded by Citizen Gandferrand, Enseigne de Vaisseau, mounting Six Guns, manned with Sixtyeight Men, was victualled for Two Months, had left Toulon Three Days, and was bound to

Egypt.
She had on board Three Hundred and Fifty Stand of Arms, a Quantity of Shot, a French General, and a Chef de Bataillon; but the Dispatches (except the Two Letters I have the Honor to enclose) were destroyed before I boarded her.

Have the Honor to transmit, for your Lordship's Information, a List of Vessels destroyed, captured, and recaptured during the late Cruize of His Majesty's Ship under my Command: Deux Amis Spanish Letter of Marque, Four Guns and Twenty-seven Men, from Vera Cruz to St Andero, burnt in the Harbour of St. Vincent; captured El Beloz, Spanish Packet, Four Guns and Thirty Men, from the Havannah to Corunna; La Rose French Schooner, from Bourdeaux to Guadaloupe; and La Magicienne French Schooner, from Senegal to Bourdeaux; recaptured the Dick Guineaman, of Liverpool, taken by the Grand Decide Privateer, at this Time the Fifgard was in Sight, who, I apprehend, captured the latter about Two Hours after.
