The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS Information hath been received that an Fpidemic Fever is now raging in the Town of Norfolk, in Virginia, and at Baltimore, in Maryland, within the United States of America; His Majesty deeming the said Fever to be probably infectious, doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, deem it expedient to declare, and by this His Order doth declare, that the faid Fever is probably infectious within the Meaning of the Act passed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to " amend Two Acts made in the Twenty-fixth "Year of King George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His prefent Majesty, " respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c." And doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships, Veffels, Perfons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, which, fince the first Day of this instant November have arrived, or which shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports of Virginia or Maryland, (not having any Person or Persons on board the same actually ill of the said Fever,) do perform a Quarantine of Fourteen Days at the feveral Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentyninth of July last, for Performance of Quarantine by all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, and arriving with clean Bills of Health; and in case any of the Crew or Passengers on board any such Ship or Vessel, which, fince the faid first Day of November has arrived, or which hereafter shall arrive in any of the Poets of this Kingdom or the Islands of

any of the faid Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, shall have died of the said Fever during the Course of the Voyage, the Clothes and all personal Effects which are susceptible of Infection, worn by or be\_ longing to fuch Person, shall be forthwith burned or funk in deep Water; but if fuch Clothes and Effects shall not be so burned or destroyed, the said Ship or Vessel, with the Whole of her Cargo and Crew, shall not be permitted to perform Quarantine at any Port or Place except at Standgate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place at which the same has arrived or shall arrive as aforesaid, and shall repair to Standgate Creek and there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere: And His Majesty is further pleased to order, with the Advice aforefaid, and it is hereby ordered, that if it shall appear, upon the Arrival of any Ship or Vessel from any of the said Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, that any of the Crew or Passengers belonging to the same are actually ill of the faid Fever, then such Ship or Vessel, and the Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, on board the fame, shall not be permitted to perform Quarantine at any Port or Place except Standgate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place, and to proceed immediately to Standgate Creek in order to perform Quarantine, and shall there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors of Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the faid Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

#### PROCLAMATION,

Containing His Majesty's Declaration, That it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; and commanding the faid Lords and Commons to give their Attendance accordingly.

7 HEREAS by the Fourth Article of the Articles of the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, as the fame are ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, the other passed in the Parliament of Ireland, also intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, to have Force and Effect from the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred

and one, it is previded, that if We, on or before the faid First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, on which Day the Union is to take place as aforefaid, should declare, under the Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the prefent Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; then the faid Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should accordingly be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the faid United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain: And whereas it is Our Intention to appoint Thursday the Twenty second Day of January next ensuing for the assembling of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, by Proclamation under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom; We-do judge it to be expedient, that the Lords and Commons of the prefent Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain: And We do, purfuant to the faid Articles of Union, and to the Acts of Parliament ratifying and confirming the fame, hereby declare, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the prefent Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; and the Lords and Commons of the prefent Parliament of Great Britain are accordingly to be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain: And the faid Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, are hereby required and commanded to take Notice thereof, and to give their Attendance accordingly, at Weltminster, on the faid Twentyfecond Day of January next enfuing.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Keith, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepeut, Esq; dated on board the Foudroyant, at Gibraltar, the-29th Ultimo.

SIR,

Have just received a Letter, of which the enclosed is a Copy, from Captain Morris, acquainting me with the Capture of a Spanish Vessel of War by the Boats of the Phaeton, under Circumstances very highly creditable to Lieutenant Beaufort, and the Officers and People who were employed on the Occasion. I regret with him the Lois and Injury which has been sustained in the Attack, but I anticipate with equal Satisfaction the Approbation with which I am fure their Lordships will regard the Gallantry that has been evinced in the Execution of the Enterprize.

Phaeton, off Malaga, 28th October 1800.

MY LORD, Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that on the 25th Instant, His Majesty's Ship under my Command chased a Ship Polacre, which shewed Spanish Colours, Ensign and Pendant, to an Anchor under the Fortress of Fangerolle, where a French Privateer Brig also took Refuge; as the Wind was on Shore, and they were close into the Surf, and directly under a Battery of Five heavy Guns, there was no Prospect of bringing them off then; the following Night the Brig escaped to the Westward, and the Ship made Two Attempts for Malaga, but was driven back; last Night the Land Breeze appearing favourable, I fent the Boats under the Command of Lieutenant Francis Beaufort, who, at Five o'Clock this Morning, in Opposition to a very obstinate Resistance on first boarding at the Hatchways with Musketry, and from the rifing Quarter-Deck, with Sabres, got Possession, and brought her out; she proves His Most Catholic Majesty's Armed Ship the San Josef alias L'Aglies, mounting Two Twenty-four Pounders Iron Ordnance in the Bow, Two Brass Eighteens for Stern Chace, Four Brass Twelves, and Six Four-Pounders, and most completely found in small Arms of all Kinds, commanded by an Auxiliary Officer of the Navy, and manned with Forty-nine Seamen, (of which Fifteen were absent in her Boat,) and Twenty-two Soldiers as Marines, employed as a Packet, and carrying Provisions between Malaga and Melila: From the Force of the Ship, her State of Preparation, and Situation with Respect to the Fort, also the unfortunate Circumstance of the Launch, (from whose Carronade much was expected in the Plan for the Attack,) having not been able to keep up with the other Boats, and being distant when they were discovered and fired on by a French Privateer Schooner that had come in unseen by us in the Night, and was placed to flank the Ship, and gave the Alarm, on which the Barge and Two Cutters immediately pulled to the Ship and boarded; I am convinced more determined Bravery could not have been displayed than has been shewn by Lieutenants Beaufort and Huish, Lieutenant Duncan Campbell of the Marines, Messrs. Hamilton and Stanton, Midshipmen, and Mr. Deagon the Gunner, and the Boat's Crew employed upon the Service; and it is with extreme Concern I add, that one Seaman was killed on coming alongfide, and that their very gallant Leader (in whom I have ever found a most capable and zealous Assistant) was first wounded in the Head, and afterwards received feveral Slugs through his Left Arm and Body; Lieutenant Campbell received feveral slight Sabre Wounds; Mr. Augustus Barrington Hamilton was shot, while in the Boat, through the Thigh, notwithstanding which he boarded, and his Conduct is highly spoken of; and John Wells a Seaman, also shot through the Thigh: The Loss of the Enemy appears to have been Thirteen Wounded, Six badly, and fome are supposed to have been wounded and driven overboard.

I give your Lordship the Detail of this Service, feeling it incumbent on me to do so, to do Justice to the Parties employed upon it, humbly hoping that Mr. Beaufort's Conduct and Wounds will entitle him to the Protection given in the present War to Officers of distinguished Merit; and I regret exceedingly that Mr. Hamilton wants some considerable Part of his Servitude, as he is of an Age and in all other Respects well qualified for a Lieutenant.

Towards Day-light, the Signal being made to me that our People were in full Possession of the Prize, I chased a Vessel that had passed us an Hour before, and brought her to, under a Battery, in Cape Moleno. She proves a light Polacre, from Ceuta bound for Malaga. Afterwards, running down to pick up our Boats and People, we were carried so tar to Leeward, that the French Schooner (which we had not seen from the Ship) passed to Windward along Shore to Malaga, quite out of our Reach.
