A PROCLAMATION,

Containing His Majesty's Declaration, That it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; and commanding the said Lords and Commons to give their Attendance accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Fourth Article of the Articles of the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, as the same are ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, the other passed in the Parliament of Ireland, also intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, to have Force and Effect from the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, it is provided, that if We, on or before the said First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, on which Day the Union is to take place as aforesaid, should declare, under the Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; then the said Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should accordingly be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the said United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain: And whereas it is Our Intention to appoint Thursday the Twenty-second Day of January next ensuing for the assembling of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, by Proclamation under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom; We do judge it to be expedient, that the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain: And We do, pursuant to the said

Articles of Union, and to the Acts of Parliament ratifying and confirming the same, hereby declare, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; and the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain are accordingly to be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain: And the said Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, are hereby required and commanded to take Notice thereof, and to give their Attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Twenty-second Day of January next ensuing.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the Fifth Day of November One thousand eight hundred, in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS Information hath been received that an Epidemic Fever is now raging in the Town of Norfolk, in Virginia, and at Baltimore, in Maryland, within the United States of America; His Majesty deeming the said Fever to be probably infectious, doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, deem it expedient to declare, and by this His Order doth declare, that the said Fever is probably infectious within the Meaning of the Act passed in the Thirty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to amend Two Acts made in the Twenty-sixth Year of King George the Second, and the Twenty-eighth Year of His present Majesty, respecting the Performance of Quarantine, &c." And doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, which, since the first Day of this instant November have arrived, or which shall hereafter



arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports of Virginia or Maryland, (not having any Person or Persons on board the same actually ill of the said Fever,) do perform a Quarantine of Fourteen Days at the several Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentieth of July last, for Performance of Quarantine by all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean; or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, and arriving with clean Bills of Health; and in case any of the Crew or Passengers on board any such Ship or Vessel, which, since the said first Day of November has arrived, or which hereafter shall arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the said Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, shall have died of the said Fever during the Course of the Voyage, the Clothes and all personal Effects which are susceptible of Infection, worn by or belonging to such Person, shall be forthwith burned or sunk in deep Water; but if such Clothes and Effects shall not be so burned or destroyed, the said Ship or Vessel, with the Whole of her Cargo and Crew, shall not be permitted to perform Quarantine at any Port or Place except at Standgate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place at which the same has arrived or shall arrive as aforesaid, and shall repair to Standgate Creek and there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere: And His Majesty is further pleased to order, with the Advice aforesaid, and it is hereby ordered, that if it shall appear, upon the Arrival of any Ship or Vessel from any of the said Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, that any of the Crew or Passengers belonging to the same are actually ill of the said Fever, then such Ship or Vessel, and the Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, on board the same, shall not be permitted to perform Quarantine at any Port or Place except Standgate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place, and to proceed immediately to Standgate Creek in order to perform Quarantine, and shall there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

We will wait but a short Time longer and if the same, down with old England, your neighbour Perry brings Corn and asks 26s a strike and declares he will not sell under, you will see his Building in Flames and him hanging

against his Door in a short time We have fixed upon him, and Bennet of Clarley, Smith of D° Lea of Ludfton as the first but Perry first. We hope your Ladyship will hear the cries of the poor who are glad to eat that which your Ladyships dogs will not. come to Hampton and see our Children picking Potato peerings of the Dunghill to boil for Food. We are starving in the midst of plenty—O hear our cries, and we will ever pray for you—let them sell out at small measure at their own Houses.
