Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that an anonymous threatening Letter has been sent to Lady Glyn, of Claverley, near Bridgenorth, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

We the poor distressed and half starv'd Tradesmen of W. Hampton Bilston lye Watte and other places do on our knees beg your Ladyship to compel your Tenants to sell Wheat at 10^s and Barley at 5 to mix for Bread. We have heard of the humanity your Ladyship is possess'd of, and several other Noblemen, which we have Petition'd to do the same, at the meeting of 20 distressed Tradesmen—We are 126 Thousand Men ready to take the Corn and what we can find if provisions are not lower'd and if you do not compel your Tenants to sell as above, expect to see your Buildings at all your Farms, in Flames, and the Tenant hung at his Door. We will wait but a short Time longer and if the same, down with old England, your neighbour Perry brings Corn and asks 26s a strike and declares he will not sell under, you will see his Building in Flames and him hanging against his Door in a short time We have fixed upon him, and Bennet of Clarley, Smith of D^r Lea of Ludston as the first but Perry first. We hope your Ladyship will hear the cries of the poor who are glad to eat that which your Ladyships dogs will not come to Hampton and see our Children picking Potato peelings of the Dughill to boil for Food. We are starving in the midst of plenty—O hear our cries, and we will ever pray for you—let them sell out at small measure at their own Houses.
