

Westminster, December 8, 1800.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One thousand eight hundred and one.

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty a Duty on Penions, Offices, and Personal Estates, in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, and certain Duties on Sugar, Malt, Tobacco, and Snuff, for the Service of the Year One thousand eight hundred and one.

An Act for suspending, until the Twentieth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and one, the Duties on Hops imported, and for charging other Duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to prohibit, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and two, the Use of Corn in distilling of Spirits, or making of Starch.

An Act for continuing, until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that shall be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn and other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, to the allowing the Use of Sugar in the brewing of Beer, to the reducing the Duties upon Spirits distilled from Molasses and Sugar, and to the prohibiting the making of Low Wines or Spirits from Wheat and certain other Articles, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act for shortening, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and one, the Time of keeping in Steep for malting Barley damaged by Rain in the late Harvest.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Twenty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor.

And One Private Act.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honorable William Pitt, John Smyth, and Charles Small Pybus, Esqrs. Granville Levison Gower, Esq; (commonly called Lord Granville Levison Gower;) and John Hiley Addington, Esq; to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to grant the Dignities of Viscount and Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Right Honorable Charles Sloane Lord Cadogan, and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style, and Title of Viscount Chelsea, in the County of Middlesex, and Earl Cadogan.

The King has also been pleased to grant the Dignities of Viscount and Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Right Honorable James Lord Malmesbury, Baron of Malmesbury, in the County of Wilts, Knight of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style, and Title of Viscount Fitz-Harris, of Hurn Court, in the County of Southampton, and Earl of Malmesbury.
