Naples, July 1.

Ur Vicercy has received Orders from Spain, to make a Levy of 4000 Men in this Kingdom, which will be accordingly taken in hand, so soon as the Moneys necessary for that Service, can be provided. We continue to have apprehenfions of the Turks, and therefore his E. cellency has fent Orders to the Governors of the Maritine Provinces, to keep very good Guards all along the Coast; and besid sthole, to have a number of Men in readiness, to be drawn into a Lody upon the first Allarm. All the care that has been hitherto had to Suppress the Banditi; not having had the desired Effect, the Viceroy is going to grant them a General Pardon, provided, they will come in and serve

the King four years for half pay.

Venice, July 13 Two of the Nobility having been Convicted of great Mildemeanors by them committed, in the exercise of the Publick Office they held, their Sentence is, That they shall be deprived of thrir Nobility, and of all the Honors and Priviledg's thereunto belonging; and as for some others, tha fled upon the first discovery of their Ci im is; the Senate has Declared, That if any Banditi can deliver them into the hands of Fustice, they shall have their Pardon. On Monday laft two Soldi rs were killed, and three others very much wounded with a flath of Lightning. From Constantinople they write, that the French Ambassador had not yet had Audie :ce of the Grand Vizier, who refused to receive him in the manner he demanded, to be due to his Character, and which had been always practized by this Grand Viziers Predecessors. The same Dispute was the occasion of the Amont that was put upon the last French Ambassador, who coming to an Audience of the Vizier, and finding the Chair set for him, not place as formerly, he bid his Servants remove it, in which they were not only hindred, but the Amb is sador himself was very ill Treated, and he was thereupon recalled home; and as we are told his Successor has Orders to insist, to have his Chair placed, as was practized heretofore, and to let the Vizier know, that the Honor of the King his Master cannot suffer that his Ambassador should be rereived with less Respect, than those of his Predeces-

Francfort, July 18. It has been reported these two or three days, that the Elector of Saxony is dead, though we cannot hear of any Letters that speak of it with certainty. The Imperial Court is now at Lintz, and will continue there till Winter. In Hungary things are at present in an ill posture; the Imperial Troops that are there, not being strong enough to make head against the Rebels, who are so far from submitting to the terms, which the Emperor is willing to grant them a Peace upon, that they grow every day more and more infolent, and by

their late incursions into Silesia, have put that Countrey into much fear. The states of Bavaria, Franconia, and Suabia, are now Assembled, and are endeavouring to fettle the affair of the Mint, purfuant to the Refolution taken in the Dyet of Ratuberne concerning it. The young Elector of Bavaria being entred upon the Government, many people expect it will be followed with confiderable al: terations at that Court. It is likewise believed, that the Imperial and French Mini ers will now renew the Proposals they formerly made, concerning his Marriage.

Berlin, July 2 1. Our Elector has given firich Orders, that no Person that comes from Silesia or Bobemia, shall be permitted to come into any place within his Territories, till he have first performed a Quarant in. Yesterday the Duke of Hanouers Minuter took his leave of his E ectoral Highne's, in order to his return home. We have a Account from Conningsberg, that five Frigats are fitting cut at the Pinam, by Order of our Elector, and that they are Bui ding a man of Warther, which will

Cologne, July 24. The Inhabitants of the Countrey of Juliers are endeavouring to comply with the Demands of the French, concerning the Arrears of Contributions, to avoid the execution, which they o herwise threaten them with. It is said; that the French Minister at Ratubonne has publickly Difowned the D claration which has been Printed and Published in several places of the Emp re, containing several conditions offered by the French King, in order to the choosing the Dauphin King of the Romans; which he says, have been invented by the Enemies of the King his Master, to weaken his Intereits, and to give the Princes a jealousie of his Designs.

Since the late unhappy Accident at Heulden, the Sieur Bieswick of Delft, and the Sieur Vander Burg of Gouda, have been deputed by the States to visit that place; and the Count de Horn who is Governor of it, has likewise been there; they being all returned, have made a Report of the deplorable Condition they found the place in, oc-casioned by Thunder and Lightning, which setting Fire to a great quantity of Powder that was in the Castle, blewit up, destroyed a great number of People, and ruined two Churches, with above half the Houses in the Town. The Sicur Moering, Envoye from this State to the King of Denmark will begin his Voyage thither within few days. The Prince having been present this morning in the Assembly of the States of Holland, Dined with Mr. Sidney, and is this evening gone back to Honflaerdike.

Brussels, Ju y 26. On Wednelday last arrived our Spanish Ordinary, which brought Letters of the fith Instant from Madrid; they tell us, that the Prince of Parma will not begin his journey from thence, till about the middle of September at soonest; That in the mean time, he had fent Orders hither, for the making three fine Coaches against his arrival: That on the 30th past, nineteen Jews had been burnt, by Sentence of the Inquintion; That Don Pedro d'Arragon, who is 76 years old, was going to Marry the Duke de Medina Celi's third Daughter, a Lady of Sixteen; and that in confideration of this Marriage, he had feth d on her, 5,000 Duckets a year for ever. The Duke de Villa Hermofa's Journey for Flanders is put off for some time; and some say, h.s Excellency will not go at all. The Duke d'Arschot, Governor of Haynault is come hither, to sollicite, as is faid, a Supply of Men and Ammunition for Mons, the Motions of the French Troops on that fide, keeping them there in a continual Allarm. Lieutenant-General Spaen is still here, but advances very flowly in his Negotiation.

St Omer, July 24. The 18th Instant, the King and the whole Court parted from Abbeville, Dined at Bernay, and Lodged at Montrevil, the Duke de Charolf, the Kings Lieutenant in Picardy, receiving their Majessies at the Gate of the Town, in the absence of the Duke d'Elbeuf who is Governor of it. The 19th their Majessies Dined at Neufchassel (where the Duke d' Aumont, Governor of the Boulenois, received them at the head of the Nobility) and Lodged at Bologne. The 20th they came to Calais, and parted again from thence the 22, and in the

Evening arrived here.

Paris, July 31. We are told that the Mareschal de Crequi has received Orders to go for Alface. People talk variously concerning the differences with the Court of Reme, which some say, are in a sair way of being Accommodated, and others the contrary. We suppose the Court to be now at Lille.

Plymouth, July 19. The 16th Instant arrived here the Barchetor of Topsham, in eight weeks from the Barbadoes, bound for Holland, with some other small Vessels.

Falmouth, Fuly 20. Yesterday put in here the Garland, bound with Soldiers from Ireland to Tangier, having received some dammage at Sea. This morning sailed from hence the Charles Gally to the Eastward, and this Evening the Swan Frigat: The Pearl Frigat
