WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board that the Epidemic Fever which some Time since raged in the Town of Norfolk, in Virginia, and at Baltimore, in Maryland, within the United States of America, has totally ceased; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade so far as may be consistent with the Safety of his Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twelfth of November last upon all Ships, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, which, since the First Day of the said Month of November had arrived, or which should thereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the Twelfth of November last had not been made; any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided such Ships and Vessels shall have sailed from the said Ports of Virginia, or Maryland subsequent to the Fourth Day of November last, and that none of the Crew or other Persons on board have died or been sick with the said Fever during the Course of the Voyage.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenants,

Governor and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

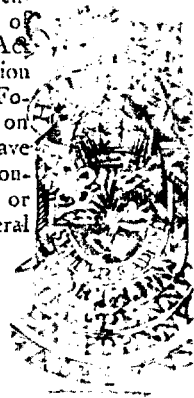

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn; and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament;" His Majesty, by his Order in Council bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, was pleased to prohibit, for the Term mentioned in the said Order, the Exportation, or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Vessel, with Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal, or Flour made thereof; such Prohibition to export not to extend to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Corn, or Meal, or Flour that should have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," and should not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Consumption; nor to prevent the carrying Coastwise, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several



Sorts of Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, from this Kingdom for any of the Purposes mentioned in the said Act: And whereas His Majesty, by his said Order in Council of the Sixteenth of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, thought fit further to order that it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse for Home Consumption any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever: And His Majesty was likewise pleased to order, that it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout: Provided always, that a due Entry should be made of all such Articles as aforesaid that should be so imported with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same should be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned: And whereas, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that shall be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation, and permitting the Importation of Corn and other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the allowing the Use of Sugar in the Brewing of Beer; to the reducing the Duties upon Spirits distilled from Melasses and Sugar; and to the prohibiting the making of Low Wines or Spirits from Wheat, and certain other Articles, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland;" the said several recited Acts, and all the Powers, Authorities, and Provisions therein contained, are continued as aforesaid; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Prohibition to export Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, and the said Permission to import, or take out of Warehouse, Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, and likewise to import certain other Articles of Provision, as expressed in the said Order of the Sixteenth Day of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, with every Exception, proviso, Rule, Regulation, and Restriction specified in the said Order respecting such Exportation, Importation, or taking out of Warehouse; and all Matters and Things in the said Order contained, shall be and continue in

Force until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that shall be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to authorise His Majesty from Time to Time to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, from Time to Time to prohibit for a Time to be limited in such Order, either generally or particularly, and by Name or Description, the Exportation from this Kingdom of all or any Sort of Provision or Victual, or any Article or Articles whatsoever used, or which may be used as Food by Man, under such Restrictions and Regulations as His Majesty in Council shall think proper; and in like Manner from Time to Time to recall such Order in Part, or in the Whole, or make such Alteration therein as he shall think proper; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Act, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until the first Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export, or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Butter, Cheese, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulse of any Sort, Barley hulled or Pearl Barley; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit at any Time the Exportation or carrying out of such and so much of any such Provisions, Victuals, and other Articles of Food as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel on its Voyage out and Home for the Sustenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others, or for the Use and Sustenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board of such Ship or Vessel, or for victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships or Vessels in His Majesty's Service, or for victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons, or to prohibit at any Time the Exportation to the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or for the Use of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain, or to prohibit the Exportation of any of the Articles above-mentioned to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations, or the Town of Gibraltar, provided Proof is made to the Satisfaction of

the Commissioners of the Customs that the Articles so exported are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; or to prohibit at any Time any Person or Persons from shipping or putting on board any Provisions, Victuals, or other Articles of Food as aforementioned, to be carried Coastwise (that is to say) from any Port, Creek or Member, or Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain to any other Port, Creek, Member, or Part of the same respectively, having such or the like Coast Sufferance, Cocquet, or other Coast Dispatch for that Purpose; and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the same as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts required in relation to the carrying Coastwise any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly:

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS an Address has been presented to Us by Our Two Houses of Parliament, requesting Us to issue Our Royal Proclamation, recommending to all such Persons as have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food the greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: We, having taken the said Address into Consideration, and being persuaded that the Prevention of all unnecessary Consumption of Corn will furnish one of the surest and most effectual Means of alleviating the present Pressure, and of providing for the necessary Demands of the Year, have, therefore, in pursuance of the said Address, and out of Our tender Concern for the Welfare of Our People, thought fit (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, most earnestly exhorting and charging all those of Our loving Subjects who have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food than Corn, as they tender their own immediate Interests, and feel for the Wants of others, to practise the greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: And We do, for this Purpose, more particularly exhort and charge all Masters of Families to reduce the Consumption of Bread in their respective Families, by at least One-Third of the Quantity consumed in ordinary Times, and in no Case to suffer the same to exceed One Quarter Loaf for each Person in each Week; to abstain from the Use of Flour in Pastry, and, moreover, carefully to restrict the Use thereof in all other Articles than Bread: And do also, in like Manner, exhort and charge all Persons who keep Horses, especially Horses for Pleasure, as far as their respective Circumstances will admit, carefully to restrict the Consumption of Oats and other Grain or the Subsistence of the same. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, within the Kingdom of Great Britain, to read, or cause to be read, Our said Proclamation, on the Lord's

Day, for Two successive Weeks after receiving the said Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Third Day of December One thousand eight hundred, in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

Extra of a Letter from William Wickham, Esq; to the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, dated Head-Quarters, Amberg, 30th November 1800.

ON the 28th, after I had written my Dispatch from Eggenfenden, the Head-Quarters were removed to Massing on the Rodt.

The Head-Quarters were last Night at Neumark, and arrived here this Day about Twelve o'Clock; the Roads being still in a most dreadful State, a great Part of the Army is still behind.

On the Archduke's Arrival here, he found the Enemy in Force on the Heights immediately in Front of the Town.

The Tête de Pont of Wasserbourg was attacked Yesterday, and the Enemy repulsed with some Loss, after having entered the Abbatis in Front of the Work.

Head-Quarters, Haag, 2d December 1800.

MY LORD,

I Have the Honor to send your Lordship the enclosed Copy of a Report I have this Day received from His Serene Highness the Prince of Condé, containing an Account of the Attack which the Enemy made Yesterday on a Part of His Serene Highness's Corps, commanded by the Duke of Enghien, in Front of Rosenheim.

Account of the Action at Rosenheim, on the 1st of December 1800.

OUR Advanced Posts, on the Left Side of the Inn, were attacked this Day at Noon; their Right had been absolutely uncovered for Three Days past, and the Enemy was already on the Banks on that Side of the River; the Advanced Posts, commanded by the Duke d'Enghien, were engaged upwards of Four Hours, disputing the Ground Inch by Inch; the whole Corps was not assembled on the Right Side of the Inn before Five o'Clock. A pretty strong Column of the Enemy having marched out of the Town, it was allowed to advance till within the proper Distance, when the Prince of Condé ordered all the Batteries to fire upon it at once; this Fire, well directed and well sustained, compelled the Column to retreat into the Town immediately. Lieutenant-Colonel de Sartige, of the Engineers, protected by the Fire of the Artillery, broke down the Bridge, but in such a Manner as that it could promptly be re-established, if, as it is hoped, it should be necessary.

Our Loss is very small; that of the Enemy must have been more considerable. An Artillery Man was wounded by the Side of the Duke d'Angoulême. No Officers are known as yet to have been wounded, except Mr. de Vaffé, Adjutant to the Duke d'Angoulême, and the Engineer de Castré.

December 1800.*

MY LORD,

THE March of General Kienmayer towards the Iser, and the Direction which the whole Army had first taken towards Landshut, having drawn a considerable Part of General Moreau's Force towards Aerding, the Heights between Ampfing and Haag had been occupied by one single Division under General Ney.

In the Course of last Night, however, General Moreau had reinforced his Position with Two more Divisions, and had taken the Command of the Whole himself.

Yesterday at Day-break the Heights were attacked. After an obstinate Resistance on the Part of the Enemy, they were carried in Succession as far as the Hill on the Side of Ramfau, where the Troops were obliged to halt, from excessive Fatigue, about Six in the Evening.

In the Night General Moreau abandoned this Place, and retired to his old Position at Hohenlinden and Aerding.

The whole Ground from Ampfing to Ramfau was particularly favorable to the Enemy, and consisted in Heights covered with Thick Woods, and intersected by deep marshy Vallies, where the Austrian Cavalry could not possibly act.

The Austrians took Eight Hundred Prisoners and Two Pieces of Cannon—the Cannon were taken with Four others, by the Hussars of Vecsey, who distinguished themselves very much during the whole of the Affair, throwing themselves into the Woods, in Places where it was thought impossible for Cavalry to have penetrated. The other Four Pieces of Cannon were retaken by a Charge of the Enemy's Grenadiers, there not having been Time to send a sufficient Force to support the Hussars.

The Loss of the Austrians is computed to be near Fifteen Hundred Men in killed, wounded, and Prisoners. General Moreau is said by the Prisoners to have received a Musket Ball through his Cloak.

The Archduke was on Horseback Twelve Hours, and slept in a Hovel on the Heights.

I Enclose, for their Lordships' Information, a Letter which I have received from Captain Lukin, of His Majesty's Ship Thames, giving an Account of the Vessels captured during his late Cruise.

MY LORD,

I Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship with the Arrival of His Majesty's Ship I command at this Anchorage; and of her having on the 30th of last Month captured, Fifteen Leagues from the Tower of Corduan, after a Chace of Six Hours, a French Brig Privateer called L'Astif, of Fourteen Six-Pounders, Two long Brads Twelves, and One Hundred and Thirty-seven Men: She is a particularly fine new Vessel, Coppered, and had been out only One Day on her first Cruise. I learn from the Prisoners that only Two English Vessels have been carried into any of the French or Spanish Ports within these Three Months; that One of them was carried into Rochelle, the other into Passage. I conclude Captain Hotham will have acquainted you of our having captured on the 29th of October last, at Night, a Schooner Letter of Marque, from Guadaloupe to Bourdeaux, laden with Coffee, &c. having chased her, in Company with the Immortalité, all Day.
