The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council. 7 HEREAS it has been reprefented to His Majefty at this Board that the Epidemic Fever which fome Time fince raged in the Town of Norfolk, in Virginia, and at Baltimore, in Maryland, within the United States of America, has totally ceafed; His Majefty, taking the fame into Confideration, and being defirous to remove all Reftraints upon Trade fo far as may be contiftent with the Safety of his Subjects, is pleafed, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine laid by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 'Fwelfth of November laft upon all Ships, Perfons, Goods, and Merchandizes, which, fince the First Day of the faid Month of November had arrived, or which should thereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Illes of Guernfey, Jerfcy, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Posts of Virginia or of Maryland, be taken off; and that all fuch Ships and Veffels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpack. ing, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in cafe fuch Order of the Twelfth of November last had not been made; any Thing in the faid Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided fuch Ships and Veffels shall have failed from the faid Ports of Virginia, or Maryland fubfequent to the Fourth Day of November last, and that none of the Crew or other Perfons on board have died or been fick with the faid Fever during the Courfe of the Voyage.-And the Right Honorable, the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenaat-

Governor and the reft of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majefty's Secretary at War; and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the faid refpective Ifles of Guara. fey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to giv neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpretively appertain. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in purfuance of the Powers W vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act for enabling His Majelty to pro-" hibit the Exportation and permit the Importa-" tion of Corn ; and for allowing the Importation " of other Articles of Provision without Payment " of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks " from the Commencement of the next Selfion of "Parliament;" His Majefty, by his Order in Council bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of Ootober One thousand feven hundred and ninety uine, was pleafed to prohibit, for the Term mentioned in the faid Order, the Exportation, or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Veffel, with Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Bifcuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal, or Flour made thereof; fuch Prohibition to export not to extend to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Corn, or Meal, or Flour that should have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act paffed in the Thirty-first Year of His prefent Majetty's Reign, initialed "An Act-" for regulating the Importation and Exportation " of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Fo-" reign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on " British Corn exported," and should not have been taken out of fuch Warehoufe for Home Confumption; nor to prevent the carrying Coaltwife, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the feveral

Sorts of Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, from this Kingdom for any of the Purpofes mentioned in the faid Act: And whereas His Majefty, by his faid Order in Council of the Sixteenth of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, thought fit further to order that it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; and allo to take out of Warehoufe for Home Confumption any fuch Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, without Pay-ment of any Duty whatfoever: And His Majefty was likewife pleafed to order, that it should be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Pay-ment of any Duty whatloever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Callivances, and all other Sorts of Pulfe; and alfo Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife ; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Cront: Provided always, that a due Entry should be made of all fuch Ar-treles as aforefaid that should be fo imported with the proper Officers of the Cuftonis at the Port where the fame fhould be imported, under the Pe-nalties and Forfeitures in the faid Act mentioned : And whereas, by an Act passed in the prefent Scifion of Parliament, intituled " An Act for con-" tinuing until the Expiration of Forty Days after " the Commencement of the First Session of Par-" liament that shall be begun and holden after the " First Day of September One thousand eight "hundred and one, feveral Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation, and permitting the 46 " Importation of Corn and other Articles of Pro-" vision without Payment of Duty; to the allow-" ing the Ufe of Sugar in the Brewing of Beer; " to the reducing the Duties upon Spirits diffilled * from Melaffes and Sugar ; and to the prohibiting " the making of Low Wines or Spirits from Wheat, " and certain other Articles, in that Part of Great " Britain called Scotland;" the faid feveral recited Acts, and all the Powers, Authorities, and Provifions therein contained, are continued as aforefaid; His Majelty is pleafed, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby or-dered, that the faid Prohibition to export Corn or other Articles' as aforefaid, and the faid Permission to import, or take out of Warehouse, Foreign Corn or other Articles as aforefaid, and likewife to import certain other Articles of Provision, as expreffed in the faid Order of the Sixteenth Day of October One thouland leven hundred and ninety-nine, with every Exception, Provilo, Rule, Regulation, and Reltriction specified in the faid Order respecting such Exportation, Importation, or taking out of Warehouse; and all Matters and Things in the faid Order contained, fall be and continue in braltar, provided Proof is made to the Satisfaction of

Force until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that shall be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one :----And the Right Honorable the Lords Com-miffioners of His Majefty's Treasury, are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, intituled "An Act " to authorife His Majesty from Time to Time "to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or "Food," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, from Time to Time to prohibit for a Time to be limited in such Order, either generally or particularly, and by Name or Defeription, the Exportation from this Kingdom of all or any Sort of Provision or Victual, or any Article or Articles whatfoever used, or which may be used as Food by Man, under such Reftrictions and Regulations as His Majefty in Council fhall think proper; and in like Manner from Time to Time to recal fuch Order in Part, or in the Whole, or make fuch Alteration thereisf as he shall think proper; His Majefty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in purfuance of the Powers vested in him by the faid A&, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this prefent Order, and until the first Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever shall export, or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Veffel with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom; the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife; Bacon, Butter, Cheefe, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulfe of any Sort, Barley hulled or Pearl Barley; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein con-tained shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit at any Time the Exportation or carrying out of fuch and fo much of any fuch Provisions, Victuals, and other Articles of Food as shall be neceffary to be carried in any Ship or Veffel on its Voyage out and Home for the Suftenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Mafter, Mariners, Paffengers, and others, or for the Ufe and Suf-tenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Ani-mals on board of fuch Ship or Veffel, or for vic-tualling or providing any of His Majefty's Ships of War, or other Ships or Veffels in His Majefty's Service, or for victualling or providing any of His Majelty's Forces, Forts, or Garrilons, or to pro-hibit at any Time the Exportation to the British. Forts, Caffles, or Factories in Africa, or for the Ufe of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain, or to prohibit the Exportation of any of the Articles above-mentioned to any of His Majefty's. Colonies, Islands, or Plantations, or the Town of Gi-

the Commiffioners of the Cultoms that the Articles fo exported are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; or to prohibit at any Time any Perfon or Perfons from shipping or putting on board any Provisions, Victuals, or other Articles of Food as aforementioned, to be carried Coastwife (that is to fay) from any Port, Creek or Member, or Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain to any other Port, Creek, Member, or Part of the fame refpectively, having fuch or the like Coast Sufference, Cocquet, or other Coast Difpatch for that Purpole; and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the same as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts required in relation to the carrying Coastwife any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treasury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS an Addrefs has been prefented to Us by Our Two Houfes of Parliament, requesting Us to issue Our Royal Proclamation, recommending to all such Persons as have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food the greatelt Economy and Frugality in the Ufes of every Species of Grain: We, having taken the faid Addrefs into Confideration, and being perfuaded that the Prevention of all unneceffary Confumption of Corn will furnish one of the furest and most effectual Means of alleviating the prefent Preffure, and of providing for the neceffary Demands of the Year, have, therefore, in purfuance of the faid Addrefs, and out of Our tender Concern for the Welfare of Our People, thought fit (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) to illue this Our Royal Proclamation, most carneftly exhorting and charging all those of Our loving Subjects who have Means of procuring other Articles of Food than Corn, as they tender their own immediate Interefts, and feel for the Wants of others, to practife the greateft Economy and Frugality in the Ufe of every Species of Grain: And We do, for this Purpofe, more particularly exhort and charge all Mafters of Families to reduce the Confumption of Bread in their respective Families, by at least One-Third of the Quantity confumed in ordinary Times, and in no Cafe to fuffer the fame to exceed One Quartern Loaf for each Perfon in each Week; to abitain from the Use of Flour in Pastry, and, moreover, carefully to reftrict the Use thereof in all other Articles than Bread : And do alfo, in like Manner, exhort and charge all Perfons who keep Horfes, efpecially Horfes for Pleafure, as far as their refpective Circumstances will admit, carefully to reflrict the Confumption of Oats and other Grain or the Subfiftence of the fame. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minifter, in his refpective Parish Church or Chapel, within the Kingdom of Great Britain, to read, or cause to he read, Our faid Proclamation, on the Lord's

Day, for Two fucceflive Weeks after receiving the faid Proclamation.

Extract of a Letter from William Wickham, Efg; to the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, dated Head-Quarters, Amfing, 30th November 1800.

)N the 28th, after I had written my Dispatch from Eggenfenden, the Head-Quarters were removed to Maffing on the Rodt.

The Head-Quarters were last Night at Neumark, and arrived here this Day about Twelve o'Clock; the Roads being fill in a most dreadful State, a great Part of the Army is still behind.

On the Archduke's Arrival here, he found the Enemy in Force on the Heights immediately in Front of the Town.

The Tête de Pont of Wafferbourg was attacked Yesterday, and the Enemy repulsed with some Loss, after having entered the Abbatis in Front of the Work.

Head-Quarters, Haag, 2d December 1800.

MY LORD, Have the Honor to fend your Lordship the enclosed Copy of a Report I have this Day received from His Serene Highnels the Prince of Condé, containing an Account of the Attack which the Enemy made Yesterday on a Part of His Serene Highnes's Corps, commanded by the Duke of Englien, in Front of Rolenheim.

Account of the Action at Rosenbeim, on the 1st of December 1800.

OUR Advanced Pofts, on the Left Side of the Inn, were attacked this Day at Noon; their Right had been abfolutely uncovered for Three Days paft, and the Enemy was already on the Banks on that Side of the River; the Advanced Pofts, commanded by the Duke d'Enghien, were engaged upwards of Four Hours, difputing the Ground Inch by Inch ; the whole Corps was not affembled on the Right Side of the Inn before Five o'Clock. A pretty ftrong Column of the Enemy having marched out of the Yown, it was allowed to advance till within the proper Diffance, when the Prince of Condé ordered all the Batteries to fire upon it at once ; this Fire, well directed and well fuftained, compelled the Column to retreat into the Town immediately. Lieutenant Colonel de Sartige, of the Engineers, protected by the Fire of the Artillery, broke down the Bridge, but in fuch a Manner as that it could promptly be re-established, if, as it is hoped, it fhould be necessary.

Our Lois is very imail ; that of the Enemy must have been more confiderable. An Artillery Man was wounded by the Side of the Duke d'Angoulême. No Officers are known as yet to have been wounded, except Mr. de Vaffé, Adjutant to the Duke d'Angoulême, and the Engineer de Caftre.

> Head-Quarters, Haag, 2d December 1800.

MY LORD, 'HE March of General Kienmayer towards the I fer, and the Direction which the whole Army had first taken towards Landshut, having drawn a confiderable Part of General Moreau's Force towards Aerding, the Heights between Ampfing and Haag had been occupied by one fingle Division under General Ney.

In the Courfe of last Night, however, General Moreau had reinforced his Position with Two more Divisions, and had taken the Command of the Whole himfelf.

Yesterday at Day break the Heights were attacked. After an obilinate Refistance on the Part of the Enemy, they were carried in Succeffion as far as the Hill on the Side of Ramfau, where the Troops were obliged to halt, from exceffive Fatigue, about Six in the Evening. In the Night General Moreau abandoned this

Place, and retired to his old Position at Hohenlenden and Aerding.

The whole Ground from Ampfing to Ramfau was particularly favorable to the Enemy, and confisted in Heights covered with Thick Woods, and interfected by deep marfhy Vallies, where the Auf-

trian Cavalry could not poffibly act. The Auffrians took Eight Hundred Prifoners and Two Pieces of Cannon-the Cannon were taken with Four others, by the Huffars of Vecfey, who diftinguilhed themfelves very much during the whole of the Affair, throwing themfelves into the Woods, in Places where it was thought impoffible for Cavalry to have penetrated. The other Four Pieces of Cannon were retaken by a Charge of the Enemy's Grenadicrs, there not having been Time to fend a fufficient Force to fupport the Huffars.

The Lofs of the Außtrians is computed to be near Fifteen Hundred Men in killed, wounded, and Prifoners. General Moreau is faid by the Prifoners to have received a Musket Ball through his Cloak. The Archduke was on Horfeback Twelve Hours,

and flept in a Hovel on the Heights.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K. B. Admiral of the White, Sc. to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated in Torbay the 14th Inflant.

Enclose, for their Lordships' Information, a Letter which I have received from Captain Lukin, of His Majefty's Ship Thames, giving an Account of the Veffels captured during his late Cruize.

Thames, Plymouth-Sound, 13ib December 1800.

W. LUKIN,

MY LORD, Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship with the Arrival of His Majefty's Ship I command at this Anchorage; and of her having on the 30th of last Month captured, Fifteen Leagues from the Tower of Corduan, after a Chace of Six Hours, a French Brig Privateer called L'Actif, of Fourteen Six Pounders, Two long Brafs Twelves, and One Hundred and Thirty-feven Men: She is a particularly fue new Veffel, Coppered, and had been out only One Day on her first Cruize. I learn from the Priloners that only Two English Veffels have been carried into any of the French or Spanish Ports within these Three Months; that One of them was carried into Rochelle, the other into Passage. I conclude Captain Hotham will have acquainted you of our having captured on the 29th of October last, at Night, a Schooner Letter of Marque, from Guadaloupe to Bourdeaux, laden with Coffee, &c. having chaced her, in Company with the Immortalité, all Day.
