P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty has received Advice that a large Number of Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects have been, and are detained in the Ports of Russia, and that the British Sailors navigating the same have been, and now are detained as Prisoners in different Parts of Russia; and also that, during the Continuance of these Proceedings, a Confederacy of a hostile Nature against the just Rights and Interests of His Majesty and His Dominions has been entered into with the Court of *St. Petersburg* by the Courts of *Denmark* and *Sweden* respectively; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the Ports of *Russia*, *Denmark*, or *Sweden*, until further Order: And His Majesty is further pleased to order, that a general Embargo or Stop be made of all Russian, Danish, and Swedish Ships and Vessels whatsoever, now within, or which hereafter shall come into any of the Ports, Harbours, or Roads within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, together with all Persons and Effects on board the said Ships and Vessels; but that the utmost Care be taken for the Preservation of all and every Part of the Cargoes on board any of the said Ships and Vessels, so that no Damage or Embezzlement whatever be sustained.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty has received Advice that a large Number of Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, have been, and are detained in the Ports of Russia, and that the Property of His Majesty's Subjects in Russia, has, by virtue of several Orders and Decrees, of the Russian Government, particularly one bearing Date the Twenty-ninth of November last, O. S. (corresponding with the Tenth of December N. S.) been seized, and directed to be applied in Violation of the Principles of Justice, and of the Rights of the several Persons interested therein; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no Bills drawn since the said Twenty-ninth of November last, O. S. (corresponding with the Tenth of December N. S.) by or on Behalf of any Persons, being Subjects of or residing in the Dominions of the Emperor of Russia, shall be accepted, or paid, without Licence from One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State first had in that Behalf, until further Signification of His Majesty's Pleasure, or until Provision shall be made in respect thereof by Act of Parliament; whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS it is expedient, for the Purpose of preventing any Danger from the Plague or other Infectious Disease or Distemper, of the Nature of the Plague, and for ascertaining whether



any Ship or Vessel about to enter any Port or Place, or the Mariners, Passengers, or Cargo on board the same, are liable to any Orders concerning Quarantine, to extend the Provisions, Regulations, and Directions, contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth of July last, concerning Quarantine, by directing that as often as any Ship or Vessel, the Cargo of which shall consist of any of the Articles enumerated or described in the Thirty-eighth Section of His Majesty's said Order in Council, shall attempt to enter any Port or Place in Great Britain, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, whether such Port shall have been appointed for the Performance of Quarantine or not, certain Questions and Interrogatories shall be put to the Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of any such Ship or Vessel, in Manner hereinafter directed; and that such Commander, Master, or other Person shall answer the same upon Oath; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that as often as any such Ship or Vessel shall attempt to enter into any Port or Place as aforesaid, whether such Port shall have been appointed for the Performance of Quarantine or not, such Officer of the Customs as shall be nominated or appointed for that Purpose shall go alongside such Ship or Vessel, at such Place as shall be convenient for the Purpose, either within or without the Limits of any Port, and shall put to the Master, Commander, or other Person having Charge of such Ship or Vessel, the Questions contained in the Fifth Section of the said Order in Council, and also the following Questions, viz.

Have you any Cotton, Wool, Thread, or Yarn on board, or any of the Articles enumerated in the First Class of the said Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth of July last, repeating such several Articles?

Are any of the said Goods or Articles which you have on board your Vessel, of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Straights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean?—and shall require such Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of such Ship or Vessel, to give a true Answer to all the said Questions upon Oath; and all such Officers of the Customs as shall be nominated or appointed for this Service, are hereby authorized and required to take such Examinations and Answers upon Oath accordingly; and the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs shall appoint such Places for such Examinations as they shall deem most convenient for the Purpose, in or for the several principal Ports, or shall appoint Vessels to be stationed at certain Places for that Purpose, and shall give Notice of the Places so appointed, and of the Places where any such Vessels shall be stationed, and likewise of the Time at which such Regulations shall take Place with regard to Ships

coming from different Countries; and all Makers, Commanders, or other Persons having the Charge of Ships or Vessels coming or attempting to come into any Port or Place as aforesaid, are hereby ordered and required to bear up to such Places, and on no Pretence to avoid the same; and also to bring-to on being hailed by any Vessel having any Officer of the Customs on board appointed for the Purpose aforesaid. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *W. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of June last, thought fit to prohibit the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, for the Time therein-mentioned: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Ma-

jefty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

the same was defaced in His Excellency's Presence; and His Excellency was thereupon pleased to deliver to their Lordships a new Great Seal of the United Kingdom, to be used in that Part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, and to direct that the same be made Use of (pro tempore) for sealing all Things whatever which pass the Great Seal.

**I** Enclose Two Letters from Captain Sir Richard Strachan, Bart. detailing Particulars of the meritorious Exertions of himself, and the Officers under his Command, in intercepting the Enemy's Supplies.

S I R,

**I** Have the Honor to inform you, that the Vessels you signalled us to chase, on the 6th Instant, never came through the Passage, but rowed up along Shore again, and went under Fort Lomara;

I watched for them all Night, but in the Morning seeing them no more I left the Lurcher off the Morbihan, and proceeded to execute your farther Orders; on that Day I saw a Convoy couring round Croisic of Fifteen or Sixteen Sail, but was in no Hurry to chase, rather permitting them to get nearer to St. Gildas, and in the Evening stood out, and made the necessary Signals to Mr. Forbes; it fully answered my Expectations, as he being to windward turned them all, and they made for the Villain just where I was; about Eight we took a small one just as the Battery of St. Jacques was hailing us, which I immediately manœuvred and sent her with our own Boat along Shore, and by Four A. M. found ourselves in Possession of Five more; this is all they could attempt, as the whole Coasts were then alarmed, and the Battery of Notre Dame at the Entrance of the River Peners, kept up so brisk a Fire as to send Three Shot through the last Vessel; but the Spirit of our People was such that they were determined to have her out, and luckily only one Man was slightly scratched with a Splinter; on joining the Lurcher in the Morning I found she had got Three more, making nine, the Particulars of which are expressed in the adjoined List; the Four largest are decked, and very capable of going to England, but the others cannot; since the 7th Mr. Forbes has been continually on the look-out, but not a single Vessel, I believe, has stirred since.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Rowley Bulteel, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Belliqueux, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Rio Janeiro, the 24th August 1800.*

ON Monday the 4th Day of August, soon after Daylight, Four Sail were discovered from the Mast-Head in the North West Quarter, and apparently steering about N. by E. At Seven A. M. they hauled their Wind, tacked, and stood towards us, upon which I bore down with the Whole of my Convoy: At Noon the Enemy perceived our Force, (which was greatly exaggerated in their Opinion by the warlike Appearance of the China Ships,) they bore up under a Press of Sail, and by Signal separated.

I stood for the largest Ship, and notwithstanding the light and baffling Winds, we came up with her, and after a few Chace Guns, and a partial Firing for about Ten Minutes, at Half past Five in the Afternoon (Tuesday) she struck her Colours, and proved to be the French Frigate La Concorde, of Forty-four Guns, Eighteen-Pounders, and Four Hundred and Forty-four Men, commanded by Citizen Jean François Landolphe, Capitaine de Vaisseau, and Chef de Division.

At Seven the same Evening, the French Frigate La Medée, of Thirty-six Guns, Twelve-Pounders, and Three Hundred and Fifteen Men, commanded by Citizen Daniel Coudein, struck her Colours to the Bombay Castle, Captain John Hamilton, and the Exeter, Captain Henry Meriton.

The above Frigates were of the Squadron which sailed from Rochefort the 6th Day of March 1799, and having committed great Depredations on the Coast of Africa, had refitted in the Rio de la Plata, and were now cruising on the Coast of Brazil.

La Franchise, of Forty-two Guns and Three Hundred and Eighty Men, commanded by Citizen Pierre Jurieu, escaped by throwing a Part of her Guns overboard, and also her Anchors, Boats, and Booms, and by Night coming on; as did also an American Schooner, their Prize, fitted as a Cruiser.

On this Occasion I hope their Lordships will permit me to bear Testimony of the Spirit of the Officers and Ship's Company of the Belliqueux; and I have peculiar Pleasure in mentioning the Zeal and Activity I have ever found in Mr. Ebdon, my First Lieutenant, to whom I only do Justice in recommending him to their Lordships' Notice and Favor.

Too much Praise cannot be given to the Captains, Officers, and Crews of the different Ships under my Convoy, for their ready Obedience to my

Signals, and for the whole of their Conduct on that Day, particularly to Captains Hamilton and Meriton, who very gallantly pursued and captured the aforesaid Frigate, La Médée; and also to Captain Torin, of the Coatts, and Captain Spens, of the Neptune, who with great Alacrity pursued La Franche, although they had not the good Fortune to come up with her, for the Reasons above assigned; and my best Thanks are due to the Whole of the Commanders of the Ships under my Convoy, for their Assistance in taking a Number of Prisoners on board their respective Ships.

We arrived at Rio Janeiro on Tuesday the 12th of August.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Robert Barton, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Concorde, to Evan Neppan, Esq; dated at Lisbon the 4th Instant.*

**D**uring my Stay off the Bar of Oporto I captured the Spanish Privateer Lugger San Josef, alias Larcon, of Six Guns and Forty Men, out from Vigo, and had captured the Speedy Brig, one of our Convoy, and in an Hour more would have captured another, as she was within Hail when we saw her.

Nor can we form a more patriotic Wish for the Hoppinels of our fellow Subjects, than that Ireland may experience, in the Course of the Period which now so auspiciously opens, the same Accession of Wealth, of Industry, of Concord, and of Freedom, which Scotland has gained during the Century that is past.

That your Majesty may be long preserved to maintain the Privileges, and to watch over the Interests of a free, a happy, and a truly united People, is the fervent Prayer of your Majesty's most faithful and devoted Subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of your City of Edinburgh in Council assembled.
