We have distributed Notes to Wolverhampton Dudley Stourbridge lie waste Brignorsh to let our Friends know of the above person that they may know where to ind Corn. out of all the Farmers for 15 Miles round W. Hampton we can only find 3 Good ones and those we will protect to our last drop of Blood and any Friends they shall wish. We hav in a letter drop'd let our Friends know who the are that they may be fafe and we shall foon fend them our pals word but if they expose it that any other may know . it they will fuffer with the rell.
