To the KING.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, Justices of the Peace, and Principal Inhabitants of the County of Inverness, beg Leave to approach you with Expressions of our sincere Congratulation on the happy Conclusion of an Union between your Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland; a Measure from which, we trust, the most important and lasting Advantages will be derived to your Majesty's Subjects by further securing their Liberty, augmenting their Resources, and consolidating their Strength.
