The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-fire of December last, to declare, that for the Comply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Hand of Newfoundland, for the enguing Scason only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, might be imported into the faid Island, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, by British Subjects, and in British built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjecis, and navigated according to Law, under the Rules, Regulations, and Refrictions required by the faid Order: And whereas it may be expedient alio to allow, for the enfuing Season only, the Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Butter, and of such other Articles of Provilion, as may be wanted for the Supply of the faid Inhabitants and Fishermen of Newfoundland, from the faid United States to the 1stand of Newfoundland, under the like Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, His Ma jelly doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into Newfoundland, from the Territories belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stocks, be extended to falted Beef, Pork, Butter, Peale, and such other Articles of Provision as may be wanted for the ensuing Scalon only, in the Manner, and under the Rules, Regulations, and Rethrictions required by His Majethy's above recited Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, and according to the W. Fawkener. Licence thereunto annexed.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Maninth of July last, prohibiting the exporting into

'T' the Court at St. Jumes's, the 11th of | any Parts out of this Kingdom any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in fuch a State as may be easily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this inflant February; and whereas it is expedient for His Ma-jefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for fome Time longer, His Majohy doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twelfth Day of this instant February, presume to export out of this Kingdon to any Parts beyond the Seas, any Sheet-Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or Copper in such a State as may be eafily converted into or made useful as a Naval Store, or ship or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being sirst had and obtained from His Majelty or His Frivy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, or mourring the Porteitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Ch. 2.; and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Ch. 34, any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourteenth Day of January last to the contrary notwithstanding:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for execution jesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may W. Fawkener. respectively appertain.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their laie Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His prefent Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incurby Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewife extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westmuster, or at the Affizes or Quarter Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesly's or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Of-

Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artisticer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Consession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Jultice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sef-fions: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indicament, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, sorteit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impri-forment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on heard any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Fools or Utenfils as are commonly

fence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Wellminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utentils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly pennit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties insticted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on hoard any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manusactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made, thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manusactures.
