AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 11th of February 1801,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, to declare, that for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, might be imported into the said Island, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, by British Subjects, and in British built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, under the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions required by the said Order: And whereas it may be expedient also to allow, for the ensuing Season only, the Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Butter, and of such other Articles of Provision, as may be wanted for the Supply of the said Inhabitants and Fishermen of Newfoundland, from the said United States to the Island of Newfoundland, under the like Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Permission to import into Newfoundland, from the Territories belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, be extended to salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and such other Articles of Provision as may be wanted for the ensuing Season only, in the Manner, and under the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions required by His Majesty's above recited Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, and according to the Licence thereunto annexed.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the*

Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Act, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to repeal an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled An Act to prevent, until the Sixth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and one, and from thence to the End of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, the manufacturing of any fine Flour from Wheat or other Grain, and the making of any Bread solely from the fine Flour of Wheat; and to repeal an Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for permitting Bakers to make and sell certain Sorts of Bread, and to make more effectual Provision for the same; and to indemnify Millers and other Persons who have dressed, sold, or used any Meal or Flour of a finer Description than allowed by the said Act.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Lord Gardner, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Coast of Ireland, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Cork, the 22d Ulimo.

SIR,

I Herewith enclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter which I received Yesterday Afternoon from Captain Twysden, of His Majesty's Ship *Revolutionnaire*, giving an Account of his having captured the *Moucheron* French Brig Privateer, belonging to Bourdeaux, mounting Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Thirty Men.

Revolutionnaire, at Sea, 16th February 1801.

MY LORD,

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that early this Morning, I captured the French Brig Privateer *Moucheron*, belonging to Bourdeaux, mounting Sixteen Guns, Twelve and Six-Pounders,
