SIR, Favorite, at Sea, March 13, 1801.

The Beg Leave to acquaint you, that at Hulf-pall Ten Yesterday Morning, I chaced a Lugger from under Scarbough, and continued fat ill Ten P. M. when I lost Sight of her; I then faw a San to windward, to which I also gave Chace, and captured; she proves to be l'Optimille French Schooner Privateer of Dunkirk, (failed from thence Seven Days,) mounting Fourteen Carriage Guns, manned with Forty-feven Men, commanded by Jean Baptiste Corenwinder.
