PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the 28th of December 1796, His Majefly was pleafed, among other Things contained in the faid Order, to declare it to be His Pleasure, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which should be imported into the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions should be subject to any Duty; His Majesty having taken into His Royal Consideration the present State of the Trade, Commerce, and Revenues of the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, is hereby pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke, and doth hereby revoke so much of the said Order of the 28th of February 1796, as exempts from Duty any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which shall, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the said Settlement, as hereinafter directed, be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ircland; and so much of the said Order shall, from and after such due Notice, cease and determine: And His Majesty is surther pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impose on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, which shall be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, after such due Notice, a Duty not exceeding Ten per Cent. on the Value thereof, such Duty to be rated and collected in the same Manner as is in Use with regard to the Import Duty now levied at the faid Settlement, and the Territorics and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majesty, and upon the Goods and Merchandizes imported in the same.

Provided always, That the Commencement of fuch Duty shall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Instrument, which shall be made and issued by the said Governor for the Purpose of imposing such Duty, which Time shall not be less than Six Months from the Day of issuing such Proclamation or other lawful Instrument: And provided also, That the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manusachure of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, when so imported in British-built Vessels, owned and navigated according to Law, shall in no Case be so high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods so imported in the Vessels of Foreign States.

Vessel liable to or under Quarantine: His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and doth hereby order, That in Addition to the Questions directed by His Majesty's said Order in Council, bearing Date the 14th of January last, to be put to the Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of any Ship or Vessel, the Cargo of which shall consist of any of the Articles enumerated or described in Section Thirty-eighth of His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the 29th of July last, concerning the Personmance of Quarantine, the following Questions be in like Manner put to such Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of such Ship or Vessel; and that such Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of such Ship or Vessel, shall answer the same upon Oath:

I. Have you spoken to, or otherwise had any Communication with any Vessel at Sea during the Voyage? If you have, say when, where, and the Nature of the Communication held. Were there any Letters, Parcels, or other Articles delivered or received into your Ship or Vessel from any Ship or Vessel met with on the Voyage; and what were such

Letters, Parcels, or Articles?

II. What were the Ships or Veffels you fpoke to, or had Communication with, and what were their Destinations respectively? And what do you know respecting the State of Health on board such Ships or Vessels?

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

I Have the Satisfaction to enclose to you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter which I have received from Captain Cotgrave, of His Majesty's Sloop Gannet, giving me an Account of his having last Night captured the French Privateer La Vengeance, of Fourteen Guns and Forty-three Men, belonging to Boulogne.

SIR, Gannett, Downs, March 29, 1801.

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that Yesterday, at Half past Eight P. M. I discovered a Lugger close in with Dungeness, to which I immediately gave Chace, and have the Pleasure to inform you, that at Half past Eleven I came up with and captured her close in with the French Shore: She proves to be La Vengeance French Lugger, of Ten Three and Four Two-Pounders, manned with Fortythree Men, commanded by Nicholas Saillard: She sailed from Boulogne on the same Morning, and had not made any Captures.

MY LORD, February 27, 1801.

Have to inform your Lordship, that His Majetly's Ship under my Command captured on the 6th of January, off the West End of Jamaica, a Spanish Schooner Packet, called El Reyna Louisa, Don Manuel Palay, Commander, of Two Guns and Twenty Men, from Trinidada, in the Island of Cuba, bound to Carthagena with a small Cargo of Tobacco and Wax, which I have sent into Providence: The Mail was destroyed previous to her Capture.

As several Artificers and Manusaturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Alls of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artisieers or Manusaturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artisieers or Manusaturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

If F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into the Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His

.Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Pcace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, such Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witnels, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Seffions: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the

Court of Jufticiary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or forment in the Common Gaol of the County or directly for fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil,

or Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall fuffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such

Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Sesfion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in-Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employ-

ment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty. BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound or Implement whatfover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manusactures.
