

An Act for permitting East India Goods prohibited to be worn or used in Great Britain, and warehoused, in pursuance of an Act made in the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, to be removed by Land Carriage to certain Ports, for the Purpose of being exported to the British Colonies or Plantations in the West Indies.

An Act to render valid Indentures of Apprenticeship of Poor Children and others made upon improper Stamps upon certain Conditions, and to indemnify all Persons who may have incurred Penalties thereby.

An Act for the better Collection of Rates made for the Relief of the Poor.

An Act for the indemnifying of Persons injured by the forcible pulling down and demolishing of Mills, or of Works thereunto belonging, by Persons unlawfully and riotously assembled.

An Act for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from the Hand and Post in Upton-Field, in the Parish of Burford, in the County of Oxford, to a Place in the Parish of Preston, in the County of Gloucester, called Dancy's Fancy.

And Two Private Acts.

The King has been pleased to grant the Dignity of an Earl of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to the Right Honorable Alexander Lord Loughborough and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style, and Title of Earl of Rosslyn, in the County of Mid Lothian, with Remainder to the Heirs Male, lawfully begotten, of the Body of Lady Janet Erskine, deceased, Sister to the said Alexander Lord Loughborough, and Widow of Sir Henry Erskine of Alva, Baronet.

The King has been pleased to declare and ordain by His Royal Sign Manual, that Mary Henrietta Erskine, Daughter of Lady Janet Erskine, deceased, Sister to the Right Honorable Alexander Lord Loughborough, and Widow of Sir Henry Erskine of Alva, Baronet, shall have, and enjoy the same Place, Precedence, and Precedency, in all Assemblies or Meetings whatsoever, as the Daughter of an Earl of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; and His Majesty has been pleased to order that the same be registered in the College of Arms.

IN pursuance of an Order of the Honorable the House of Commons, Notice is hereby given, that Application is now making to Parliament for Leave to bring in a Bill to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for improving the Navigation of the River Medway from the Town of

Maidstone, through the several Parishes of Maidstone, Boxley, Allington, and Aylesford, in the County of Kent," and for raising a further Sum of Money for carrying the said Act into Execution, and for other Purposes. Dated the 6th Day of April 1801.
