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Genova, July 24.

THE 18 French Gallies which have been at *Barcelona*, being Commanded by the Duke de *Vivonne* are expected in these Seas to joyn the 12 others Commanded by the Chevalier de *Novailles*. The 18th Instant parted from hence four Gallies belonging to this rate, under the Command of *Dun Hippolito Centurione*, in search of two Turkish Gallies and a *Brigantine* which had been on these Coasts, and yesterday they returned hither again without any adventure. The Gallies of *Tuscany* were abroad on the same design, but did not succeed better. The Sieur de *Louvigny* is arrived here, intending to pass from hence by Sea to *Messina*, of which he is Governor.

Naples, July 26. The 12th instant Four French men of War and two Fireships commanded by Monsieur du *Quesne* appeared upon this Coast; of which he gave notice to our Viceroy by one of his Officers, who, when he returned was accompanied by one sent by his Excellencie to complement Monsieur du *Quesne*, and to make him a present of Fruits and fresh Provisions. The said men of War are still at Anchor near the Isle of *Procida* being bound for the Levant.

Legborne, July 30. The Cardinal d' *Estree* is expected at *Florence*, which is the reason the Grand Duke will not remove from thence until September. The French are working with all diligence at *Amièze* to enlarge the Port, which they intend to make capable to receive their light Frigates, for whose security, when the Port is finished, they will build a Fort there. Three or four days since arrived here a Vessel from *Argiers* with 30 English that have been redeemed from that Slavery; by whom we are told, That the Dutch are not like to enjoy so great a Benefit by their Peace concluded with that Government as they expected, those people pretending to search all their Ships for Strangers Goods, which because the Dutch Consul at *Argiers* opposed, they have confined him to his House; and that those Pyrates have at present 10 Ships abroad. From *Genova* they write, That the Senate had an Intention to fill up the place where they keep their Gallies, to avoid the dispute which they may have with the French, who pretend to have the use of it for their Gallies.

Leopol, July 14. We were extremely Allarmed here this week, by the advice we had that all the Gentlemen living in this Palatinate had caused their Cattle to be secured on the other side of the *Ripula*, apprehending, it seems, an Invasion of the Turks and Tarrars, which begot so great a fright among many people here, who imagined the Enemy to be ready to assault this place, that they began to remove their Families and best Goods, but their first fears being over, and understanding that

the King was on his way hither, they returned to their former ease and quiet.

Warsaw, July 22. Since the departure of the *Moscovite* Ambassadors from hence, we have more and more cause to be jealous that the Czar is now Treating with the Turks, without any regard to this Crown, and if a Peace be concluded we have sufficient reason to believe that the design of the Ottomans in it is to turn their Arms against this Kingdom, or else against *Hungary*. The advices we have of late received from the Port seem to persuade the latter, the Turks having a greater Prospect of Success on that side, because of the ill State the Emperors Affairs there are in through the Civil Commotions that have so long afflicted that Country, and which will the more easily make it a Prey to a Foreign Enemy.

Vienna, July 25. This place, God be thanked; is quite freed of the Plague, which at present extremely afflicts all the Emperors Hereditary Countreys, so that Commerce is forbid with above 50 Places. The Imperial Court, as we have already told you, is at *Limz*, and will continue there till it return hither, which will not be till towards Winter. From *Hungary* we have an account of the ill pollure of things there, That the Rebels are very strong, *Tockely* and *Petrozi* having joyned their Forces together, and threatening to fall into *Silesia* and other Neighbouring Countreys; That the Viceroy of *Offen*, was, with a Body of 10 or 12000 men, encamped near *Newbansel*, having with him a Train of Artillery, and that it was feared he would joyn with the Rebels, who of themselves are 10000 strong; to make head against whom, the Emperor has sent orders to all his Troops quartered in his Hereditary Countreys, to march towards *Newstadt*, near which place they are to Rendezvous; and at the same time directions have been sent to the Bishop of *Firnaw*, to use his endeavours in order to the bringing the Rebels to such Terms as it may be proper for the Emperor to grant them a Peace upon.

Ratisbonne, Aug. 1. The Letters which the States assembled here, resolved to write to the King of *England*, and to the French King, to complain of the proceedings of the French Officers, and their many Contraventions of the late Peace, are ready, being both Signed and Sealed, but not yet sent away, because of some new Matter offered by the Deputies of *Austria*; for the Sealing of those Letters, three Deputies were appointed by the three Colleges, and each Letter is Sealed with 24 Seals.

Strasburg, July 30. The first account we had of the *Marschal de Crequi's* arrival in these parts made people somewhat uneasy, for they presently imagined that he came to put some great design in execution, and that it was against this place, which has of late been frequently Allarmed with advices of this kind; but those fears are for this time over, for the *Marschal*, after having visited several places, and taken an account of the forwardness

wardneſs the new Fortifications that are making there, are in, is gone for *Lorraine*. to continue in his Government of that Countrey. The Marquis de *Boufflers* is marching towards *Stenay*, where will be held, about the middle of the next Month, in the Kings preſence, a general Muſter of the Dragoons.

Hamburg, Aug. 9. The ſeveral reports that have been ſpread abroad of the Death of the Elector of *Saxony* prove hitherto falſe. However we have an account from all hands, that his Electoral Highneſs continues very ill, and that he has withdrawn himſelf from publick affairs. The Elector of *Brandenburg's* Journey to *Magdebourg* is put off till the end of *September*, and the ſecond of *October* is the day appointed for his publick Entry into that City, and his receiving the Oath of Homage and Allegiance from the Magiſtrates, and the Nobility and Gentry of that Countrey. The Letters we have from *Poland* ſay, That they began to hope that the endeavours that were uſed to beget a Rupture between the Turks and that Kingdom would be unſucceſſful, and that the Grand Signior's Army was marching againſt the *Moscovites*.

Cologne, Aug. 9. On Tueſday laſt arrived here the Prince of *Naffaw*, Stadtholder of *Friſeland*, and parted again the next day to go to the waters at *Smalbach*. We have Letters from *Vienna* of the 28th paſt, which ſay, That Count *Caprara*, General of the Imperial Troops in *Hungary*, and Count *Tockly*, chief of the Rebels, had agreed to a new Truce, and that Propoſals had been made by the latter in order to a Peace, which Count *Caprara* had ſent to the Emperor to know his pleaſure upon; That the Proceſs againſt Count *Zinzendorf*, formerly Preſident of the Emperor's Revenues, was drawing towards a concluſion, and that it was believed Sentence would be pronounced againſt him the beginning of *September*; and that the Count de *Tburn*, whom the Emperor is ſending into *England*, would very ſpeedily begin his Journey.

Bruffels, Aug. 13. The 11th Inſtant paſſed through this City, on his return for *Holland*, an Officer of the Prince of *Oranges* Guards, whom the States General had ſent to the French King to deſire a farther Prolongation of the Term, which he had lengthned to the 15th Inſtant, for the Spaniards to declare themſelves in, concerning the Title of *Burgundy*; We are told, that the Kings Anſwer was, *That he would always have a great Regard to what the States ſhould deſire of him; and that his Ambaſſador at the Hague ſhould acquaint them with his reſolution in this matter.* The Duke de *Villa Hermoſa* continues his intention of going for *Flanders* yet this Week: and the beginning of the next, the Marquis de *Bourguennero* will begin his Journey towards the Imperial Court. We are told from *Rasibonne*, That the Elector of *Bavaria* will not permit the Count de *Fb*, whom the Emperor is ſending into *England*, to paſs through his Territories, without performing a Quarantine.

Bruffels, Aug. 13. The French Court being removed from *Valenciennes* to *Cambray*, parted again from thence the 9th, Lodged that night at *Landreſies* the 10th at *Avignes*, and the 12th at *Mabenge*, where the King viſited the new Fortifications that are making there. As this day the Court would go thence to *Barbanzon*, and will be to morrow at *Philipville* and from thence their Majeſties continue their Progreſs to *Rocroy*, where they will not be till the 27th. On the 15th Inſtant the laſt Term

ſet by the French for the Spaniſh Commiſſioners at *Courtray* to obtain a new Power in, without the Title of *Burgundy*, expires, ſo that we muſt now expect to ſee what conſequences this Pretention of the French, which our King will, it's ſaid, by no means yeild to, will have. An Expreſs is arriv'd in 14 days from *Madrid*, but we know not what he brings.

Paris, Aug. 10. All we can write from hence is, That the Court, according to the laſt Advices we had, was at *Cambray*, and would remove from thence as yeſterday.

Kinſale, July 27. Yeſterday arrived here the *Ann* and *Mary* of this place with Tobacco and Sugar from *Antego*, from whence they came in company of the *Ann* of *London*, bound home, with whom they parted about three weeks ſince. The new Fort that is making here advances apace.

York, Aug. 2. The laſt week the Lady *Tempeſt*, Daughter to Sir *Thomas Gaſcoigne*, and Mrs. *Prifwicke*, were Tryed at the *Aſizes* here, upon an Indictment of High-Treason, For Conſpiring the Death of the King, &c. and were acquitted, but Mr. *Thwing* the Priſt, who was Tryed at the ſame time, was found Guilty. Sir *Miles Stapleton* has not been yet brought to his Tryal.

Plymouth, Aug. 3. Yeſterday Sailed from hence the *Garland* for *Portſmouth*, and this day about 20 Sail of Merchant Ships, bound for the *Streights* and other parts, ſailed from hence likewiſe, under the Convoy of the *Mermaid*, who has the Soldiers on Board which the *Garland* brought from *Ireland*.

Portſmouth, Aug. 5. Yeſterday the *Garland* Frigate, Captain *Holder* Commander, came to *Spithead*. On Tueſday arrived here the Yachts with the new raiſed Troopers deſigned for *Tangier*.
