

Daphne, January 15, 1801, having been in Possession of the Enemy.

French Schooner L'Eclair, from Guadaloupe, in Ballast: Cut out from her Anchorage by the Garland Sloop, Tender to Daphne, January 18, 1801, after a smart Contest, under Fire of the Batteries at Trois Rivières. A National Schooner commanded by an Ensign de Vaisseaux.

Brig John, from Cayenne to Saint Bartholomew, laden with Sundries: Detained by the Leviathan, having no Register.

American Brig Industry, laden with Cattle, Mules, &c.: Recaptured by the Tamor, Cayenne, and Gipsy, February 2, 1801.

American Ship Fair American, from Philadelphia to the Havannah, laden with Flour and Dry Goods: Recaptured by the Leviathan, February 4, 1801, having been in Possession of the Enemy Twelve Days.

Hamburgh Ship Catharine Dorothea, from Hamburgh to Guadaloupe, laden with Glafs and Earthenware: Detained by Ditto, February 9, 1801, upon Suspicion.

Brig Chatham, from Guadaloupe to Saint Thomas, in Ballast: Detained by the Arab, January 19, 1801, having no Register.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Larcom, of His Majesty's Ship Hind, to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated at Sea, the 26th April 1801.

SIR,

I Am happy to inform you, that at Half past Seven P. M. I came up with and captured the Vessel we received Information of Yesterday at Noon; which proved to be the Bougainville French Brig Privateer of St. Maloes, Citizen Jaques Le Bon Commander, of One Hundred and Twenty-eight Tons, mounting Fourteen Guns of different Calibre, and Sixty-Seven Men; out Three Days, and had made no Capture.

By Advices received this Morning from Major Holloway, dated at the Camp of the Grand Vizir at Gaza, March 20, 1801, it appears, that on the 18th of that Month, One Thousand Asiatic Cavalry advanced from that Place, and on the following Day, One Thousand Arab Cavalry. This Body is to be under the Command of Tahir Pashà, as an advanced Guard. On its arrival at El-Arish, it is to halt a Day or Two until Mahomet Pashà arrives with a very considerable Part of the Army, probably about Five Thousand Men, when Tahir Pashà is to advance to Catièh. It is the Grand Vizir's Intention that these Two Thousand Cavalry should join the British Army whenever the Commander in Chief may require it.

It also appears, that Djeggar Pashà has entered into an Accommodation of all Differences, and ordered Five Thousand of his Troops to join the Imperial Army for the Purpose of the Expulsion of the Enemy from Egypt. The first Party that joined consisted of about Four Hundred and Fifty good Cavalry, well mounted; and several Parties have joined since.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign
