Whitehall, May 30, 1801. HE following Addreffes of the General Affembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by the Earl of Leven and Melvill, His Majeffy's High Commiffioner, to His Grace the Duke of Portland, One of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, have been by him prefented to the King; which Addreffes His Majefly was pleafed to receive very gracioufly :

May it pleafe your Majefty,

W E have received, with the most fincere Respect and Gratitude, the very gracious Letter with which your Majefty has been pleafed to honor this Meeting of the General Affembly of the Church of Scotland.

Senfible that it is our prculiar Duty to provide for the Prefervation of pure Religion, and remembering that the Advancement of Piety, and the Practice of every Christian Duty, at all Times demand from us the greatest Affiduity and Care, we feel that these Confiderations are entitled to more than ordinary Attention, when Notions and Principles, equally deftructive of the temporal and eternal Welfare of those who entertain them, have been indultriously propagated amongst all Orders and Degrees of Men. These Notions and Principles, we beg Leave to affure your Majefty, it is our firm Purpole fleadily and uniformly to oppole; and we hope that our Endeavours, combining with the Efforts of all to whom the Interests of Christianity are facred, and aided by the Bleffing of the Moft High, may still be effectual to expose their evil Tendency, and check their Progrefs. In Times like the prefent, when the Enemies of Religion (like the Enemies of focial Order) are always on the Watch, and will not fail to profit by every Advantage which Lukewarmnefs or Inadvertence may

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afford them, we feel that the Dulies incumbent on us are unufually difficult and momentous. We are convinced, that any Relaxation of those Exertions, which Divine Providence has hitherto crowned with Succefs, may be productive of the most fatal and ruinous Effects; and, acting under the Influence of this Conviction, we shall study to afford to the Friends of Piety and good Morals every Protection which can refult from the vigilant Difcharge of the important Duties which your Majefty has fo carnellly recommended to our Altention.

We are encouraged to apply ourfelves, with the most unwearied Zeal and Affiduity, to the Accomplifument of this great Object, by the Confidence which your Majefty is pleafed to repole in us : And while we have a proper Senfe of the Difficulties with which the Friends of Religion and good Order have to contend, we are grateful to Almighty God that we are bleffed with a Sovereign whole Example and Authority are uniformly employed to enforce the Sanctions of Religion, and give Weight to the Admonitions of its Teachers.

We truft, that both as Individuals watching over the People under our Care, and as an Affembly coufulting for the general Interest of the Church of Scotland, we shall ever maintain that facred Sense of religious Obligation, that loyal Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon and Government, that tender Concern for the Welfare of the People committed to our Charge, and that Spirit of Christian Love and Charity towards each other, which have hitherto recommended us to your Royal Protection, and which. your Majelity has condescended to mention with Approbation.

We rely with entire Confidence on your Majefty's gracious Affurance, that the juft Rights and Privileges of the Church of Scotland are Objects of your especial Care; and that it is your Resolution to maintain them unimpaired : That your Majesty has deigned to admonish us with fuch affectionate Zeal, of the various and important Divies incumbent on us, we confider as a renewed Proof of that warm Concern for the Interests of Religion, and the Profperity of your Pcople, which has rendered your Majefty fo juilly dear to all good Men. We are fenfible that on the Manner in which these Duties are difcharged, the Welfare of the Establishment, the Interests of civil Society, and the Influence of Religion, muft in a great Meafure depend : and we take the Liberty to affine your Majefty, that both by our Precepts and our Example, we shall ever study to promote the Interests of Religion and Virtue, and to diffuse among the People under our Care Sentiments of Attachment to our happy Constitution, Loyalty to your Majesty's Person and Government, and Zerd for the Public Good.

The Reprefentation of your Royal Perfon in our General Affemblies we regard with the higheft Re fpect as the Symbol of that Union between Church and State, which tends to give Stability to both. We receive, as a Teffimony of your paternal Regard for the Intereils of the Church of Scotland, the Appointment of the Earl of Leven and Melvill as your Majesty's Commissioner in this Assembly : his approved Loyalty to your Majefty, his warm Zeal for the Caufe of Religion, his hereditary Attach-ment to the Church of Scotland, and his tried Fieldity in the High Office with which your Majefty has
