Anfwer. The Inhabitants shall enjoy full Security for their Perfons, the free Exercife of their Religion, and continue in Poffession of their Private Property. The prefent Laws and Ulages will be continued in Force until His Majesty's Pleafure is known.

Art. II. In cafe the Island of St. Eustatius remains in the Possefiion of His Britannic Majesty at the Conclution of a General Peace, it shall enjoy every Right and every commercial Privilege enjoyed by the British Colonies in the West Indies.

Anfwer.-Agreed.

Art. III. In cafe this Ifland fhould be attacked by the Dutch Forces or their Allies, the Inhabitants shall not be obliged or forced to take up Arms, but remain neutral and quiet.—The fame Privilege has been always granted to the British born Subjects who lived formerly, in great Numbers, in this Island.

Anfwer.-Agreed.-The Inhabitants who refide to take an Oath not to affift the Enemies of His Britannic Majefly, while the Island remains under British Government.

Art. IV. A free Exportation of Produce made in this Ifland.

Answer .- The Commerce of St. Euflatius to be fubject to the fame Reflrictions as the other conquered Islands.

Art. V. The Garrifon placed here shall be at the Expence of his Britannic Majefty.

Answer.-The Garrison to be upon the same Footing as the British Forces in the other conquered Islands.

Art. VI. The Garrifon in this Ifland will furrender the Fortreffes to His Britannic Majesty's Forces, and march out with the Honors of War, and shall be provided every one according to his Rank, until

a Veffel is prepared to carry them to Holland. Answer.—The Forts to be furrendered at Five o'Clock this Evening. The Garrison to march out o'Clock this Evening. The Garrifon to march out with the Honors of War; the Men to lay down their Arms; Officers retain their Side-Arms, and be provided with a Paffage to Martinique, where their Excellencies the Commanders in Chief will determine on the latter Part of the Article.

Art. VII. All Ammunition and Magazines, with an Inventory thereof, shall be given up to Commiffaries.

Anfwer.-Proper Perfons will be appointed to receive in Charge Warlike Stores of every Defcription.

Art. VIII. The Property of the Military shall

be refpected, as that of the Inhabitants. Anfwer.-Their private Property will be fecured to them.

Art. IX. There shall be given at least a Month's Time to the Officers of the Military to fettle their private Bulinefs before their Departure for Europe. Anfwer.—A reafonable Time will be allowed

previous to their Departure for Martinique.

Art. X. Should any of the Military Officers, even of inferior Rank, with to remain on their Parole in this Island, it shall be granted.

Answer.-Agreed; on their taking the Oath preferibed, and conducting themfelves as peaceable Subjects.

Art. XI. Should any of the foregoing Articles convey a double Meaning, it shall be explained in Favour of the Capitulants.

Anfwer.-Agreed. Art. XII. The Island of Saba is included in the

Capitulation. Anfwer.-Agreed.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Duckworth, Commauder in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels, at the Leeward Islands, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated Martinique, the 27th of April 1801. SIR,

N the 16th Inftant the French Garrison evacuated the Ifland of St. Euflatia, carrying with them Field-Pieces, and as much Powder, with other Plunder, as their Veffels could flow, which Circumftance having been communicated to Prefident Thompson, of St. Christophers, he very judiciously availed himfelf of the Moment, by making the Application (of which I enclose you a Copy) to Cap-tain Perkins, of the Arab, which he directly complied with; and on the 21st, Colonel Blunt, with a Detachment of His Majesty's 3d Regiment of Buffs, and Captain Perkins, of the Arab, took Poffeffion of the Island, under the accompanying Capitulation, which included the Island of Saba.

The Ordnance Stores taken in the Island of St. Eustatia confist of Forty-eight Pieces of Cannon of different Calibres, Three Hundred and Thirty-eight Barrels of Powder, with a Quantity of filled Cartridges, as alfo Mufket Ditto, with fome Shot, &c
