Gratuities have been paid either directly to the Parties themfelves, or to their Families; and Monies have been frequently lodged in the Hands of Friends, for their Benefit, under the Sanction of the Committee, to be paid by In-flalments, for their Relief, or for the Apprenticeship of Children. In Cases of Death, Attention has been paid under similar Tauss, to the Widows, and to the Fatherleis, or to the Relatives of the Deceased.

Annuities have been granted to the Families of the Killed, or to those who have lost Sight or Limb, or who have been disabled by Wounds from providing for themselves or their Families; and Care will be taken to secure the Annual Payment of the faine, under certain Regulations and Certi-

ficutes, free of all Expense to the Parties interested.

Relief has not been confined to British Subjects only; but every Actention has been paid to Foreigners who were on board the Fleet, they having by their Services acquired a natural and a national Claim, to Gratuities for their Suffer-ings in Defence of this Country.

A Sum has been referred for the Thirty-fix Cases which

the Committee have not been able yet to find out. As most of the Cases are those of Foreigners, it is intended to adver-

Merchant-Seamen's Office, July 9, 1801, tife them again; and, if Claimants are not found within Twelve Months, to recommend the Gratuities that then may be due to Foreigners, to be paid over to the Ministers or Heads of Foreign Churches or Communities in London, or to the Consuls of the different Nations to which the Seamen respectively belong, for the Benefit and Relief of those foreign and distressed Seamen that may frequent our Ports

in Time of Peace.

The Committee beg Leave to state, that the Subscription raifed in Scotland, under the Management of a Committee in Edinburgh, fubject to the Appropriation and Recommendation of this Committee, amounted, with Interest, to 3549 l. 7 s. 8 d.; and that, after the Payment of Gratuities and Expences, the Balance of 1402 l. 3s. 2d. has been remitted to this Committee, to be applied to the Purposes of this Subfcription .- It is with Pleafure they make their public Acknowledgments for the great Affiltance they have re-ceived from that Committee, and for the active Services rendered by them on this Occasion.

The Subicriptions from Ireland and the East Indies, which have been equally liberal, have been included in the General'

Fund.

The Committee, withing to make fome further Provition for the Children and Families of those who were Killed or Wounded on the 11th of October 1797, beg to recommend a Sum to be given to the Merchant-Seamen's Office, to the Marine Society, and to the Naval Afylum, respectively, for the Benefit of such Children and Families as may stand in

Need of Relief from those Institutions.
