INDENTURES OF APPRENTICESHIP OF POOR CHILDREN AND OTHERS, MADE UPON IMPROPER STAMPS, RENDERED VALID.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, May 9, 1801.

HIS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties do hereby give Notice, that, by a Clause in an Act of the present Session of Parliament, Cap. 22. it is enacted, for Remedy of the Inconvenience which has arisen and may arise to Masters and Mistresses of Apprentices, and also to Apprentices, in respect to Indentures of Apprenticeship made for the binding Poor Children and others, which have, through Mistake or Inadvertency, been executed upon Stamps of a different Denomination and Value than required by the several Acts relating to the Stamp Duties, and therefore are not valid or binding on any of the Parties thereto, that, upon Payment on or before the 31st Day of December 1801, of the FULL RATE OR DUTY payable on any such Indenture; or on the Production at this Office of any Indenture of Apprenticeship, where the same shall have been stamped with any Stamp of a higher Value, though of a different Denomination than is required by Law, and tendering the same to be stamped to the proper Officer at the said Office, every such Indenture shall be stamped without Payment of any Penalty whatever; and being so stamped with the proper Stamp (whether done during the Time mentioned therein, or after the Expiration thereof) shall thereupon be good and valid, and the Persons who have incurred any Penalty by such Neglect or Omission, are indemnified against the same, except only in such Cases where any Prosecution shall be now depending.

NEW STAMP DUTIES ON DEEDS, &c.

ed by Two Acts of the last Session of Parliament, on Payment of the said Duties only, without any Penalty, provided the same shall be brought or sent to the Head Office in Somerset-Place, before the ensuing 5th of December.

The Liberality of the Public having kept Pace with the enterprising Spirit and Valour of British Seamen, the Committee have been enabled to testify the high Sense entertained by the Public of the Merits and Services of those brave Men who suffered, in the Cause of their Country, on a Day that will ever be recorded for one of those important and signal Victories which British Fleets have obtained during this War over the Fleets of Enemies.

From the many Difficulties and Impediments in the Distribution of so liberal a Subscription, according to Rank, to Families, and to the Nature of Wounds, and in the finding out the immediate Objects of the public Bounty, or their Families and Relatives, the Committee have not been able to terminate their Labours until the present Moment; and nothing but the Sense of their Duty, aided by the active Exertions of the Commanders and Officers of this gallant Fleet, and the great and unremitting Attention of the Magistrates, Gentry, and Clergy of Great Britain and Ireland, both as to Enquiries and as to the Distribution of Gratuities, could ever have enabled the Committee to present to the Public so full, and, as they trust, so satisfactory a Statement of the Number of Persons who have been relieved, and of the Extent of that Relief, as will be found in the annexed Report.—Out of One Thousand and Forty Cases returned to the Committee as Killed or Wounded in this gallant Engagement, they have happily, with the Exception of Thirty-six Cases, found out, and given Gratuities or Annuities to all the Parties, or their Families and Relatives, exclusively of Twenty-two, who have lost all Claim to Gratuities by Desertion, or who were not, upon further Enquiries, found to have been Wounded.

It is with great Satisfaction that the Committee beg Leave to state, from the Returns made to them soon after the Action, that the Naval Service of this Country has been greatly indebted to the early and able Assistance of the Surgeons and Medical Men of the Fleet, and of the different Hospitals on Shore, for the speedy Recovery of so many Wounded Men.

Gratuities have been paid either directly to the Parties themselves, or to their Families; and Monies have been frequently lodged in the Hands of Friends, for their Benefit, under the Sanction of the Committee, to be paid by Installments, for their Relief, or for the Apprenticeship of Children. In Cases of Death, Attention has been paid under similar Trusts, to the Widows, and to the Fatherless, or to the Relatives of the Deceased.

Annuities have been granted to the Families of the Killed, or to those who have lost Sight or Limb, or who have been disabled by Wounds from providing for themselves or their Families; and Care will be taken to secure the Annual Payment of the same, under certain Regulations and Certificates, free of all Expence to the Parties interested.

Relief has not been confined to British Subjects only; but every Attention has been paid to Foreigners who were on board the Fleet, they having by their Services acquired a natural and a national Claim, to Gratuities for their Sufferings in Defence of this Country.

A Sum has been reserved for the Thirty-six Cases which the Committee have not been able yet to find out. As most of the Cases are those of Foreigners, it is intended to adver-

ise them again; and, if Claimants are not found within Twelve Months, to recommend the Gratuities that then may be due to Foreigners, to be paid over to the Ministers or Heads of Foreign Churches or Communities in London, or to the Consuls of the different Nations to which the Seamen respectively belong, for the Benefit and Relief of those foreign and distressed Seamen that may frequent our Ports in Time of Peace.

The Committee beg Leave to state, that the Subscription raised in Scotland, under the Management of a Committee in Edinburgh, subject to the Appropriation and Recommendation of this Committee, amounted, with Interest, to 3549 l. 7 s. 8 d.; and that, after the Payment of Gratuities and Expences, the Balance of 1402 l. 3 s. 2 d. has been remitted to this Committee, to be applied to the Purposes of this Subscription.—It is with Pleasure they make their public Acknowledgments for the great Assistance they have received from that Committee, and for the active Services rendered by them on this Occasion.

The Subscriptions from Ireland and the East Indies, which have been equally liberal, have been included in the General Fund.

The Committee, wishing to make some further Provision for the Children and Families of those who were Killed or Wounded on the 11th of October 1797, beg to recommend a Sum to be given to the Merchant-Seamen's Office, to the Marine Society, and to the Naval Asylum, respectively, for the Benefit of such Children and Families as may stand in Need of Relief from those Institutions.

The Committee, in discharging the Trust reposed in them, think it their Duty briefly to state the Amount of Receipts and Disbursements, and to recommend to a General Meeting of Subscribers the Appropriation of any eventual Balance, and of any unclaimed Gratuities, after a certain Period, to public Institutions and Objects ultimately connected with the Relief and Support of that useful Class of Men, who have ever formed the great Strength and Nursery of the Commerce and of the Navy of Great Britain.

Resolved,

That this Meeting do approve of the foregoing Report and General Statement of the Account.

Resolved,

That the Sum of Two Hundred Guineas be presented to the Merchant-Seamen's Office, and the like Sum to the Marine Society and the Naval Asylum, respectively, as Institutions intimately connected with the Welfare and Prosperity of the Commerce and Navy of this Country; and as tending to afford, in Peace and in War, Relief and Assistance to a Number of Seamen, with their Families, who have served on board of Admiral Lord Duncan's Fleet.

Resolved,

That the Balance, and all Gratuities voted and outstanding, if not claimed by the Parties themselves, or their Families or Relatives, within Twelve Months from the Date hereof, be at the Disposal of the Committee, in such Manner, and to such Objects, as they may think proper to direct.

That the Thanks of this Meeting be given to Calverley Bewicke, Esq. Chairman of the Committee, for his constant and unremitting Attention in the Management and Concerns of the Subscription, and for the great Zeal and Humanity he has ever exercised toward those numerous Objects who have merited the Attention and Liberality of the Public.

Resolved,

That the Thanks of this Meeting be given to William Vaughan, Esq; for the indefatigable Pains, and the unwearied Zeal and Attention he has ever manifested to the Concerns of the Committee.

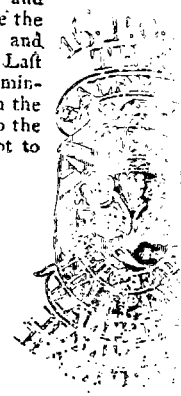
