Copy of a Letter from the Honorable William Cornwallis, Admiral of the Blue, &c. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated off Ushant, the 23d Instant.

S I R,

I Have the Honor of inclosing, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Brisbane, of His Majesty's Ship the Doris, who commands the Frigates employed in watching the Enemy's Fleet at the Entrance of Brest Harbour, in which important Service he has shewn a great Deal of Zeal and Enterprize.

This daring Exploit appears to me to stand as high in point of Credit to his Majesty's Arms, and Glory to those brave Officers and Men who have so nobly achieved it, as any of the Kind ever performed.

S I R, *Doris, off St. Matthew's, July 22, 1801.*

I Have the Honor to inform you, that a most daring and gallant Enterprize was last Night undertaken by the Boats of His Majesty's Ships Doris, Beaulieu, and Uranie, entirely manned by Volunteers, under the Direction of Lieutenant Lock of the Ville de Paris, whose Gallantry on the Occasion is better felt than expressed, who succeeded in boarding and carrying the French National Ship La Chevrette, mounting Twenty Guns, manned and completely prepared with Three Hundred and Fifty Men, under the Batteries in the Bay of
