A PROCLAMATION,

For pardoning such Seamen and Marines as have deserted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the First Day of September next.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are desirous to give all due Encouragement to such Seamen as may have deserted from any of Our Ships, and shall be willing to return to Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as shall repair on board any of Our Ships or Vessels on or before the First Day of September next; and We do hereby further promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Seamen as having deserted are now belonging to some One of Our Ships (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue), and do declare that such Deserters shall be entitled to receive all Wages that may be due to them in the Ship from which they may have deserted, at the Time of such Desertion; and We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deserted from Our Service, and shall, on or before the said First Day of September next, surrender themselves at the Head-Quarters of the Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our said Forces; and We do hereby declare that all Seamen and Marines so surrendering themselves as aforesaid shall be released and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties commenced or incurred by Reason of any such Offence; but We do hereby further declare that all such Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not, on or before the said First Day of September next, surrender themselves on board One of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or at the Head-Quarters of the Marines

established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham or to some Recruiting Party of the said Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be condemned to suffer by Sentence of the said Court.

Given at Our Court at *Weymouth*, the Thirtieth Day of *July* One thousand eight hundred and one, and in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eleventh of February last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or of Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into, or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; and whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be, in Part, continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, do at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twelfth Day of August next, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, within the Limits of Europe, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or any Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, or ship on board any of the Articles above-mentioned, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first had and obtained from His Majesty or His



Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 2. and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 34: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to the Exportation of any of the aforesaid Articles from Great Britain to Ireland, or from Ireland to Great Britain, respectively, or to any Exportation of any of the said Articles, by, or on board of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships, or Vessels, or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the course of her intended Voyage, or to any Exportation thereof by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or from the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being, or from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons within the Limits of Europe, nor to the Exportation of any of the said Articles to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, provided that in case of the Exportation to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, either of Copper being a Naval Store, or of Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, the Exporters thereof, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the said Articles to the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, to carry the said Articles to the Port or Place, without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners respectively, and specified in such Bond of a Certificate or Certificates in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners respectively, as the Case may be, thereby shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe for which they were respectively entered outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

SIR,

I Have the Honor to enclose to you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Hotham, of His Majesty's Ship the *Immortalité*, acquainting me with his having captured the Four Masted French Privateer therein-mentioned.

SIR, *Immortalité, at Sea, July 31, 1801.*

I Have the Honor to inform you, that at One o'Clock in the Morning of the 27th Instant, in Latitude 43 Deg. 34 Min. N. and Longitude 11 Deg. 42 Min. W. I had the good Fortune to fall in with, and, at Half past Seven, to capture a remarkably fine and singularly constructed French Privateer with Four Masts, named *L'Invention*, carrying Twenty-four Guns on a flush Deck, and Two Hundred and Ten Men. She is quite New, had only left Bourdeaux Nine Days before on her first Cruise, and had taken nothing. She is a beautiful Vessel, on a Plan entirely peculiar to herself, designed by her Commander Mr. Thibaut, and of extraordinary Dimensions, being One Hundred and Forty-seven Feet long and Twenty-seven wide, each Mast is rigged in the usual Manner, and she appears to me to answer perfectly well.

During the Chace, at Daylight, His Majesty's Ship *Arethusa* was seen at a Distance, who joined in the Pursuit, and from her Situation, greatly assisted me in capturing her.

SIR,

I Have the Pleasure to transmit a Copy of Lord Cochrane's Letter relative to the very spirited and brilliant Action with a Spanish Xebeck Frigate.

His Majesty's Sloop Speedy, off Barcelona, 6th May 1801, Capello Ferro, N. Four Miles.

SIR,

I Have the Pleasure to inform you, that the Sloop I have the Honor to command, after a mutual Chace and warm Action, has captured a Spanish Xebeck Frigate, of Thirty-two Guns, Twenty-two long Twelve-Pounders, Eight Nines, and Two heavy Carronades, named the *Gamo*, commanded by Don Francisco de Torris, manned by Three Hundred and Nineteen Naval Officers, Seamen, Supernumeraries, and Marines.

The great Disparity of Force rendering it necessary to adopt some Measure that might prove decisive, I resolved to board, and, with Lieutenant Parker, the Honorable Mr. Cochrane, the Boatswain, and Crew, boarded; when, by the Impetuosity of the Attack, we forced them instantly to strike their Colours.

I have to lament in boarding the Loss of One Man only; the severe Wounds received by Lieutenant Parker, both from Musketry and the Sword, One Wound received by the Boatswain, and One Seaman.

I must be permitted to say there could not be greater Regularity nor more cool determined Conduct shewn by Men, than by the Crew of the *Speedy*.

Lieutenant Parker, whom I beg leave to recommend to their Lordships' Notice, as well as the Honorable Mr. Cochrane, deserve all the Approbation that can be bestowed. The Exertions and good Conduct of the Boatswain, Carpenter, and Petty Officers, I acknowledge with Pleasure, as well as the Skill and Attention of Mr. Guthrie the Surgeon.

May 27, 1801.*

SIR,

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that this Morning, at Nine o'Clock, we captured, off Manfredonia, the Corivèlle, a small Vessel, mounting One Brass Gun, commanded by M. Bernard Du Bourdier, Lieutenant of the Régenerée, who with another Officer was carrying Dispatches from Alexandria to Ancona.

Mercury, off the Tremite Islands, in the Adriatic, 23d June, 1801.

MY LORD,

I Have the Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship with the Capture of a notorious French Pirate, this Afternoon, by the Boats of the Mercury and El Corfo: He had taken Refuge in the Morning, when chased by the Corfo, among the Rocks in the Tremite Islands, inhabited by a few Renegadoes only; and upon the Mercury's Appearance landed the greatest Part of his Crew, who posted themselves with a Four-Pounder, and Musketry upon a Hill to defend the Vessel, close to which she lay a-ground with Hawfers fast to the Shore; notwithstanding this advantageous Position, the Boats, under the Command of Lieutenant Mather, of the Mercury, rowed in with great Intrepidity, exposed to a smart Fire of Grape and Musketry from the Vessel and the Hill, while the Mercury and Corfo awed the Enemy by firing what Guns could be brought to bear upon him; and we had the Satisfaction to see our People very gallantly board the Vessel, and land at the same Time to drive the Banditti from the Hill, in which they fortunately succeeded, without the Loss of a Man; and Lieutenant Wilson, with the Party of Marines, maintained the Position, while the Seamen hove the Vessel off the Rocks, and brought her out, with several Prisoners taken upon the Hill. She is a Tartan, called Le Tigre, fitted out at Sinigalia, but lost from Ancona, mounts Eight Six and Twelve-Pounders, and had a Crew of Sixty French and Italians; the Plunder found on board this Vessel is sufficient Evidence of her Character, consisting of Bales of Cotton, and other Goods taken from Vessels of different Nations.

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

War Office, August 1, 1801.

ALL Officers on the Half-Pay of the Land Forces, resident in Great Britain and Ireland, who are not serving in the Militia, or who do not

hold Offices under Government, are hereby required immediately to transmit to the General Officers commanding in the Districts within which they respectively reside, an Account, in Writing, of their Age, past Services, and present Place of Abode, in order that their Services may be called for as Circumstances shall render it expedient: And such as think themselves, from Age or Infirmities, unfit for further Service even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof.

Such Officers on Half-Pay as are serving in the Militia, or are otherwise employed under Government, (Officers of the Yeomanry and Volunteer Corps excepted, whose Reports are to be made to the Generals commanding in Districts as above mentioned,) are to transmit similar Accounts to the Secretary at War, specifying also the Nature of the Public Situations which they possess.

The General Officers commanding in Districts will make Returns to the Secretary at War of the Names of the Officers who shall report themselves in pursuance of the above Notice. And every Officer who shall neglect to make his Report, either to the Commander of a District or to the Secretary at War, according to the Circumstances of his Situation, within One Month from the Date hereof, will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead, and his Name will be struck off the Half-Pay List accordingly.

IN pursuance of Directions received from the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties do hereby give Notice, That, in order to prevent any Inconvenience to those Persons in the different Parts of the Kingdom, who shall not have been able to supply themselves with Vellum, Parchment, and Paper stamped according to an Act of Parliament, to which the Royal Assent was given Yesterday, owing to the Period for its Commencement taking place so soon after the passing thereof, there is a Clause in the said Act, empowering the Commissioners to cause such Instruments, viz. any Indenture, Lease, or other Deed, charged with an additional Duty of Three Shillings by an Act of the Thirty-seventh of the King, Cap. 90. as may, through Necessity, have been executed by any, or all of the Parties, upon Stamps in Use previous to the Year 1801, to be stamped with the additional Duties of FIVE SHILLINGS granted by Two Acts of the last Session of Parliament, on Payment of the said Duties only, without any Penalty, provided the same shall be brought or sent to the Head

Office in Somerset-Place, before the ensuing 5th of December.
