P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled An Act to empower His Majesty to regulate the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until the signing a Definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, and to declare the Isle of Malta to be Part of Europe, reciting, that the Island of Malta, with the Dependencies thereof, are now in the Possession of His Majesty, and that it is expedient, under the present Circumstances, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the same should be regulated for a certain Time in such Manner as shall seem proper to His Majesty: It is enacted, that from and after the passing of that Act, and until the signing a Definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from Time to Time, to give such Directions, and make such Regulations, touching the Trade and Commerce to and from the said Isle, and the Dependencies thereof as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any Thing contained in an Act passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled An Act for the encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation, or in an Act passed in the Seventh and Eighth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled An Act for preventing Frauds and regulating Abuses in the Plantation Trade, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force, relating to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament, Law, Usage, or Custom to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding:

And whereas it is judged expedient that the Port of La Valette, in the Island of Malta, should be declared a Free Port for the Importation into and Exportation from the same, of all Sorts of Goods and Merchandizes in trading Ships or Vessels be-

longing to the Subjects of States in Amity with His Majesty; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and does hereby order and declare, That the Port of La Valette, in the Island of Malta, shall be taken to be, and is hereby made a Free Port, for the Importation into and Exportation from the same of all Sorts of Goods and Merchandizes in Trading Ships or Vessels belonging to the Subjects of States in Amity with His Majesty, of whatever Burthen or in whatever Manner such Ships or Vessels may be navigated, and shall continue to be such Free Port until the signing of a definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, unless His Majesty shall, in the mean Time, otherwise order; subject nevertheless to such Regulations for the Security of the Possession of the Island of Malta and its Dependencies, and the Protection of the Health of the Garrison and Inhabitants thereof, as may be now in force, or shall, from Time to Time, be deemed necessary or expedient in that Behalf:

And it is hereby further ordered, That the same Drawbacks and Bounties, and upon the same Terms and Conditions which now are or hereafter may be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of any Goods and Merchandizes to the Island of Minorca or to Gibraltar, shall and may be allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandizes to the Port of La Valette, in the Island of Malta.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eleventh of February last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of any Sheet Copper,

or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or of Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into, or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; and whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be, in Part, continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, do at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twelfth Day of August next, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, within the Limits of Europe, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or any Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, or ship, or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 2. and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 34: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to the Exportation of any of the aforefaid Articles from Great Britain to Ireland, or from Ireland to Great Britain, respectively, or to any Exportation of any of the said Articles, by, or on board of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships, or Vessels, or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the course of her intended Voyage, or to any Exportation thereof by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or from the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being, or from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons within the Limits of Europe, nor to the Exportation of any of the said Articles to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, provided that in case of the Exportation to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, either of Copper being a Naval Store, or of Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, the Exporters thereof, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the said Articles to the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, to carry the said Articles to the Port or Place, without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or of the Commissioners of His Ma-

jefty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners respectively, and specified in such Bond of a Certificate or Certificates in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners respectively, as the Case may be, thereby shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe for which they were respectively entered outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. A PROCLAMATION,

For pardoning such Seamen and Marines as have deserted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the First Day of September next.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are desirous to give all due Encouragement to such Seamen as may have deserted from any of Our Ships, and shall be willing to return to Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as shall repair on board any of Our Ships or Vessels on or before the First Day of September next; and We do hereby further promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Seamen as having deserted are now belonging to some One of Our Ships (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue), and do declare that such Deserters shall be entitled to receive all Wages that may be due to them in the Ship from which they may have deserted, at the Time of such Desertion; and We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deserted from Our Service, and shall, on or before the said First Day of September next, surrender themselves at the Head-Quarters of the Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our said Forces; and We do hereby declare that all Seamen and Marines so surrendering themselves as aforefaid shall be released and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties commenced or incurred by Reason of any such Offence; but We do hereby further declare that all such Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not, on or before the said First Day of September next, surrender themselves on board One of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or at the Head-Quarters of the Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to some Recruiting Party of the said Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be

condemned to suffer by Sentence of the said Court.

THE following Address having been presented to the King, by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, His Majesty was pleased to receive the same very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Halifax Volunteer Corps of Infantry, assembled at the Consecration of our Royal Imperial Colour of the United Kingdom, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our most cordial and sincere Congratulations for the happy Reinstatement of your Majesty's Health, and with our ardent Wishes for the long Continuance of a Life so truly dear to every Briton.

Permit us once more to renew the Tender of our Services should this happy Isle be invaded, or be even threatened with Invasion, and should the fulfilment of your Majesty's well-known Desires to procure an honorable Peace be protracted by any unreasonable Demands of the Enemy, we most earnestly request to be placed in that Station of Great Britain wherever we can most effectually serve our Country, as we desire to brave all Danger for the Preservation of our beloved Sovereign, and our excellent and unrivalled Constitution.

PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS.

War-Office, August 4, 1801.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are at this Time several Deserters from the different regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's

gracious Pardon, and that such an instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour: His Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant his Free Pardon to all Deserters from his regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of September next, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose

Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector General of the Recruiting Service in the Isle of Wight.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be sent to the Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other regular Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct, that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: But this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps raising Recruits for General Service; which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves in the Isle of Wight to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regiment.

Any Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon; but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

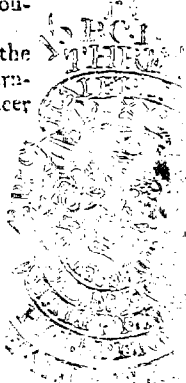

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

War-Office, August 1, 1801.

ALL Officers on the Half-Pay of the Land Forces, resident in Great Britain and Ireland, who are not serving in the Militia, or who do not hold Offices under Government, are hereby required immediately to transmit to the General Officers commanding in the Districts within which they respectively reside, an Account, in Writing, of their Age, past Services, and present Place of Abode, in order that their Services may be called for as Circumstances shall render it expedient: And such as think themselves, from Age or Infirmities, unfit for further Service even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof.

Such Officers on Half-Pay as are serving in the Militia, or are otherwise employed under Government, (Officers of the Yeomanry and Volunteer



Corps excepted, whose Reports are to be made to the Generals commanding in Districts as above mentioned,) are to transmit similar Accounts to the Secretary at War, specifying also the Nature of the Public Situations which they possess.

The General Officers commanding in Districts will make Returns to the Secretary at War of the Names of the Officers who shall report themselves in pursuance of the above Notice. And every Officer who shall neglect to make his Report, either to the Commander of a District or to the Secretary at War, according to the Circumstances of his Situation, within One Month from the Date hereof, will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead, and his Name will be struck off the Half-Pay List accordingly.
