Copy of a Letter from the Honorable William Cornwallis, Admiral of the Blue, &c. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated off Usbant, the 31st August 1801.

Have the Pleasure of transmitting to you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Martin, of His Majesty's Ship Fisgard, by which it appears the Boats of that Ship, the Diamond, and Boadicea have cut out of Corunna a Ship of Twenty Guns, Have the Pleasure of transmitting to you, for and other Vessels.

Lieutenant Pipon, who commanded the Boats, feems to have conducted the Enterprise with much Gallantry and Judgment; for although exposed to a heavy Fire from the Batteries, yet the Success was accomplished without any Loss; and the Conduct of the Officers and Men who were with him merits my warmest Approbation.

SIR, Fisgard, off Ferrol, Angust 21, 1801.

Beg to inform you, that last Night the Boats of His Majesty's Ships Fisgard, Diamond, and Boadicea attacked the Vessels of the Enemy lying in the Harbour of Corunna, and succeeded in bringing out El Neptuna, a new Ship, pierced for Twenty Guns, belonging to His Catholic Majesty, a Gun-Boat mounting a long Thirty-two-Pounder, and a Merchant Ship, who were moored within the firong Batteries that protect the Port, and so near them that the Sentinels on the Ramparts challenged our People, and immediately commenced a heavy Fire, but the Prizes were towed out with a Degree of Coolness and Perseverance that does infinite Credit to the Officers and Men, and can only be equalled by their Conduct throughout the Affair. I should be very glad, if it were in my Power, to do Justice to the Merits of Lieutenant Pipon, who directed this Enterprise with the most becoming Spirit and Address; but his Success will, I trust, sufficiently recommend him to your Approbation, and the Notice of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

#### PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS.

War Office, August 4, 1801. WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are at this Time several Deserters from the different regular Corps in Hia Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that fuch an instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Instuence upon their future Behaviour: His Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant his Free Pardon to all Deferters from his regular Land Forces, who shall furrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of September next, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin

hereof, or to the Inspector General of the Recruititg Service in the Isle

Marllorough. of Wight.

Hereford. Bedford. Ipfrwich. Maidstone. Nottingham. Birmingbam. Shrewsbury. Manchester. Leeds. York. Kendal. Durham.

Edinburgh. Glafgow.

Aberdeen.

Inverness.

Exeter. Winchester.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be sent to the Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such Regiments as His Majelty may be pleased to command; and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the faid Deferters may have enlisted in other regular Corps, and are now ferving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to

direct, that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly ferved: But this Clause is not to extend to Deferters enlifted by the Corps raising Recruits for General Service; which Deferters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves in the Isle of Wight to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regi-

Any Soldier who may defert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
