Copy of a Letter from Mr. John Pettigrew, Commander of the Ship Intrepid Letter of Marque, to Evan Nepcan, Esq; dated Barbadoes, 9th July 1801.

Have the Honor to acquaint you, for the Infer-mation of the Lords Commissioners of the Ad miralty, that on the 22d Day of June, in N. Latitude 18 Deg. 25 Min., W. Longitude, per Accompts, 40 Deg. 10 Min. on board the Ship Intrepid of Liverpool, bearing Letters of Marque, under my Command, having in Company the Ships Dominica Packet and Alfred, I had the good Fortune to capture, after a running Engagement of nearly Two Hours, the Spanish Frigate built Ship La Galga, commanded by Francisco de Pascadello, and mounting Twenty-four heavy Sixes and Seventy-eight Men, bound to Cadiz or any Port in Spain, loaded with Hides, Cocoa, Indigo, and Copper in Bars, the Quantity not yet known; I am happy to fay we fultained no other Lofs than that of one of my brave Men, and our Sails and Rigging a good deal cut; the other Ships have not sustained any Damage, except the Prize, which has suffered considerably in both Hull, and Masts, and Rigging; I arrived here on the 4th of July, with the Prize and above-mentioned Ships.

#### PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS.

War-Office, August 4, 1801. HEREAS it has been repretented to the King, that there are at this Time feveral Deferters from the different regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that fuch an infrance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour: His Majesty has been gra-ciously pleased to grant his Free Pardon to all Deferters from his regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of September next, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose

Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector General of the Recruiting Service in the Isle Exeter. Winchester. Marlborough. of Wight.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be sent Hereford. Bedford. Ipsīvich. to the Regiments from which they Maidstone. respectively deserted, or be appointed to such Regiments as His Majesty Nottingham. may be pleased to command; and, Birmingbam. Shrewfoury. when fo placed, shall not be liable to Manchester. be claimed by any other Corps to Leeds. which they may formerly have be-York. longed.

Kendal. And whereas many of the faid De-Durham. ferters may have enlifted in other regular Corps, and are now ferving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters Edinlurgh. Glafgow. Aberdeen. Invernefs. the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct, that they shall continue to

ferve in the Corps wherein they now are, without

being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters, in order to entitle them to the Benesit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any suture Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: But this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps raising Recruits for General Service; which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves in the Isle of Wight to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regigiment.

Any Soldier who may defert after these His Wajesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
