The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

X/HEREAS by Order in Council, dated the Tenth of December last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty, by an Act passed in the Forty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to au-" thorize His Majesty, from Time to Time, to pro-" hibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food;" and mentioned in the said Order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the First Day of October next, no Person or Persons whatfoever, should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, Bacon, Butter, Cheese, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulse of any Sort, Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, subject to the Provisions and Exceptions in the faid Order contained: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, purfuant to the Powers velted in His Majelly by the faid Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export, or to lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with Intent to export any of the Articles as aforefaid, shall continue and remain in force until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Sellion of Parliament, subject to the like Provitions and Exceptions as are contained in His Majesty's Taid Order of the Tenth December last, and in a subsequent Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth of the faid Month of Decem-

DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received at the Office of the Right Honorable Lord Hobart, One of His Majelly's Principal Secretaries of State, from Colonel Fraser, commanding His Majesty's Troops at Gorée, on the Coast of Africa.

MY LORD, Gorée, Africa, June 16, 1801. Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that, having received Intelligence that there was a large Ship, under Spanish Colours, laying off Senegal, which had been brought there by Part of the Crew, who, affifted by a Number of Slaves, had murdered the Officers and feized the Vessel on the Southern Coast of Africa; understanding likewise that it had been proposed by Citizen Renaud, as soon as the Cargo was landed, to refit this Ship, attack with her the British Vessels, trading for Gum, in the open Roads of Port Andique, then, renewing the Depredations that had been formerly committed at Sierra Leone and other Settlements, to run with the Plunder for Cayenne, I refolved, if possible, to frustrate those Intentions, by taking or destroying the Spanish Ship while the Cargo was landing, and it was probable the Enemy would be little prepared for making Defence.
Having requested the Affistance of Mr. Oldor-

man, Commander of the Merchant Ship Lucy, of man, Commander of the Merchant Snip Lucy, of Liverpool, (the only Armed Vessel on this Part of the Coast,) he complied most readily; a few Seamen were procured from the other Traders to reinforce the little Government Schooner, chiefly navigated by Blacks, and a Detachment from this Garrison, confilling of Enfigns M Dermot and Kingsley, Assistant-Surgeon Ryan, and Forty Men-embarked, and failed on the 8th Instant under the Command of Captain Lloyd.

On the 15th Captain Lloyd returned; and his Report, which I have the Honor to enclose, your Lordship will see that the Enemy was taken by Surprise, and a new Ship, capable of mounting

without the Loss of one Man.

All Persons employed on this Service were Volunteers; and the Alacrity with which they engaged in it merits the highest Praise.

Gorée, June 15, 1801. Have the Honor to acquaint you, that in confequence of your Orders I proceeded to the Bar of Scnegal with the Detachment under my Command; and on the Morning of the 12th Instant discovered a large Ship at Anchor about Two Miles off the Bar; on our Approach the Crew betook themselves to their Boats; on boarding she was found to be a new Spanish Ship pierced for Thirty Guns, and about Nine Hundred Tons Burthen; that she had been unloaded, thripped of her Sails, Rigging, &c. &c. Finding it impracticable, from the State of the Vessel and the Wind blowing the State of the Veffel, and the Wind blowing throng on Shore, to bring her off, I gave Directions to Mr. Crady, Maker of the Government Schooner, to fet her on Fire, which he executed very much to my Satisfaction, and without any Accident. In Jullice to the Officers and Men under my Command, I beg Leave to mention that they displayed the greatest Readiness in executing any Orders I had to give, and had there been any Occation, would, I am convinced, have conducted themfelves in fuch a Manner as to merit Approbation.

> Whitehall, September 15, 1801. As Several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their several Callings, contrery to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Alfracts of Alls of Parliament of Their late Mayesties King George the First and Second, and of His prefent Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Entiring Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufaqurers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. F any Periou shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercifing any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Perfons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor of Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devile, or Purchase, and shall forseit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind

him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give fuch Sccurity to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or feduced, forteit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Gaol of the County or .Stewartry wherein fuch Offeuder shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid,

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Bri--tain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Oftence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be

allowed. It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in force of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils pro-

board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools to feized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty. and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Veffel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or figh any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His prefent Majesty. BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ircland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatfover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers fuffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
