AT the Court at *Weymouth*, the 7th of September 1801,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Order in Council, dated the Tenth of December last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty, by an Act passed in the Forty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty, from Time to Time, to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food;" and mentioned in the said Order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the First Day of October next, no Person or Persons whatsoever, should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, Bacon, Butter, Cheese, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulse of any Sort, Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, subject to the Provisions and Exceptions in the said Order contained; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Prohibition to export, or to lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with Intent to export any of the Articles as aforesaid, shall continue and remain in force until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, subject to the like Provisions and Exceptions as are contained in His Majesty's said Order of the Tenth December last, and in a subsequent Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth of the said Month of Decem-

ber; and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received at the Office of the Right Honorable Lord Hobart, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Colonel Frazer, commanding His Majesty's Troops at Gorée, on the Coast of Africa.

MY LORD, *Gorée, Africa, June 16, 1801.*

I Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that, having received Intelligence that there was a large Ship, under Spanish Colours, laying off Senegal, which had been brought there by Part of the Crew, who, assisted by a Number of Slaves, had murdered the Officers and seized the Vessel on the Southern Coast of Africa; understanding likewise that it had been proposed by Citizen Renaud, as soon as the Cargo was landed, to refit this Ship, attack with her the British Vessels, trading for Gum, in the open Roads of Port Andique, then, renewing the Depredations that had been formerly committed at Sierra Leone and other Settlements, to run with the Plunder for Cayenne, I resolved, if possible, to frustrate those Intentions, by taking or destroying the Spanish Ship while the Cargo was landing, and it was probable the Enemy would be little prepared for making Defence.

Having requested the Assistance of Mr. Olderman, Commander of the Merchant Ship Lucy, of Liverpool, (the only Armed Vessel on this Part of the Coast,) he complied most readily; a few Seamen were procured from the other Traders to reinforce the little Government Schooner, chiefly navigated by Blacks, and a Detachment from this Garrison, consisting of Ensigns M'Dermot and Kingsley, Assistant-Surgeon Ryan, and Forty Men embarked, and sailed on the 8th Instant under the Command of Captain Lloyd.

On the 15th Captain Lloyd returned; and by his Report, which I have the Honor to enclose, your Lordship will see that the Enemy was taken by Surprise, and a new Ship, capable of mounting

Thirty Guns on her Main Deck, has been destroyed without the Loss of one Man.

All Persons employed on this Service were Volunteers; and the Alacrity with which they engaged in it merits the highest Praise.

Gorée, June 15, 1801.

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that in consequence of your Orders I proceeded to the Bar of Senegal with the Detachment under my Command; and on the Morning of the 12th Instant discovered a large Ship at Anchor about Two Miles off the Bar; on our Approach the Crew betook themselves to their Boats; on boarding she was found to be a new Spanish Ship pierced for Thirty Guns, and about Nine Hundred Tons Burthen; that she had been unloaded, stripped of her Sails, Rigging, &c. &c. Finding it impracticable, from the State of the Vessel, and the Wind blowing strong on Shore, to bring her off, I gave Directions to Mr. Crady, Master of the Government Schooner, to set her on Fire, which he executed very much to my Satisfaction, and without any Accident. In Justice to the Officers and Men under my Command, I beg Leave to mention that they displayed the greatest Readiness in executing any Orders I had to give, and had there been any Occasion, would, I am convinced, have conducted themselves in such a Manner as to merit Approbation.

The King has been pleased to grant the Dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, unto the Right Honorable Murchough Marquis of Thomond, Knight of the Most

Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and the Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style, and Title of Baron Thomond, of Taplow-Court, in the County of Buckingham.

Whitehall, September 15, 1801.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind

him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on

board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

Notice is hereby given, that Application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the next Session, for an Act to amend, alter, vary, and enlarge the Powers of an Act, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for opening, making, widening, and altering certain Streets, Passages, and Places within the Town of Liverpool, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; for supplying the said Town with fresh and wholesome Water; for removing and preventing Nuisances and Annoyances therein; for appointing additional Market-Places, and for extending so much of the Powers of an Act of the Second Year of His present Majesty, as relates to Hackney Coachmen, Chairmen, Car-

ters, and Porters, to a certain Distance beyond the Liberties of the said Town." And also, for Powers to carry into effect a Plan for erecting certain Buildings, near Chapel-Street and Tythebarn-Street, intended to be called the Exchange.

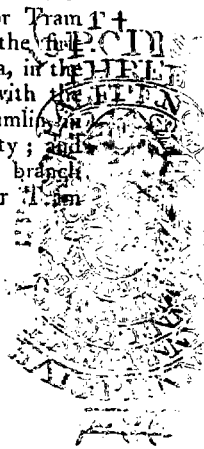
