The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

X/HEREAS by Order in Council, dated the Tenth of December last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty, by an Act passed in the Forty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An A& to au-" thorize His Majesty, from Time to Time, to pro-" hibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food;" and mentioned in the faid Order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the First Day of October next, no Person or Persons whatfoever, should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, Bacon, Butter, Cheefe, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulse of any Sort, Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, subject to the Provisions and Exceptions in the faid Order contained: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, purfuant to the Powers velted in His Majelly by the faid Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export, or to lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with Intent to export any of the Articles as aforefaid, shall continue and remain in force until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Sellion of Parliament, subject to the like Provitions and Exceptions as are contained in His Majesty's faid Order of the Tenth December last, and in a subsequent Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth of the faid Month of Decem-

DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received at the Office of the Right Honorable Lord Hobart, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Colonel Fraser, commanding His Majesty's Troops at Gorée, on the Coast of Africa.

MY LORD, Gorée, Africa, June 16, 1801. Have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that, having received Intelligence that there was a large Ship, under Spanish Colours, laying off Senegal, which had been brought there by Part of the Crew, who, affifted by a Number of Slaves, had murdered the Officers and feized the Vessel on the Southern Coast of Africa; understanding likewise that it had been proposed by Citizen Renaud, as soon as the Cargo was landed, to refit this Ship, attack with her the British Vessels, trading for Gum, in the open Roads of Port Andique, then, renewing the Depredations that had been formerly committed at Sierra Leone and other Settlements, to run with the Plunder for Cayenne, I refolved, if possible, to frustrate those Intentions, by taking or destroying the Spanish Ship while the Cargo was landing, and it was probable the Enemy would be little prepared for making Defence.
Having requested the Affistance of Mr. Oldor-

man, Commander of the Merchant Ship Lucy, of man, Commander of the Merchant Snip Lucy, of Liverpool, (the only Armed Vessel on this Part of the Coast,) he complied most readily; a few Seamen were procured from the other Traders to reinforce the little Government Schooner, chiefly navigated by Blacks, and a Detachment from this Garrison, confilling of Enfigns M Dermot and Kingsley, Assistant-Surgeon Ryan, and Forty Men-embarked, and failed on the 8th Instant under the Command of Captain Lloyd.

On the 15th Captain Lloyd returned; and his Report, which I have the Honor to enclose, your Lordship will see that the Enemy was taken by Surprife, and a new Ship, capable of mounting
