For his unceasing Solitude and active Exertions to relieve the Distresses of the poorer Classes of Society, by his laudable Endeavours to reduce the Price of Bread and other Necessaries of Life:

For his Efforts to repress the Evils of Monopoly, by directing Prosecutions against Foresters, Engrossers, and Regrators:

For the judicious and effectual Steps he took in order to counteract the nefarious Misrepresentations of the interested Dealers in Corn and Flour, by ascertaining the actual Quantity of Grain weekly imported into the Port of London, and so properly promulgating this important Information from Time to Time to the Public:

For his Vigilance in detecting the seditious Sales and Returns of the Quantity and Price of Flour from which the Assize of Bread is regulated:

For the prompt and able Arrangement he made for obtaining a Supply of Seamen for His Majesty's Navy, at a Period when the Nation was threatened with an Invasion; and for the qualified Manner in which he permitted the Search for Seamen concealing themselves within this City and Liberties, thereby evincing his Zeal for the Public Service, and a due Regard to the Rights and Privileges of his fellow Citizens:

For his Kindness and Liberality to the distressed, and his compassionate Attention to the misguided and unfortunate:

For his liberal Hospitality, without Ostentation; and for the honorable and independent Manner in which he has discharged all the various Duties of the Office of Chief Magistrate of this City.
