WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of June last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to refrain the carrying of Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Ho-

norable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fourth Day of June last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Tenth Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained of His Majesty or His Privy Council: But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called *Lignum Vitæ*

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to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

His Majesty, Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, having been pleased, by Letters Patent under His Royal Sign Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, to dispense with all the Statutes and Regulations usually observed in regard to Installation; and to give and grant unto Twenty-four Knights Elect of the said Most Noble Order, full Power and Authority to exercise all Rights and Privileges belonging to Knights Companions thereof, as if they had been formally installed: And having also been pleased, by Warrant under His Royal Sign Manual and the Signet of the Order, to command Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter-Principal King of Arms, to remove the Achievements of all the Knights Companions deceased; and to place, or cause to be placed, in the Royal Chapel of Saint George within this Castle, those of the present Knights Companions, according to the Form and Manner set forth in a Scheme annexed to the said Warrant; His Majesty's Commands have accordingly been carried into effect; and the several Achievements of their Royal Highnesses William Henry Duke of Clarence and St. Andrews, Edward Duke of Kent and Strathern, Ernest Augustus Duke of Cumberland and Teviotdale, Prince Augustus Frederick, and Prince Adolphus Frederick; their Serene Highnesses William Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, and Ernest Duke of Saxe Gotha; Prince William Frederick, Son of His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester; Charles Duke of Richmond, William Duke of Devonshire, William Marquis of Lansdown, Henry Duke of Beaufort, George Marquis of Buckingham, Charles Marquis Cornwallis, Hugh Duke of Northumberland, John Earl of Chatham, James Marquis of Salisbury, John Earl of Westmorland, Frederick Earl of Carlisle, Henry Duke of Buccleugh, William Henry Cavendish Duke of Portland, George John Earl Spencer, John Jeffreys Earl Camden, and John Duke of Roxburghe, have been placed over their respective Stalls in the said Chapel.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Borlase Warren, Bart. and K. B. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Port Mahon, 24th October 1801.

SIR,

I have enclosed to you the Copy of a Letter relative to the Transactions that have taken place at Porto Ferrajo, which I request you will be pleased

to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

SIR, Porto Ferrajo, October 11, 1801.

IN my Letter of Yesterday I had the Honor to report to you, that the Enemy had shewn lately some Disposition to advance and take Ground nearer our Works, and this Morning I found they had thrown up an Intrenchment of Earth and Gabions upon a Peninsula or Tongue of Land within Two Hundred Yards of our Works.

I immediately determined to destroy the Work and dislodge them before they could have Time to strengthen or bring any Guns upon it: I appointed De Bercy's Corps for this Service with a Party of Peasants to destroy the Work, and the Maltese Corps, under Major Weir, to support and cover them; about Eleven o'Clock they crossed the Ditch, drove the Enemy from the Ground, and destroyed the Work.

The Enemy made Two or Three Attempts to advance in Force, but were completely kept in Check by our Grape-Shot from the Batteries, which were admirably well served; their Batteries kept up a very heavy Fire of Round and Grape-Shot, which did us very little Harm. The Business being completed, the Troops returned into the Works, having suffered inconsiderably in Numbers; though we have to lament One Officer killed and Three wounded.

I was a good deal inclined to have kept Possession of the Ground, but upon Consideration of the Weakness of our Force, I thought it scarcely tenable so close to the Enemy's Works, more especially as we were advised this Morning of their having got a Reinforcement of Two Hundred Men from Piombino, Two or Three Nights ago. I flatter myself, however, they are equally convinced of their Inability to keep a Post so near us.

The Enemy admit between Sixty and Seventy killed and wounded, and Three Officers; and from what we could see ourselves, I am persuaded they are within the Mark in this Calculation.
