WHEREAS by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, and amend an Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for prohibiting the Exportation, and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, and to continue for the same Period, an Act of the last Session of Parliament for prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn, or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and for permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty;" It is, amongst other Things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and he and they is and are thereby authorised, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, during the Continuance of the said Act, from Time to Time, when, and as often as the same shall be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, or under and subject to such Restrictions, Regulations, and Provisions, as shall be specified by His said Majesty in any Order in Council, the Exportation from any Part of the United Kingdom of any Articles of Provision; and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition, either in Part or in the Whole, or to make any new Regulations, Restrictions, and Provisions relating thereto, as Circumstances may require, any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament, to the contrary thereof notwithstanding; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the said Act, is pleased to order, (and it is hereby ordered,) that for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this Order, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export, or shall load or lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain, any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lamb, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or

otherwise, or any Beans, Butter, Onions, or Pulse of any Sort, or any Barley-hulled, or Pearl-Barley: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of such and so much of any of the said Articles as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel on its Voyage out and Home for the Sustainance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others on board such Ship or Vessel, or for the Use and Sustainance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board such Ship or Vessel; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service, or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit at any Time the Exportation of such and so much of any of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the said Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively, in such Quantities as shall be judged to be necessary by the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, upon Application to be made from Time to Time, and under Licences to be granted by their Lordships; or without such Licences, provided Proof shall be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the Articles so to be exported as aforesaid, are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit the Exportation from any Port of Great Britain to any Port of



Ireland, of any of the Articles above-mentioned, provided the Persons so exporting the same shall enter into Bonds, with sufficient Sureties, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, for the due landing thereof in the Ports in Ireland for which the same shall be respectively cleared out, and shall also comply with all other Conditions which now are or hereafter may be required by Law in respect to such Exportation:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit, at any Time, any Person or Persons from shipping or putting on board any of the Articles above-mentioned, to be carried from any Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, having such or the like Coast-Sufferance, Cocquet, or other Coast-Dispatch, for that Purpose, and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the same as now is or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts required in Relation to the carrying Coastwise any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. *Steph. Cottrell.*

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," (which Act, by subsequent Acts, has been further continued until Forty Days after the Commencement of the present Session of Parliament,) His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, (and it was thereby ordered,) That the Prohibition contained in an Order made, by His Majesty in Council, on the Sixteenth Day of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, on the Exportation, or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Vessel with Intent to export, from any Port or Place of Great Britain, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereto, should be and continue in Force until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the first Session of Parliament that should be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one; excepting nevertheless out of such Prohibition, any Foreign Corn, or Meal or Flour that should have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and under the Conditions mentioned in an Act, passed in the Thirty first Year

of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," and should not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Consumption; and with Exception also as to the carrying Coastwise or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several Sorts of Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, from Great Britain, for any of the Purposes mentioned in the said Act:

And whereas His Majesty was also pleased by His said Order in Council of the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, to continue in like Manner, and for the like Term, the Liberty to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and likewise the Liberty to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tarés, Lentiles, Calavances, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Ham, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout; Provided that a due Entry should be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that should be so imported, with the proper Officer of the Customs at the Port where the same should be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Act mentioned:

And whereas, by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, and amend an Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, and to continue, for the same Period, an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and for permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty," the said Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, and the subsequent Acts continuing the same, are further continued until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three:

and the said Permission to import and take out of Warehouse Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforesaid, and likewise to import certain other Articles of Provision, as expressed in the said Order bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, with every Exception, Proviso, Rule, Regulation, and Restriction specified in the said Order respecting such Exportation, Importation, or taking out of Warehouse, and all Matters and Things in the said Order contained shall, be, and continue in Force for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this Order:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Copy of a Letter from the Right Honorable Lord Keith, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated at Sea, the 14th of September, 1801.

SIR,

IT is with great Concern that I acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, of the Capture of His Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, by Gantlaume's Squadron, on his Return to France, after his unsuccessful Attempt to debark Troops on the Coast of Egypt; I enclose a Copy of Captain Hallowell's Communication of that unfortunate Event; and have the Honor to be, Sir, &c. &c.

On board L'Indivisible, in Toulon Road, 24th July 1801.

MY LORD,

IT is with infinite Concern, I have to inform your Lordship, of the Capture of His Majesty's late Ship Swiftsure, by a Squadron of French Ships under the Command of Rear-Admiral Gantheaume.

Having separated from my Convoy, consisting of Carrels and light Transports, on the 22d ultimo, I was making the best of my Way to Malta, when on the Morning of the 24th, at Half-past Three, the Wind at N.W. Cape Derne, bearing S.W.

distant about Seven Leagues, we discovered Five Sail to Leeward of us nearly Hull-down.

As Lieutenant Sheppard, of the Pigmy Cutter, had informed me on the 19th that an Enemy's Squadron had quitted Durasso on the 7th, where they had attempted to land their Troops, I concluded the Ships in Sight were those of which he had given me Intelligence, and made all the Sail possible to get from them: At Sunrise my Suspicions were realized: we clearly distinguished Four of them to be of the Line, the other a large Frigate, and their Signal Flags soon pointed them out to be Enemies. At Half past Five Two of the Line of Battle Ships tacked, by Signal, and stood on till they fetched into our Wake, while the other Two and the Frigate stood upon the same Tack with us. At Eight o'Clock the Two Ships and Frigate having fore-reached considerably on us, tacked and stood towards us until they got on our Lee Quarter, when they tacked again. From their great Superiority of Sailing they closed with us so fast as to be nearly within Gun-Shot by Two P. M., and as the Ships Astern were coming up very fast, I determined on bearing down and engaging the Two Ships and Frigate to Leeward, hoping to disable one of them before the whole Squadron could be brought into Action, and thereby effect our Escape by getting to Leeward of them: Three o'Clock I bore up and steered to pass Astern of the sternmost Ship, all our steering Sails set on the Starboard Side, when the Enemy tacked and stood toward us:—At Half past Three the Indivisible, of Eighty Guns, bearing Rear-Admiral Gantheaume's Flag, and the Dix Adout, of Seventy-four Guns, being in close Order, and within Half Gun-Shot of us, opened their Fire, which was instantly answered, and a warm Action ensued. Their great Superiority in point of Sailing gave them every Advantage of Position, and baffled all our Attempts to get to Leeward of them. At Thirty-seven Minutes past Four the Jean Bart and Constitution, of Seventy-four Guns, being within Gun-Shot, and closing upon our Starboard Quarter very fast, the Indivisible almost on board of us on our Larboard Bow, and the Dix Adout on our Larboard Quarter, our Fore-Yard and Fore Top-sail-Yard shot away, all our Running and Part of our standing Rigging cut to Pieces, the Fore-Mast, Mizzen-Mast, and Main-Yard badly wounded, our Deck lumbered with the Wreck and Sails, all Hopes of making our Escape or falling in with any Succour being cut off, and only one of the Enemy's Ships apparently much damaged, I thought farther Resistance, in our crippled State, would be exposing the Lives of valuable Men without any Advantage to their Country resulting from it, with Pain, therefore, I ordered His Majesty's Colours to be struck, after an Action of One Hour and Seven Minutes.

Most sincerely, my Lord, do I lament our having been opposed to so very superior a Force, as from the steady and gallant Conduct of the Officers and Men I had the Honor to command on this Occasion, and with whom I had been acting nearly Four Years on various Services, I have not a Doubt of what would have been the Issue of a Contest on more equal Terms. Our Loss has been principally in Masts, Yards, Sails, and Rigging, having only Two Men killed, Lieutenant Davis, and Seven Men wounded, (Two of whom are since dead of their

Wounds,) the Enemy's Intention being to disable us in our Rigging, in which they succeeded too well; at the Commencement of this unequal Contest, we were Eighty-six Men short of Complement, and had Fifty-nine Sick, those who returned from the Army before Alexandria, having introduced a bad Fever into the Ship.

Four Hundred Men were put on board the Swiftsure on the Evening of her Capture, many of the Prisoners removed, and the Ship in so crippled a State as to render it necessary to take her in Tow; the next Day Carpenters and Seamen from all the Ships were sent on board to repair her Damages, and Soldiers to complete her Number to Seven Hundred; and with all their Exertions, and the Advantage of smooth Water, it was Six Days before they were able to make sail.

On the 4th of July, between Lampidofa and Pantalaria, they fell in with and captured the Mohawk Letter of Marque, from Bristol to Malta, laden with various Articles of Merchandise; on the 22d they anchored in this Road, in general, very sickly, with out having landed any Part of their Troops on the Coast of Egypt or Barbary, although they attempted a Debarkation at Derne, on the 23d Ultimo, but from the hostile Appearance and Reception of the Natives, they did not persevere, and returned to their Ships without landing a single Person.

I feel it a Duty I owe to Admiral Gantheaume to mention to your Lordship the handsome Manner in which we have all been treated by the Officers of his Squadron, and by him in particular, the strictest Orders have been issued to preserve the Property of every Individual, and he has done every Thing in his Power to render the Situation of the Officers and Men as comfortable as possible.
