

scissors of them; but that these having received the supply mentioned, hence, were preparing to fall upon the Indians, in which they promised themselves a good success and that the consequence of that would be their Submision. It is said, and that for certain, that the Frigates fitted out by the Elector of Brandenburg, concerning whose design so much enquiry and stir has been made, are designed for Africa, to establish a Colony on those Coasts.

Hague, Sept. 6. Yesterday the States of Holland met for the first time since their last recess. The Prince of Orange, who is gone to Breda, will be here tomorrow or the day following. It is reported that the Duke de Villa Hermosa will meet his Highness at Breda, to confer with him concerning the present State of Affairs, as well as to take his leave of him before his return for Spain. Count Asef, whom the King of Denmark sent to Compliment the French King upon his coming into Flanders, is returned home by Sea, having Embarked at Dunkirk, but some of his Servants are come hither.

Hague, Sept. 10. On Saturday last the Pensioner Faget acquainted the States of Holland (and the same day the like notice was given to the States General by the President of the Assembly) That the Prince of Orange having been long since Invited by the Duke of Zell to take the diversion of Hunting in his Country, his Highness had resolved to make a step so far for three Weeks or a Month, which the States very well approved of, and wished his Highness a good Journey. It is believed his Highness will from thence give a visit to the Elector of Brandenburg at Magdeburg. The French Ambassador here seems not pleased with this Journey. Monsieur Guidensstolp, Envoy Extraordinary from Sweden, is to have his Audience of the States tomorrow.

Brussels, Sept. 4. Some have said that the Duke de Villa Hermosa would return hither no more, but that he would stay in Flanders till the arrival of the Prince of Parma, his Successor, and then go and Embark at Ostend on the Men of War that bring the said Prince from Spain, but it deserves no Credit, for it being always customary for our Governors at their departure to take their leave of the States of Brabant, and to perform several other things which must be done here, it's not to be doubted but his Excellency will conform himself to the practice of his Predecessors in those Ceremonies. The French have again Seized several Villages in Luxemburg, but upon what pretence we cannot yet well understand. Though the Conferences at Courtray are quite broken up, yet our Commissioners, as well as those of France, remain there in expectation of having the matter about the Title of Burgundy accommodated, of which we cannot hitherto see any appearance, if what they write from Madrid may be believed, viz. That the King is absolutely resolved not to quit that Title, as looking upon this pretention of the French to be without any Foundation.

Brussels, Sept. 6. We expect the Duke de Villa Hermosa back from Flanders this night or tomorrow; There was a report that his Excellency intended, ere he returned hither, to go to Breda, to meet the Prince of Orange there, but it is a mistake: His Excellency has sent hither, from Flanders, two hundred thousand Florins, to pay his Debts, which are accordingly all Discharged, and his Goods are already sent away for Ostend, to be Shipped there for Spain. His Excellency has changed the Magi-

strates of Bruges, and was yesterday at the Review of the Cavalry of Flanders at Demise, where the Prince de Faudemont entertained his Excellency and the General Officers at Dinner. From Luxemburg we have advice that the French have possessed themselves of Vervon, with above 40 Villages that depend upon it. There are great disorders at Lege, the Bughers having taken up Arms on occasion of a certain Duty which their Prince, the Elector of Cologne, had laid upon all Merchandizes.

Paris, Sept. 7. Since the return of the Court from Flanders, there has been a discourse as if the King intended another Progress towards Provence, Languedoc, Guienne, &c. but upon what ground we cannot learn. The Prince of Conde is sick of an Ague as is likewise Mademoiselle d'Orleans. We are told that Orders are sent to the Duke de Vronne to joyn all the Gallies together, and the to stand over for Tripoli, taking with him the Men of War under the command of the Sieur du Quesne, and to oblige those Pyrates to a Peace, or otherwise to attack their Ships that are in Port. It is likewise said that directions are sent to the Count d'Estree, who is now in the West-Indies, to go to Cartagena, and demand restitution of a French Ship that has been taken by the Spaniards, and if refused, to compel them to give him satisfaction, and that done, to return home, having first left three Men of War at Martenico.

Plymouth, Aug. 31. On Sunday last came in here the Dartmouth Frigate, Captain Churchill Commander, from Cruising, having been in a great deal of bad weather.
