Naples, Aug. 16.

Our Viceroy the Marquis de los Veloz has received Orders from Madrid, to hasten the Levy of 2000 Men, which he received formerly directions to make in this Kingdom, for the Service of the State of Milan; and accordingly his Excellency has let the Officers employed therein know, that they must have their several Companies compleat, by the first of October, which its thought they will hardly be able to do, not having yet raised above 200 Men of the 2000, and besides, the Money necessary for this Service, is not yet all provided.

Genova, Aug. 28. The 25th Instant, being the Feast of St. Louis, the Duke de Morsemar, and the Officers of the French Gallies observed it with much Solemnity. This morning the said Gallies sailed from hence to the Westward. The Sieur du Quesne, according to our last Advice, was with the Men of War under his Command at Cagliari in Sardinia, and had demanded the restitution of a French Ship, taken, as is pretended, by the Spaniards, after the Signing the Peace between the two Crowns. The Squadron of five Gallies of this State arrived at Messina the 12th Instant, as did those of the Great Duke of Tuscany two days before. Several Troops arrive daily at Final from Spain, designed for Milan, from whence we have an Account, that the Count de Melgar their Governour, had borrowed 100000 Crowns, with which he intended to buy Ammunition.

Madrid, Aug. 22. On Saturday last parted hence the Prince of Parma for the Groene, to Embarke there for Flanders, he has with him two hundred thousand pieces of Eight for the payment of the Militia there, which will make his arrival the more welcome. Two days since the Contract of Marriage between Don Pedro d' Arragon, and the Daughter of the Duke de Medina Celi, a Lady of 16 years old, was Concluded and Signed, and so soon as the Dispensation arrives from Rome, they will be Married. The King has conferred the Charge of Maistre de Camp General of his Forces in the Spanish Netherlands, to Don Antonio Panyagua, at present Governor of Badajoz, which he is to exercise joyntly with the Prince de Rahe.

Lisbon, Aug. 29. By a Vessel arrived here we have Advice, that Don Pedro d' Almeida, Viceroy of the Indies, is dead; and that most of the people that were sent from hence to establish a Colony at the entrance of the River Cuama in Africa, were perished by Sicknes; and that the Portuguese, who had possessed themselves of the Town of Patia, had been besieged there by the Natives, who in few days forced the place, and destroyed all they found in it.

Copenhagen, Aug. 23. From Elfenour they tell us, that the Brandenburg Frigates are still in the Sound, expecting another Fireship that was to come to them from the Pillow; and that it was not yet certainly known, what Design they are going upon. We do not yet hear any thing of the restoring Wismar to the Swedes, who are now Repossess of all they held in Germany before the late War, except that Place, and some Bailages that were yielded by the Peace to the Elector of Brandenburg, and the Princes of Lunenburg. The King of Sweden is, as we hear, expected in Schonen, to visit his Troops in that Province. The Duke of Hanover is now with the Queen-Mother at Nicopping.

Mosco, July 20. Two days since our Czar was privately Married, and the Gates of the Castle are still kept shut, no body being permitted to come in, without special leave; which is done to prevent the Effect of any Charms, which they have an opinion here are frequently used.

Warsaw, Aug. 20. The Commissioners of this Crown are now in Conference with those appointed by the Grand Signior, for the regulating the Limits, which when they have done, all occasion of difference between us and the Port will be taken away, which if we may believe the Advices we receive from the Port, the Turks will be no less pleased with, than we; the Grand Signior, as they tell us, being resolved to maintain inviolably, the Peace established between the two Nations, and to make use of all opportunities, to manifest the sincerity of his intentions towards this Kingdom; but at the same time seems fixed in his first purpose of making War upon the Moscovites, till such time as the Czar will for the sake of a Peace, be content to yield the Ukraïn, which is a very large Territory, to the Ottomans: Our Ambassador is not yet arrived at Mosco, at least we have not any account that he is; the Matters he is gone to Treat about at that Court are of Importance enough, to make every Body impatient to know the success of his Negotiation, upon which no less depends, than the engaging this Kingdom in a War against the Turks; for if the Moscovites will at last enter into an Alliance Offensive and Defensive with this Crown against the Port, upon just and reasonable terms, nothing will then remain to be done, but our entering into the War.

Strasbourg, Sept. 5. The French Troops that have been most part of this Summer Encamped near Landau, are now marching towards their Winter Quarters, which are Assigned them in Alsace, and even in the Bailiwicks belonging to this City: Yesterday Monsieur de Lowroy passed by this City, in his way towards Schelstadt; our Magistrates sent their Deputies to Compliment him, whom he received very kindly. The Count de Morstein, Ambassador from Poland to the French King, arrived here two days since in his return home.

Hamburg, Sept. 6. The parts enjoy at present a perfect Peace, not having anything to disturb it, either at home, or from abroad. The Duke of Zell is preparing for the Reception and Entertainment of the Prince of Orange, who is suddenly expected at his Court, upon that Dukes Invitation; and when the Prince is come so far, its believed he will not return to *Holland*, without seeing the Elector of Brandenburg, who will be about that time at *Maegdeburg*; Whether the Princes coming into these parts, has any other design in it, than to take the Divertisement of Hunting we cannot say; but certain it is, there are those that are jealous of it, and think this journey will produce things of importance. Count *Conningmarke* is gone for *Pomeran*, to settle the Affairs of that Countrey, which will not in a long time recover the Ruines and Devastations, occasioned by the late War.

Cologne, Sept. 6. Here are arrived Deputies from the Circle of *westphalia*. to Regulate the matter of the Mint, which the States of the Empire have so long unsuccessfully laboured in. The Count de *Coringlee* has been confirmed by the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, in the Dignity of Great Dean of that Cathedral, and he is going hence to Assemble a Chapter at *Molsheim*.

Hague, Sept. 10. The Prince of Orange is returned from *Breda*, and in few days will begin his Journey to Zell, of which we told you in our last he had given Communication to the States-General, and the States of *Holland*; to the First, by the hands of the President of the Assembly, and to the latter by the Pensioner *Fagel*. The States of *Holland* since their Meeting, have not had any Matters of moment before them, of is there any prospect of their entering upon any, but what concerns the particular Affairs of the Province; for as for Foreign things are at present in so quiet a State, that its probable they will not have any occasion in this Session, to employ their time in the consideration of them. From *Ostend* we have Advice, that the Baggage of the Prince of *Parma* was arrived there.

Paris, Sept. 14. Count *Mansfelt* the Emperors Envoy arrived here the last week, and will in a day or two have Audience of the King; who, we are told, is not very well pleased with the Letter written to him by the States of the Empire Assembled at *Raisbonne*, complaining, of the Proceedings of his Officers, which they say, are so many contraventions of the Peace, concluded at *Nimeguen*. What has been reported of the Kings designing a Progres towards *Provence* and *Languedoc*, is without any certainty, and most people are of opinion there is nothing in it, or at least, that it will be deferred till the next year. The Count de *Fuentes* has had a very long Audience of the Duke of *Orleans*, having been above two hours with him at the Palace-Royal, where he at present is with *Madame*. Two Notaries being accused of undue Practices, and particularly, that they have made several false Certificates, and Attestations, they are secured, and will be severely proceeded against.

Plymouth, Sept. 3. Yesterday arrived here the Bishop of *Exeter*, in his Visitation, his Lordship was received by this Corporation with all imaginable Respect, and this day parted from hence again for *Taunton*.

Portsmouth, Sept. 5. Last night the *Pearl* Frigate,

(coming, having the day before met a Merchant Ship, on board of which was the Earl of *Carlisle*, Governor of *Jamaica*, from whence he was coming home. His Lordship returned upon, left the Merchant-Ship, which had lost her Main Mast by stress of weather, and went on board the *Pearl*. This morning his Lordship Landed here, and intends to morrow for *London*.

Deal, Sept. 7. Yesterday arrived in the Downs the *Golden Fleece*, and the from the *East Indies*, the *Loyal Merchant*, the *William*, the *Royal Exchange*, and the *Henry* from *Jamaica*, and the *Dorothy* from *Virginia*. The Fleet outward bound, being about 40 Ships. (among which are the *Bernardisson*, and the *Two Friends*, bound for *East India*) are now under sail, with a fair Wind.

Whitehal, Sept. 3. This day *Henry Savile* Esq; was sworn Vice-Chamberlain to the King, which place has been vacant since the death of *Sir George Carteret*.
