The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Second Day of December last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Seventh Day of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Seventh Day of this instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at

War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

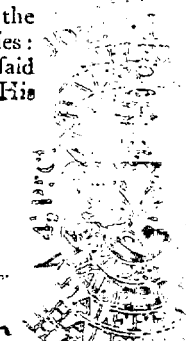

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Second Day of December last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the Tenth Day of this instant February, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained of His Majesty or His Privy Council: But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His



Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland; or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Thirtieth of July One thousand eight hundred and one, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts beyond the Seas, within the Limits of Europe, of any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or of Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into, or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this instant February; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Two Months, to commence from the said Twelfth Day of this instant February, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, within the Limits of Europe, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or any Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, or ship, or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 2. and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Ma-

jefty's Reign, Cap. 34: But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to the Exportation of any of the afore-said Articles from Great Britain to Ireland, or from Ireland to Great Britain, respectively, or to any Exportation of any of the said Articles, by, or on board of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships, or Vessels, or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or to any Exportation thereof by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or from the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being, or from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons within the Limits of Europe, nor to the Exportation of any of the said Articles to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, provided that in case of the Exportation to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, either of Copper being a Naval Store, or of Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, the Exporters thereof do first make Oath of the true Destination of the said Articles to the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, to carry the said Articles to the Port or Place, without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners respectively, and specified in such Bond of a Certificate or Certificates in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners respectively, as the Case may be, thereby shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Port or Place, without the Limits of Europe, for which they were respectively entered outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the

“ Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty’s Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty’s said Subjects, and the foreign Islands in the West Indies:” It is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under his Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being, to authorise, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland, of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland shall not be imported, except in Conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British built Ships owned by His Majesty’s Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants or Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, Live Stock, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and such other Articles of Provisions as may be wanted; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, Live Stock, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and other Articles of Provisions may be imported into the said Island, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty’s Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty’s Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty’s Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty’s Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorised in that Kingdom, respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned, which Licence shall continue and be in force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel, at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, Live Stock, Salted Beef,

Pork, Butter, Pease, and other Articles of Provision, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence, the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, Rice, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and other Articles of Provision, and the Number of Live Stock under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel of his having received the said Licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty’s Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty’s Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Now be it known, That the said [Person’s Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship’s Name] at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and such other Articles of Provision as may be wanted, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and such other Articles of Provisions, to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland: and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty’s Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, Rice, Salted Beef, Pork, Butter, Pease, and such other Articles of Provision, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate

Thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Roger Curtis, Bart. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Cape of Good Hope, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at the Cape, December 20, 1801.

SIR,

THE Private Ship of War the Chance, belonging to Mr. Hogan, of this Place, and commanded by Mr. William White, having been on a Cruise on the Coast of Peru, returned on the 11th Instant. The Commander of the Chance addressed a Letter to me containing an Account of his Proceedings during his Cruise. He appears to have uniformly acted with great Propriety; but his Conduct, and that of his Officers and Men, was, on Two Occasions, so highly creditable to them that I send his Account of these Occurrences for their Lordships' Information.

Extracts of a Letter from Mr. William White, Commander of the Chance Private Ship of War, fitted out at the Cape of Good Hope, to Vice-Admiral Sir Roger Curtis, Bart.

AT Four P. M. on the 19th of August, the Island St. Laurence bearing N. E. Two Leagues, saw a large Ship bearing down towards us; at Nine brought her to close Action, and engaged her within half Pistol-Shot for an Hour and a Half, but finding her Metal much heavier than ours, and full of Men, boarded her on the Starboard Quarter, lashing the Chance's Bowsprit to her Mizen-Mast, and after a desperate Resistance of Three Quarters of an Hour, beat them off the Upper Deck, but they still defended from the Cabin and Lower Deck with long Pikes in a most gallant Manner, till they had Twenty-five Men killed and Twenty-eight wounded, of whom the Captain was one; getting final Possession, she was so close to the Island that with much Difficulty we got her off Shore, all her Braces and Rigging being cut to Pieces by our Grape Shot. She proved to be the new Spanish Ship Amiable Maria, of about Six Hundred Tons, mounting Fourteen Guns, Eighteen, Twelve, and Nine-Pounders, Brads, and

carrying One Hundred and Twenty Men, from Conception bound to Lima, laden with Corn, Wine, Pale Goods, &c. On this Occasion I am much concerned to state Mr. Bennett, a very valuable and brave Officer, was so dangerously wounded that he died Three Days after the Action; the Second and Fourth Mates, Marine Officer, and Two Seamen badly wounded by Pikes, but since recovered. On the 20th, both Ships being much disabled, and having more Prisoners than Crew, I stood close in and sent Eighty-six on Shore in the large Ship's Launch to Lima; we afterwards learned that Seventeen of the Wounded had died."

"At Four A. M. on the 24th September, standing in to cut out from the Roads of Puna, in Guaiquill Bay, a Ship that I had Information of, mounting Twenty-two Guns, fell in with a large Spanish Brig with a Broad Pendant at Main-Top-Mast-Head; at Five she commenced her Fire on us, but she being at a Distance to windward, and desirous to bring her close to Action, we received Three Broadshots before a Shot was returned; at Half-past Five being Yard-Arm and Yard-Arm, commenced our Fire with great Effect, and after a very severe Action of Two Hours and Three Quarters, during the latter Part she made every Effort to get away, I had the Honor to see the Spanish Flag struck to the Chance; she proved to be the Spanish Man of War Brig Limeno, mounting Eighteen long Six-Pound Guns, commanded by Commodore Don Philip de Martinez, the Senior Officer of the Spanish Marine on that Coast, and manned with One Hundred and Forty Men, sent from Guaiquill, for the express Purpose of taking the Chance, and then to proceed to the Northward to take Three English Whalers laying in one of their Ports; she had Fourteen Men killed and Seven wounded; the Captain mortally wounded, who died Two Days after the Action; the Chance had Two Men killed and one wounded, and had only Fifty Men at the Commencement of the Action, mounting Sixteen Guns Twelve and Six-Pounders."
