He Affairs of the Dutch at Ternattee, are fomewhat difcomposed, through an unhappy difference between the King and their Chief; Common Report blames the latter, for having ftruck the King, who thereupon in much anger retired to Tydore: They that understand the affairs of those parts, conclude it a Matter of very great confequence; and this is certain, that in November last, the Sieur Martin, Major of the Fort at Batavit, failed from thence with four, fome fay fix Ships, provided with a fufficient number of Men, Ammunition, Sc. and that his Commission was, to endcavour if possible, to compose the Difference abovementioned; and in cafe all the means he should use, in order thereunto proved ineffectual, then to have recourse unto Arms.

Genoua, Aug. 29. The 8th Inftant arrived here the Maryland Merchant from England; She came in company of five other flout Merchant Ships, which are paft by for Legharne

Berlin, Sept. 8. The Second Inflant the El ctor of Saxony, after a long Indifpolition, dyed at Fryburg; which will, its believed, occafion a great change in that Court; for its faid, that the Sicur Ramsdorf, the late Electors chief Miniller, is not well with the young Prince, between whom and the Emperor is a perional friendlhip, and therefore its not doubted, but that he and others, who are faid to favour the French Interefts, will be removed. The Plague increases fo faft at Drefden, that for want of Burial-places, they are forced to throw many of the dead Bodies into the River. The Plague is likewife at Leinzick.

Cologue, Sept. 14. Three days fince paffed through this City the Secretary of the Eleftor Palatine, going in great hafte for England; we did not then know what his Errand was, but underfland it fince, by the Letters we receive this morning from Hydelberg, which tell us, That his Electoral Highnefs being at Fredericksburg, after fome days illnefs, was advifed by his Phyfitians to remove to Heydelberg for the Air, that in the way, in a Village called Edingen, he was taken with an Apoplexy, and about four in the afternoon Dyed. His Body being the next day Embalmed, was carried to Manbeim, where it will remain, till Orders come from the Prince his Son (now Elector Palatine) who is in England, concerning the farther difpolal of it. His Electoral Highnefs dyed in the 62 year of his age.

Amflerdam Sept. 13. From Zealand we have Advice, that the fix Brandenburg Frigats, with one Firefhip and a Victualler, were come from the Sound to Schmevelt, and were at an Anchor there when these Letters came away. The King of Sprin, to avo d all occasions of different e with the French King, in the prefent conjunctive of Affairs, has fent his Committioners at Courtray a new Power, t wherein he only Stiles himfelf King of Spain, and fo among the other Titles, that are omitted, that of Burgundy is likewife left out. We have an Acrocount from Hamburg, of the death of the Elector t of Saxony,

Hague, Sept. 13. On Tuesday last, Don Balthazar de Fuen Mayor, Envoye Extraordinary from Spain, prefented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein he acquainted them, That the King his Mafter being defirous to take away all occasions which might be made ule of to dilturb the Peace, and having a particular regard to the Inflances of this State, had fent a new Power to his Commissioners at Courtray, which would remove the Difficulties, occalioned by the pretention of the French, concerning the Title of Burgundy; of which the States gave notice the next day to the French Ambaffador. It is faid that the King of Spain does in this new Commission, only Stile himself King of Spain, without any other Title. The Sieur Guldenstelp, the Swedes Envoye, has had his fi ft Audience of the States-General, in which he Declared, the great defire the King his Mafter has, to continue his antient Friendship with this State. The States of Holland have not hitherto made any progress towards the composing the Differences between them and the Province of Zealand; and its thought that that Affair will require a longer time, than they intend this Seffion shall continue. The Prince of Orange holds his Refolution of parting hence on Monday next towards Zell, his Horses being already laid in feveral places in the way of his Journey : 'tis believed the Princess will go to Soefidyke, and remain there till his Highneffes return.

Hague, Sept. 17. The Prince of Orange departed yes flerday for Zell, the States-Gen ral, and those of this Province having before by their Deputies, Complix mented his Highness, and wilhed him a good journey. The States-General have Refolved to fend the Heer, Van Leeuwen for England, where he was lately Amb. & fador from this State, but at prefent, he will have only the Character of Envoye Extraordina y, that he may not be troubled with polots of Ceremony, which that of Ambaffador would fubject him to. Colonel Fitz Patrick, who has been lookt upon as a very zealous Roman Catholick, is now become a Protestant, having on Sunday last rec ived the Sar crament in the Frincel's of Oranges Chappel at.
