**T**He 14th Instant the Czar was Married to a young beautiful Lady, of a private Family, whom he chose before any of those that were presented to him out of the greatest Families of this Country, which he did, as well to prevent all occasion of Envy and Amosity between the Great ones, as to please his own Inclination. We are told, that the Czar is resolved to send Ambassadors to *England, France, Spain,* and other Courts, to notify his Marriage, and to exhort those Princes to enter into some common Engagement against the Turks.

*Warsaw Aug. 13.* A Gentleman, which our King had sent to *Constantinople* is come back; he passed through the Turks Army, which was Encamped on the other side of the *Danube*; and as he reports, consists not of more than 25000 Men: he says there was not any appearance of their passing the *Danube* this year; but that they made great preparations against the next Spring. We cannot certainly learn in what state the Negotiations between the Turks and the Moscovites are; but we here, continue to have a jealousie of the latter.

*Florence, Aug. 27.* It is confidently said, that the *Abbeé Morel*, Envoye from *France* to the Duke of *Mantoua*, has at his disposal, 100000 Crowns, and Liberty to Assign several Pensions for Life, which makes People believe, that he is going to renew the Negotiation about *Cazal*, and that this Money is to be employed for the advancing of it. We are informed, that there is a Design in hand, to make a new Port at *Nizza*, and that a famous French Ingenier, who is one of those that has the Superintendency of that great work in *France*, for the joyning the two Seas, has been consulted about it.

*Stockholme, Aug. 28.* The last week the King, Queen, and the Queen-Mother, coming by water from *Copingsfor*, the Yacht they were in happened to strike against a Rock, that lay under water, and thereby became so leaky, that the King, the Queens, and others that were on board, were forced to make haste to save themselves, it not being long after they were got out of it, that the Yacht sunk. Preparations are making here for the Queens Coronation.

*Madrid, Sept. 2.* The 27th past, the Duchesse of *Terranova* was removed from the place of *Camera Mayor* to the Queen, and the same day the Duchesse Dowager of *Albuquerque* took possession of it; the reason of this change is said to be, that the said Duchesse of *Terranova* was of a humour that made her very uneasy to the Queen, and all the young Ladies. *Don Melchior de Navarra*, formerly Vice-Chancellor of *Arragon* (who was in Disgrace all the time of *Don Juan's* Ministry) and lately made a Counsellor of State, is named Viceroy of *Peru*, and will Embark on the Galeons that are to depart

in *October* next; and several other Persons that were removed by *Don Juan*, are now restored to their several Employments; and we are assured, that even *Don Fernando de Valenzuela*, who was formerly first Minister of State, and banished by *Don Juan* to the *Indies*, is recalled home, and will be restored to all his Honors, except that of Grandee.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 7.* This Evening arrived here the Electoral Prince of *Saxony*, who is our Kings Sister; and in few days we expect the Princess Palatine, who we hear is coming hither. From *Schonen* we have Advice, that the King has caused *Malmoe* and *Christianstads* to be demolished; but that *Landskrona* will be made very strong. The *Brandenburg* Frigats are sailed out of the *Sound*.

*Lintz, Sept. 3.* Yesterday in the afternoon arrived here the Duke of *Lorraine*, with the Queen of *Poland* his Wife, who purpose to stay as long as the Court remains here.

*Strasburg, Sept. 6.* Monsieur de *Louvois*, after having visited the Fortifications of *Brisac, Schlestadt, Hunningen, Friburg, Besfort*, and other places, is returned for *France*. The French Troops who have lain in this neighborhood, are marching to their Winter Quarters assigned them in the Bishopricks of *Metz* and *Verdun*.

*Friburg, Sept. 10.* The second Instant dyed here, after a long Indisposition, *John George*, Duke of *Saxony*, and Prince Elector of the Empire, in the 68th year of his age, leaving only one Son, by his Wife *Magdelain Sibille* of *Brandenburg Anspach*, *John George*, the third of that name, the present Elector.

*Heydelberg, Sept. 11.* The 7th Instant dyed suddainly in the way between *Manheim* and *Frankendal*, after a light Indisposition of three or four days, *Charles Louis*, Count Palatine of the *Rhine*, and Prince Elector of the Empire; of which several Expresses were sent to give Advice to the Electoral Prince (now in *England*) to the Princess his Mother at *Casal*, to the Dutchess of *Orleans* his Sister, and to the Emperor. The Elector deceased, was aged 63 years, and has left by his Wife *Charlotte*, Daughter of *William* Landgrave of *Hesse*, *Charles*, the present Elector, born in 1651, and *Charlotte Elizabeth*, Wife to the Duke of *Orleans*.

*Hague, Sept. 20.* The States of *Holland* having finished the Matters that were before them, intend to separate to morrow till the 15th of *November*. Mr. *Sidney* will Embark in a day or two for *England*. The Heers *Boreel* and *Dyckvelt*, late Ambassadors from this State in *France*, have made their Report to the States-General.

*Brussels, Sept. 17.* Since our last we have been in much disorder here. The Nations (which are the Heads of the several Companies of Trades) being Assembled, represented several Grievances to his Excellency, among which the principal one was, That the Clergy and Nobility of this Province, had granted a Supply to be raised upon the Countrey, without the consent of the said Nations, and demanded

d. demanded Restitution of the said Moneys, and that the States of *Brabant* should by a publick Act Declare, that for the future, no Tax or Imposition shall be raised without their consent; this Proceeding having occasioned great heats, the ordinary sort of people assembled together yesterday in a tumultuous manner, fell upon the House of one of our Burgermasters, and plundered it, and had already marked out the Houses of some of the richest Burgers which they designed to spoyl, but were prevented by his Excellencies Guards, who made several Discharges upon them, and forced them to Retreat, while our Archbishop, the Duke d' *Aersbot*, the Prince of *Vaudemont*, and other persons of the chiefest Quality, laboured to compose the minds of the Nations, which they have this day done, by assuring them of all reasonable satisfaction.

*Brussels*, Sept. 20. This Court was much surprized with an Account his Excellency received the last night from the Governour of *Osford*, that a new Spanish Man of War of 48 pieces of Cannon, being laden with all sorts of rich Merchandizes for *Spain*, and thence for the *Indies*, to the value of 6 or 700000 Crowns, had been seized in the Road of *Osford* by the six *Brandenburg* Frigats (who we told you in our last were come to *Schonevelt*) and that they were failed with their Prize Northwards. We are here very quiet again.

*Paris*, Sept. 21. The Court, which is still at *Verfallus*, is gone into Mourning for the death of the Elector Palatine. The 19th Instant Count *Mansfeldt* the Emperors Envoye, had his first Audience of the King. The Prince of *Conde* is perfectly recovered of his *Ague*.

*Plymouth*, Sept. 10. On Wednesday last failed from hence the *Constant Warwick*, Capt. *Asbby* Commandeer, and the *Darmouth*, Capt. *Churchil*.

*Portsmouth*, Sept. 12. On Thursday came into this Harbor the *Pearl* Frigate to clear, and that done, will go to Sea again.

*London*, Sept. 13. This day Mrs *Culier*, who we told you in our last, was convicted of having published a most scandalous Libel, received her Sentence, which was to stand on the Pillory at three several places, the said Libels being at the same time to be burnt in her sight, by the common Hangman, to pay a Fine of 1000 l. and to continue in prison till the same be paid, and to give Security for her good Behaviour during her life.

*Whitehal*, Sept. 15. This day was held a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter, in the Presence of the Sovereign, where the Prince Elector Palatine was Elected a Knight Companion of the Order, and his Electoral Highness being Introduced by the Duke of *Albemarle*, and the Marquis of *Worcester*, was invested with the Collar and the Garter.

*London*, Sept. 15. This day the Artillery Company kept their Annual Feast at *Merchant-Tailors-Hall*, which they had prayed his Royal Highness their Captain, to Honour with his Presence. In the morning they went to *Bow Church*, and heard an excellent Sermon, Preached by Dr. *Scot*, and from thence marched in order to the Hall; the Lord Marquis of *Worcester*, and the Earl of *Sbrensbury*, out of a particular Respect to the Company, walking with the other Stewards, Sir *William Dodson*, for the Earl of *Mulgrave*, Sir *Matthew Andrews* for the Earl of *Berkley*, Sir *Fonathan Raymond*, Sir *Simon Lewis*, Sir *Benjamin Newland*, and Capt. *Harvey*, at

the head of them with Gilt Staves in their hands, followed by the Lord Mayor and the Court of Aldermen in their Scarlet Gowns. About two a clock his Royal Highness, attended by several of the Nobility, and other persons of Quality came in their Coaches to *Merchant-Tailors Hall*, and was received by the Stewards of the Artillery Company, and the late Master, and present Wardens of the Merchant-Tailors Company. After the usual Compliments and Respects, his R. Highness went to Dinner at a Table at the upper end of the Hall, at which the Lord Mayor, the Nobility, and other persons of Quality likewise sat, there being four other Tables for the rest of the Company, which was very numerous; the Entertainment was great and splendid, and all things performed with great Order, and the new Stewards being chosen, who are the Earl of *Tenet*, the Lord *Lumley*, the Lord *Passon*, the Lord *Allington*, Sir *John Narborough*, Philip *Frowd* Esq; *John Shales*, Esq; and Capt. *Burden*, his Royal Highness rose from Table, and retired into another Room, where having passed some time, and the Assistants and others having kissed his Hand, his Royal Highness, returned to *Whitehal* extremely satisfied.
