GEORGE R.

WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us, the French Republic, His Catholick Majesty, and the Batavian Republic, hath been concluded at Amiens, on the Twenty-seventh Day of March last, and the Ratifications thereof have been duly exchanged: In Conformity therunto, We have thought fit hereby to command that the same be published throughout all Our Dominions: And We do declare to all Our loving Subjects Our Will and Pleasure, that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all Our loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring the Conclusion of the War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act for the further Encouragement of British Mariners, and for other Purposes therein mentioned, various Provisions are made which are directed to take Effect from and after the Expiration of Six Months from the Conclusion of the then existing War, to be notified in Manner therein mentioned; and it is thereby further enacted, that, for the Purposes of the said Act, the Conclusion of the said War shall be holden to be from the Time that the same shall be notified by Our Royal Proclamation, or Order in Council; to be published in the London Gazette: And whereas a Definitive Treaty of Peace has been duly ratified between Us, the French Republic, His Catholick Majesty, and the

Batavian Republic; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, for the Purposes of the said Act, hereby to notify and declare the Conclusion of the said War, by this Our Royal Proclamation, to be published in the London Gazette; and We do direct the same to be published accordingly.

That the said Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said First Day of June next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn or neglect the Performance of so religious a Duty: Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance; and Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and two, in the Forty-second Year of Our Reign.

St. James's, April 29, 1802.

THE Officers of Arms; Serjeants at Arms, with their Maces and Collars; the Serjeant-Trumpeter, with his Mace and Collar; the Trumpets, Drum-Major, and Drums; and the Knight Marshal, and Knight Marshal's Men, assembled this Day, at Half past Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, in the Stable-Yard, St. James's: and the Officers of Arms, being habited in their respective Tabards, and mounted, a Procession was made, at Twelve o'Clock, from thence to the Palace-Gate, where George Harrison, Esq; Norroy King of Arms, read His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace; which being done, a Procession was made to Charing-Cross, in the following Order, viz.

At Charing-Cross Richmond Herald read the Proclamation aloud; and the Procession moved on, in the same Order, to Temple-Bar; the Gates of which being shut, Blue Mantle Pursuivant of Arms left the Procession, and, accompanied by Two Trumpets, preceded by Two Life Guards to clear the Way, rode up to the Gates, and, after the Trumpets had sounded thrice, he knocked with his Cane. Being asked by the City Marshal from within, "*Who comes there?*" he replied, "*The Officers of Arms, who demand Entrance into the City to publish His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace.*" The Gates being opened, he was admitted alone, and the Gates were immediately shut again. The City Marshal, preceded by his Officers, conducted him to the Lord Mayor, (who was on Horseback, and, with the Aldermen; Recorder, and Sheriffs, attended within the Gate,) to whom he shewed His Majesty's Warrant, which his Lordship having read, returned; and gave Directions to the City Marshal to open the Gates, who, attending the Pursuivant back, opened them accordingly, and, on leaving him, said, "*Sir, the Gates are open.*" The Trumpets and Life Guards being in waiting, conducted him to his Place in the Procession, which then moved on into the City, except the Officers of Westminster, who filed off and retired as they came to Temple-Bar. At the End of Chancery-Lane Windsor Herald read the Proclamation. Then the Lord Mayor, with the City Officers, joined the Procession, immediately after the Officers of Arms, in the following Order, viz.

At the End of Wood-Street, where the Cross formerly stood, in Cheap-side, the Proclamation was read by Chester Herald. The Procession moving on to the Royal Exchange, the Proclamation was there read, for the last Time, by Lancaster Herald.

The Lord Mayor having, upon this joyful Occasion, convened the several Volunteer Corps of the City in order to add to the Splendour of the Ceremony, as well as to deliver to them the Thanks of His Majesty and the Honourable House of Commons for their Services during the War, it became necessary to extend the Procession to Aldgate; whence it returned, through Fenchurch-Street, and up Gracechurch-Street, and passed again through Cornhill, to the Mansion-House; from whence the Procession of the Officers of Arms, Knight Marshal, Drums and Trumpets, and Life Guards, returned through St. Paul's Church-Yard.

The Acclamations of Joy were general from many Thousands of Spectators, who filled all the Streets through which the Procession passed; and, in the Evening, the universal Satisfaction of the People was manifested by the Display of splendid Illuminations in all Parts of the Metropolis.
