A. PROCLAMATION,

For a Public THANKSGIVING.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God, in His great Goodness, to put an end to the late bloody, extended, and expensive War, in which We were engaged; We therefore, adoring the Divine Goodness, and duly considering that the great and publick Blessings of Peace do call for publick and solemn Acknowledgements, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom called Scotland, upon Tuesday the First Day of June next: And We do strictly charge and command,

That the said Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said First Day of June next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn or neglect the Performance of so religious a Duty: Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance; and Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

CEREMONY of the PROCLAMATION of PEACE on the 29th April 1802.

OUR Will and Pleasure is, that you give immediate Directions to the Heralds, Purfuivants, and other necessary Officers, to attend the Proclamation of Peace that is to be made on Thursday next, the Twenty-ninth Day of April, in the usual Places, and with the Solemnities customary on the like Occasions; and for so doing this shall be your Warrant. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and two, in the Forty-second Year of Our Reign.

St. James's, April 29, 1802.

THE Officers of Arms; Serjeants at Arms, with their Maces and Collars; the Serjeant-Trumpeter, with his Mace and Collar; the Trumpets, Drum-Major, and Drums; and the Knight Marshal, and Knight Marshal's Men, assembled this Day, at Half past Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, in the Stable-Yard, St. James's: and the Officers of Arms, being habited in their respective Tabards, and mounted, a Procession was made, at Twelve o'Clock, from thence to the Palace-Gate, where George Harrison, Esq; Norroy King of Arms, read His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace; which being done, a Procession was made to Charing-Cross, in the following Order, viz.

A Party of Life Guards, to clear the Way.

Beadles of Westminster, Two and Two, with Staves.

Constables of Westminster, in like Manner.

High Constable, on Horseback, with his Staff.

Officers of the High Bailiff of Westminster, on Horseback, with White Wands.

High Bailiff and Deputy Steward, on Horseback.

Three Knight-Marshal's Men, Bearers of the Verge, with Maces.

Eight Knight-Marshal's Men, Two and Two.

Sir James Bland Burges, Bart. Knight-Marshal, on Horseback, with his Baton.

Drums.

Drum Major.

Trumpets.

Serjeant Trumpeter, in his Collar, with his Mace.
